MAN STRUCK AND KILLED BY CAR

EAGLE RIVER: An Eagle River man was struck and killed last Wednesday evening, when he staggered into the path of an oncoming auto. Killed instantly was William K. Lee of Artillery Rd. The accident occurred at approximately 7:18pm. The pavement was wet and visibility poor due to falling rain.

The driver of the car, Harold T. Beylund of Palm had been traveling south and had not seen Lee at all. The impact threw or carried Lee approximately 110 feet from the point of impact.

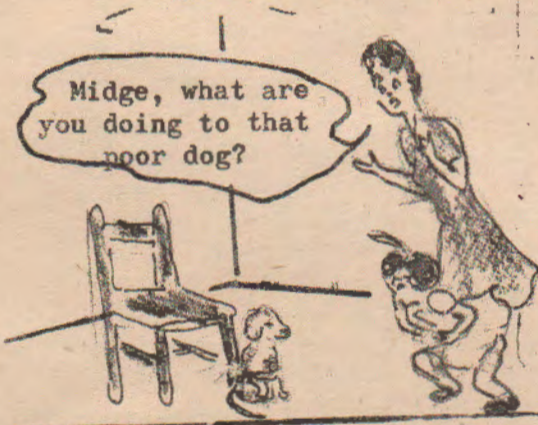

SIFT TOGETHER:

- 1½ tsp baking powder
- 2 cups flour
- ½ tsp salt

CREAM:

- ¼ cup shortening
- ¾ cups sugar
- 2 tbs grated orange rind

ADD 1 egg

BEAT hard

STIR in ½ flour mixture

ADD 3 tbs evaporated milk

1 tsp vanilla

STIR in rest of flour

SHAPE into roll or rectangle 12"x2"

CHILL for 1 hour until firm

CUT into slices ¼ inch thick

BAKE at 375° for about 12 minutes.

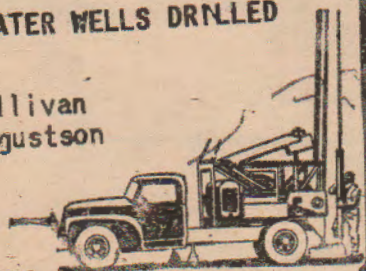

Damage to the DKW was estimated at \$300, to the pick-up \$50.

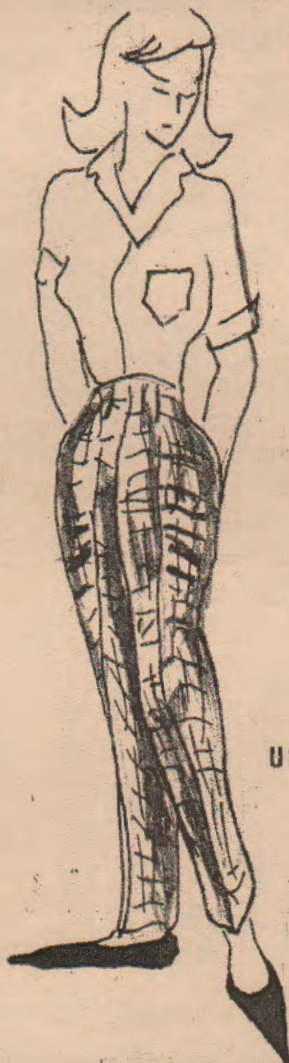
Fillmore was cited for driving too fast for conditions.

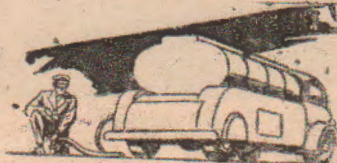

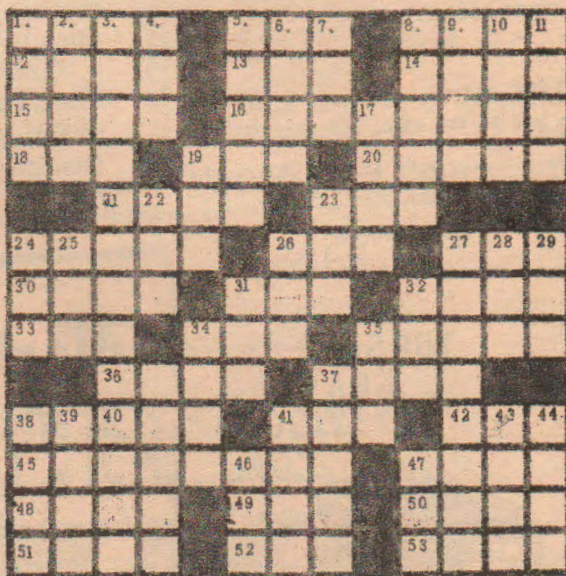

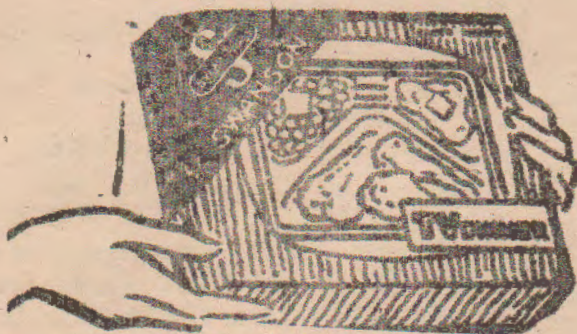
