3 pints water melon rind
3 pints sugar
2 lemons
CUT rind into %inch cupes
PLACE in bowl
COVER with solution of water

DRAIN rind
COVER WITH WATER
BOIL for 10 minutes
POUR off water
MIX sugar in kettle with

l cup hot water
BOIL to thick syrup
ADD melon rind
BOIL hard for 15 minutes
REMOVE from heat
ALLOW to cool
ADD lemon sliced very thin
COOK slowly for 30 minutes
POUR into sterile jams
SEAL with paraffance.

The ladies also drew names for Secret Sisters for the coming year.


LADIES CLUB TO CONDUCT DOLL RAFFLE

Chaperones for the event will be Mr. and Mrs. Ray Cheely, the clubs sponsors.


Pop and hot dogs will be offered for sale, and Teen Club membership cards will also be available.



WELL DRILLER LEAVES CHUGIAK SCHOOL

CHUGIAK: The drilling rig belonging to the Thorn drillling Company of Homer has been moved from the Chugiak School this week, following the completion of a water well which had been drilled there.

The drillers had completed the drilling of one well, and were doing some final work in the hole when the drilling bit came loose and was lost in the hole.

Efforts to recover the bit were of no avail, and the drilling of a second well was necessary.

The second well, which is now completed, will produce a flow of ten gallons per minute for the first ten minutes and a flow of five gallons per minute thereafter.






