**COOK FOR OCTOBER**  
**MARGARET D'SPAIN**

With an extra Wednesday in October, we have the pleasure of once again entering the kitchen of Margaret D'Spain.

For a final treat Margaret gives us this unusual recipe for watermelon preserves, which is more like a marmalade rather than a pickle.

**WATERMELON PRESERVES**

- 3 pints water melon rind
- 3 pints sugar
- 2 lemons
- CUT rind into 1/4 inch cubes
- PLACE in bowl
- COVER with solution of water with salt or alum
- LET STAND overnight
- DRAIN rind
- COVER WITH WATER
- BOIL for 10 minutes
- POUR off water
- MIX sugar in kettle with 1 cup hot water
- BOIL to thick syrup
- ADD melon rind
- BOIL hard for 15 minutes
- REMOVE from heat
- ALLOW to cool
- ADD lemon sliced very thin
- COOK slowly for 30 minutes
- POUR into sterile jars
- SEAL with paraffine.

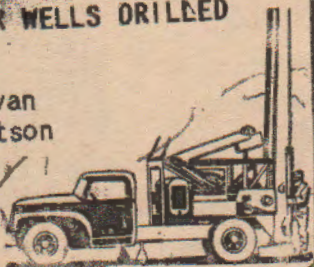

DATE OF SPEECH AND HEARING CLINIC IS CHANGED

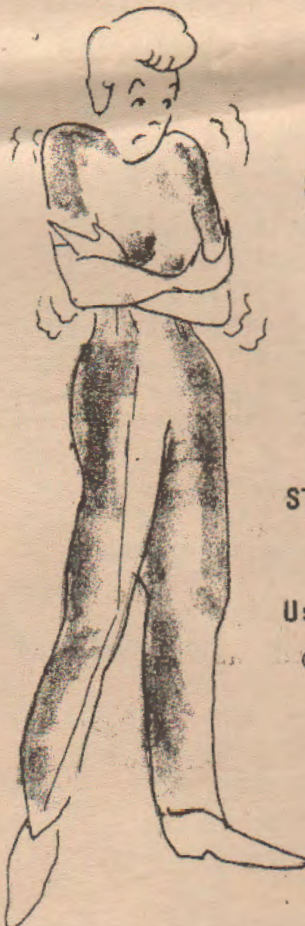
CHUGIAK: Miss Peggy Hamilton, Speech and Hearing Therapist for the ACCA has announced a change in the Clinic date for November.
