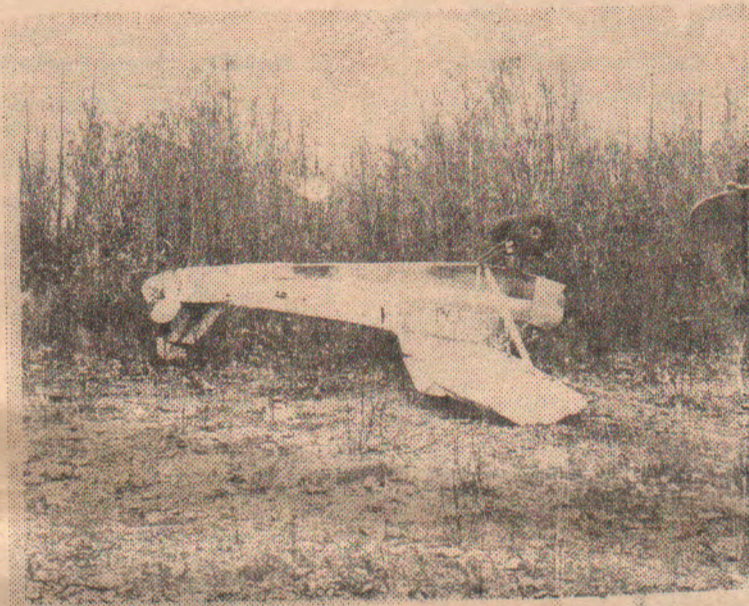

BANDITS NABBED IN ROAD BLOCK

WINDS CAUSE MUCH DAMAGE

CHUGIAK: For the second time in two weeks, high winds buffeted the Greater Chugiak Area causing widespread damage.

Most of the business signs along the highway suffered some damage, as did roofs and chimneys.

Trees were blown down and against wires causing numerous power and telephone outages.

One of the more costly results of the wind was damages sustained by the Piper aircraft at the Birchwood airstrip, belonging to Lonnie Temple, of Spenard.

The plane flipped over on its back causing major damage to the airframe.

BIRCHWOOD: Quick thinking on the part of a news-carrier and a milkman were responsible for saving a large portion of the equipment in A Birchwood shop which was destroyed by fire on Monday.

The shop, which belonged to Ralph Doyle, burned to the ground, despite efforts of both the Chugiak and Eagle River Fire companies, who responded to the alarm which was turned by the newsboy, Charles Monjeau, of Birchwood, a senior at Anchorage East High School.

Young Monjeau said that he noticed smoke issuing from the eaves of the building as he was making his paper delivery. He also saw flames beginning to show along one wall.

After calling the fire company, he and the milkman, who was also making a delivery, removed a lathe from the building, a truck and carried several cases of dynamite that were stacked outside to a safe distance.

The firemen and other neighbors who responded, were able to remove a considerable amount of equipment from the building before the flames completely enveloped it.

Doyle and his wife were not at home at the time the fire was discovered. They had gone to Anchorage and returned to find the building completely gone.

Doyle guessed that the high winds on Sunday might have caused a separation in the stove pipe leading

Copies of the publication were sent to other departments for further distribution. Entitled "Skid Stuff", the booklet contains dozens of helpful & important and readable facts on winter driving.

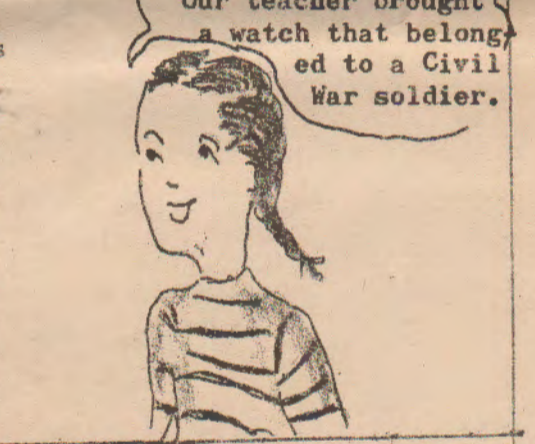
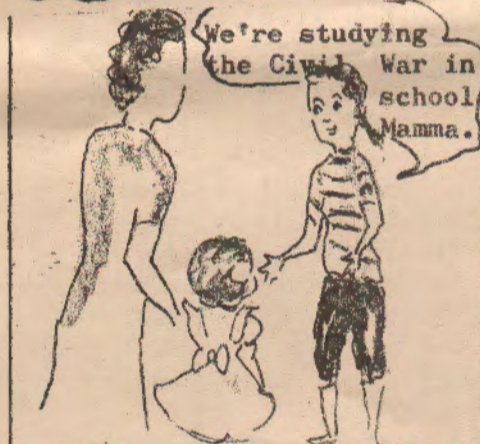

HIGHWAYS TO REMAIN OPEN

JUNEAU: In response to a request from the Alaska Department of Fish and Game, the Department of Highways will attempt to keep the Taylor and Denali Highways open through the month of October, Highway Commissioner D.A. McKinnon said today. It was previously announced that the roads would be closed for winter on October 4.

The late maintenance is in the interest of better utilization of the game resources, and every effort will be made to keep the roads open until the game harvest is complete or unusual weather forces the closure, McKinnon said.

Deputy Commissioner, Department of Fish and Game, E.S. Narvich requested the extension, explaining that early closing of the highways would "prevent access to caribou herds by hunters during the time when adequate utilization of these animals is possible.

The Nelchind herd of caribou is now appearing near the Denali, while the Forty mile caribou herd is not yet near the Taylor Highway and may not reach it for two or three more weeks, Narvich said.

EAGLE RIVER: The board of Directors of the Matanuska Electric Association will hold their regular monthly meeting in the Greater Chugiak Area on October 14th, according to Jim Ekstedt, local member of the board.

Any interested persons are cordially invited to attend and to ask any questions or discuss any power problems.

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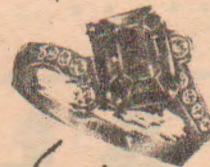
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BASKETBALL TIME IS NEAR

CHUGIAK: Chuck Smith superintendent of the Chugiak School system said today that the school basketball season is near, with an exciting program in view.

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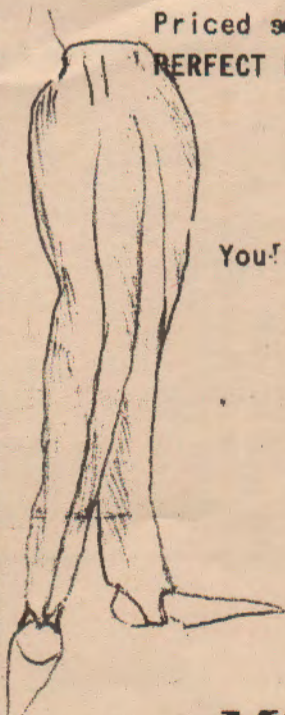

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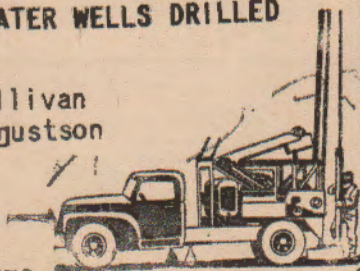

LIONS CLUB REPORT

EAGLE RIVER: In the absence of Lion President Virgil Flint, the regular weekly membership meeting was conducted by Lion Vice President Roger Williams who continued hearing of committee reports.

As a followup to previous consideration of the Civil Defense family self-aid program as an Eagle River Lion Club project, Lion Morris Penrod enlarged on the scope of the project.

Included in the course will be a broad general consideration of the anticipated effects of radio active fallout and emergency survival methods to include basic first aid treatment of burns, shock, control of bleeding, treatment of fractures, transportation of injured, care of sick and disabled, care of children and emergency childbirth.

At least one qualified instructor will conduct the classes. Additional help will be brought in if it appears there is sufficient interest among residents of the area in such a course. Instruction will be implimented by color-slides and movies.

Damage was estimated at \$900. Hoffman suffered severe lacerations of the forehead.

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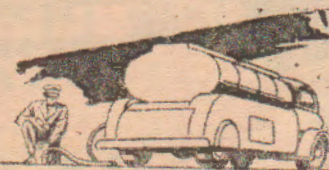

He also asked that thanks be extended to all of those who have taken part in the numerous projects that have been undertaken at both of the local schools this year.



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

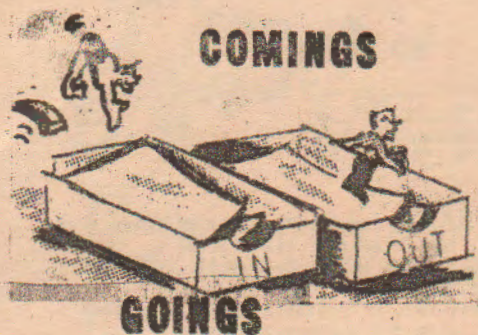

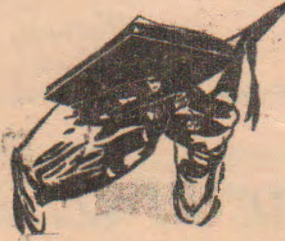

WASHINGTON D.C.: The September 21 issue of the Saturday Evening Post contains an article "Why New Houses Cost Too Much" by Arthur M. Watkins, which reports the successful effort by Senator Gruening to require the builder of a group of FHA insured houses in Eagle River to correct serious defects which came to light last year.

The Post also devoted its lead editorial in the issue to urging passage of Senator Gruening's bill S 1200, which would empower the FHA to require the builders to post bonds insuring correction of major structural defects that might appear. "We hope, that Senator Sparkman's subcommittee will act on the bill as soon as possible and bring it out, with a Favorable report", the Post editorial said.

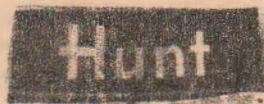
