

The group met last Thursday at the home of Eleanor Brian.





Those who favor the second class borough usually are fearful of giving too much power to the new government. They advance the case that the new borough should "walk before it runs." Should prove its need before it "gives in to greed." As in most cases with govern-

ment, only time is going to tell for certain exactly what happens and when, under either There can class of borough. be no doubt that there are points, service area - for fire in favor of each particular class and that valid arguments exist for urging each, under .certain specific conditions. Therefore, an examination

of the respective types is one way to leave the final determination to you, the voters."

The first class borough gives the borough assembly all the powers of a first class city. However, it does not make it mandatory that they assume these powers the instant they set-up their government.

Neither does it guarantee them that they will not be forced to assume them whenever the state decides that they should do so. For the law gives the state legislature the power to make (next col)



#### (borough)

such a borough a home rule borough, at the legislature\*s option. With this power, it is conceivable that the state could force the borough to assume its full span of powers and duties at any time.

Without such forcing, the borough would normally assume such powers at the choice of the borough assembly.

Since such powers would be automatic in areas outside the cities, the only point remaining would be whether they would apply in the same manner within the cities. Thus, from the beginning the borough assembly of a first class borough would have full control of public health, safety and welfare outside the cities, subject to whatever limitations are placed against firs class cities, and they could assume such powers within those cities by the vote of the assembly, concurred in by a majority of the city council.

From this point on, the exercies of powers becomes hazy. According to the law, protection, etc .- can be es-

tablished if the same end can be served by annexation to a city, or the enlargement of (next col)



an existing service area. Thus, fire protection of any area might be achieved by (1) andexing to a city, such as Anchorage; or by the enlargement of a public utility district, such as the Spenard PUD; or by setting up a new service area to perform the function.

The actual means would depend upon the definition of terms, legal agguments and all the rest of the routine of the Local Affairs agency and the courts.

At this time, no one can actually guarantee that the Spenard PUD will not be taken over through such a forced annexation. Or that such an annexation would not he extended to include Sand Lake and similar heavily populated areas. The plain and simple truth is, that no one knows. The only way to find out is ! by living through it.

However, under the second lass borough, there is reaon to believe that things ould , at least, be more eas-y understood. This borough ould come into being with only hree powers, schools, planning nd zoning and levying and colecting taxes. In order to dd to these basic powers, t would be necessary for the ssembly to agree that the orough had need for a particlar power and petition the ocal Affairs agency for such power.

Then, the Local Affairs agncy would hold hearings and f such powers were deemed edessary, approve it for the orough. In all cases of area ide powers, it would require hat the Gity Council agree to ield such a power to the borogh, before the borough would ave the power within the city.

In both classes of borough, he five members from the City ouncil would have the "weighed vote" on all area-wide maters. In short, they could ave a collective vote that was apable of outvoting their. ountry cousins. (The formla for arriving at their ote is to add to the total aumber of representatives from mitside the City and divide by the number of city representatives. This gives the weight of the vote. In the case of Dist-

The two remaining youths were captured the following day in Anchorage by City police.


