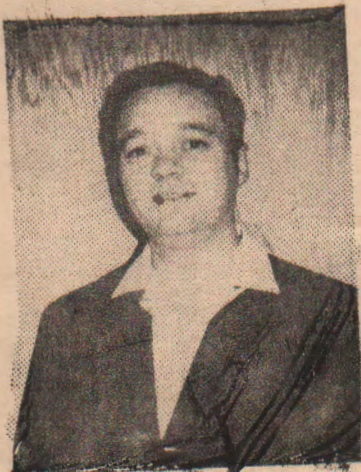

any lack of laws and rules, far from it. The laws and rules are very definite, however, the interpretations differ very much.

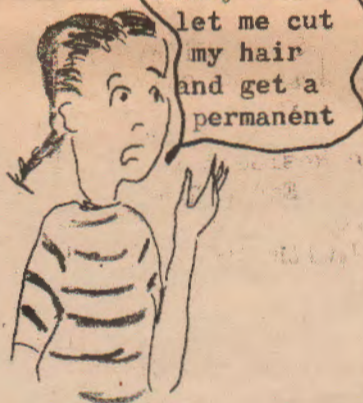

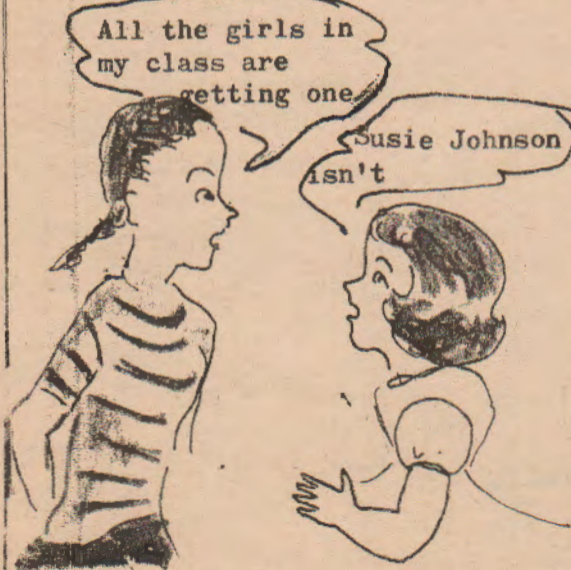

- 2½ cups sifted flour
- 1½ tsp soda
- ½ tsp salt
- ½ tsp. cinnamon
- ½ tsp nutmeg
- 1 tbs. vinegar
- 1 cup milk
- ½ cup shortening
- 1 cup sugar
- 4 eggs
- 1 cup apple butter
- ½ cup chopped nuts

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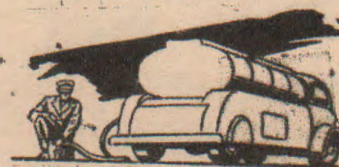

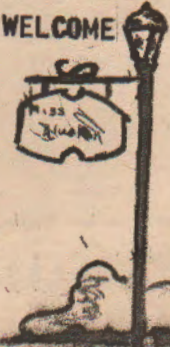

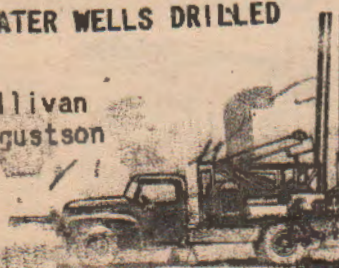

I believe that the borough form of government should function as it was intended, to provide a minimum amount of government to those areas that do not now have any form of local government, and to provide it as economically as possible.

In addition to the three mandatory powers, schools, planning and zoning and taxing and assessment, no additional powers or services should be added unless voted on by the people.

In order to insure as democratic a form of borough government as possible with a check and balance system, I believe, the Chairman plan should be adopted.

The Chairman, elected by and responsible directly to the people, with the power of veto over

any Assembly action, would make the Assembly far more responsive to the people than under the manager plan.

"I believe that committees should be set up to devise borough planning and zoning; and taxing and assessing boards on local problems.

Further, the Assembly should provide that the school board be elected from sections in order to insure that all areas are properly represented.

The Assembly men, now elected by sections, but voted on at large, should be elected only by the people in the section they hope to represent.

As to my own candidacy, based on my past experience in community activities, I believe I am qualified to adequately represent the people of my section.

I have no 'axes to grind' no special interest to protect, but desire only to serve my home section as fairly as possible, and I pledge to be responsive to the wishes of the people."

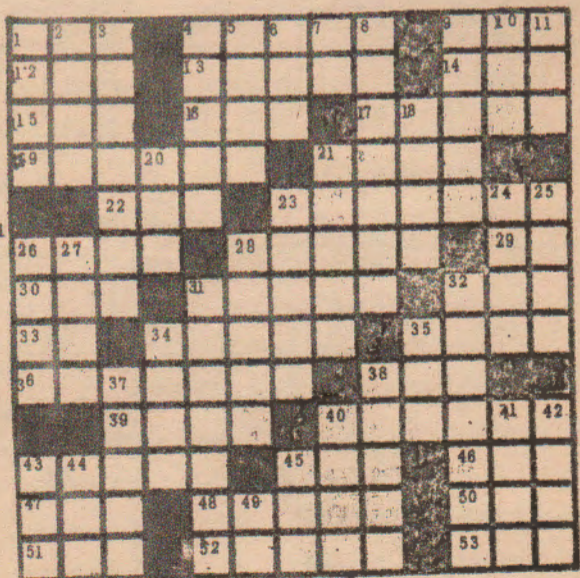

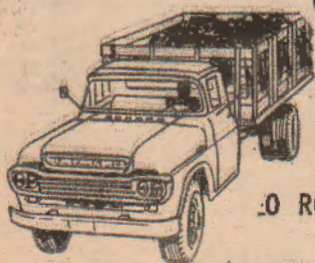

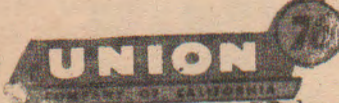

Those who favor the second class borough usually are fearful of giving too much power to the new government. They advance the case that the new borough should "walk before it runs." Should prove its need before it "gives in to greed."

As in most cases with government, only time is going to tell for certain exactly what happens and when, under either class of borough. There can be no doubt that there are points in favor of each particular class and that valid arguments exist for urging each, under certain specific conditions.

Therefore, an examination of the respective types is one way to leave the final determination to you, the voters.

The first class borough gives the borough assembly all the powers of a first class city. However, it does not make it mandatory that they assume these powers the instant they set-up their government.

Neither does it guarantee them that they will not be forced to assume them whenever the state decides that they should do so. For the law gives the state legislature the power to make

such a borough a home rule borough, at the legislature's option. With this power, it is conceivable that the state could force the borough to assume its full span of powers and duties at any time.

Without such forcing, the borough would normally assume such powers at the choice of the borough assembly.

Since such powers would be automatic in areas outside the cities, the only point remaining would be whether they would apply in the same manner within the cities. Thus, from the beginning the borough assembly of a first class borough would have full control of public health, safety and welfare outside the cities, subject to whatever limitations are placed against first class cities, and they could assume such powers within those cities by the vote of the assembly, concurred in by a majority of the city council.

From this point on, the exercise of powers becomes hazy. According to the law, service area - for fire protection, etc. - can be es-

tablished if the same end can be served by annexation to a city, or the enlargement of

an existing service area. Thus, fire protection of any area might be achieved by (1) annexing to a city, such as Anchorage; or by the enlargement of a public utility district, such as the Spenard PUD; or by setting up a new service area to perform the function.

The actual means would depend upon the definition of terms, legal arguments and all the rest of the routine of the Local Affairs agency and the courts.

At this time, no one can actually guarantee that the Spenard PUD will not be taken over through such a forced annexation. Or that such an annexation would not be extended to include Sand Lake and similar heavily populated areas. The plain and simple truth is, that no one knows. The only way to find out is by living through it.

However, under the second class borough, there is reason to believe that things could, at least, be more easily understood. This borough could come into being with only three powers, schools, planning and zoning and levying and collecting taxes. In order to add to these basic powers, it would be necessary for the assembly to agree that the borough had need for a particular power and petition the local Affairs agency for such power.

Then, the Local Affairs agency would hold hearings and if such powers were deemed necessary, approve it for the borough. In all cases of area wide powers, it would require that the City Council agree to yield such a power to the borough, before the borough would have the power within the city.

In both classes of borough, the five members from the City Council would have the "weighted vote" on all area-wide matters. In short, they could have a collective vote that was capable of outvoting their country cousins. (The formula for arriving at their vote is to add to the total number of representatives from outside the City and divide by the number of city representatives. This gives the weight of the vote. In the case of Dist-

trict eight, each city member has a vote of 1 2/5, each.)

Which class of borough will this area have? You will answer this with your vote on December 3rd. The choice is definitely yours.
