SHOULD THE BOROUGH BE CHAIRED, OR MANAGED? By: Jerry McCutcheon

One of the decisions to be made by you voters in the election December 3rd is whether the borough should be led by a Chairman, elected by the peop or administered by a man ager, chosen by the borough assembly.

Voters in Alaska have had much more experience with the Manager form of administration than they (borouth)

have with the elected executive. Nearly all of this state's first class cities have City Managers and no "major" cities have any form calling for full time mayors, at all. For those who would see the City Manager form in action, they are referred to the city of A chorage where the city charter leaves the Manager in charge of ALL administrative matters. According to the proponents of the Manager form of bornext col)

(borough)

ough government, this type has the advantage of giving the administration the "professional guidance of a trained hear." It is, they say, more efficient and it tends to discourage any form of the spoils system from rearing its ugly head.

They usually add that it also results in a high level of professional qualifications being set for all those who work under the Manager. In short, it results in a "business-like approach

to government."

Opponents quite often agree that any government run by a "trained Manager" is more qualified to give the voters "The business". They say, that since the Manager answers only to the Assembly, he cares little or nothing about the voters at all.

These people who espouse the Borough Chairman, say that this very factor is one of the greatest strengths offered by the Chairman: he

EAGLE RIVER: Beta Sigma Phi, Omicron chapter held its Preferential Tea on November 10th at the home of Louise Balzen.



CHUGIAK: Hearing testa are being done this week at the Eagle River school by seven mothers in the Eagle River Area.

This service is made available through the Chugiak Chapter of the Alaska Crippled Children's Association, in cooperation with Miss Peggy Hamilton, itingerant speech and hearing therapist and the Eagle River PTA.

Miss Hamilton gave instruction to the Eagle River mothers on November 11th and will instruct mothers of children who attend the Chugiak school on November 29th when she comes for her next therapy program.

The testing is being done in an effort to find and treat any hearing problem of a child in school. The parents and the teacher may then talk to Miss Hamilton and decide what is to be done.





does answer to the voters and accordingly, he will take heed of their needs and will pay attention to their wishes.

However, the difference between these two contesting methods goes deeper than the direction in which each might look for guidance.

It also results in basic differences, so far as the power and mthods to be used are concerned.

IF the voters choose the Borough Chairman, then they will have a different form of borough government from that which a Manager would head. For the Manager would merely be the head of the administration, but the Chairman has added powers beyond heading the administrative end.

The Borough Chairman has the power to veto legislation which the Assembly mignupass. When he vetoes any legislation, he needs only the support of any four members of the Assembly to make the veto totally effective.

The Manager would have neither of these powers, nor would he have more than advisory powers in ay matter of policy making.

with these basic differences it is obvious that those people who are active and take part in their government, at all levels, will probably vote for the Chair-

man form. For the Chairman form gives them a greater opportunity to make themselves heard, brings their government closer to their direction. It gives them no guarantee that anything the bor-

ough does will necessarily be to their design, or liking, However, it does give them safeguards and controls which are lacking under the managerial form.

On the opposite side, those who desire the comfort and safety of knowing their government is in trained hands will choose the Manager form.

To many, knowing this removes them from all neccessity of taking active part in government, since they are guaranteed that it will run well because of the professional status of the man chosen as Manager.

In the final analysis, t those who belive that government exists to serve them will choose the Chairman; for this guarantees them that he will answer to them, be guided by them, regardless. Those who believe that the primary need of government is efficiency, (cont page cold) STOLEN CAR RECOVERED





WASHINGTON DC: The Federal Power Commission announced the filing of an application for a preliminary permit for a proposed power project No. 2405, located on the Eagle River, approximately two miles upstream from the Glenn Highway near Anchorage in Chugiak.
