BOROUGH SCHOOL NEEDS DISCUSSED

CHUGIAK: School needs in the Greater Chugiak Area were discussed at a meeting of the Borough Transition Advisory Committee for schools Tuesday evening November 19, 1963.

According to Dale Pierson, member of the Chugiak Advisor School Board, who represents the local area on the transition commit-

(schools) ti., rocar needs by necessity will be one of the first problems to be resolved by newly elected Bohough School Board, which comes into being 1 January 1964.

Some of the problems to be faced are; lack of monies for needed class-room construction, utilization of Chugiak High School, elimination of quonset huts now in use.

The borough transition advisory committee for sohools was established upon

(schools) Zahradnicek, State Commissioner of Education. It is composed of members of the 3 school boards affected, Anchorage, independent School District, City of Girdwood, and Chugiak.

The committee, which is co-chairmanned by Dr. Don DeFoe of the Anchorage Independent School District. and Chuck Smith, Superint-endent of the Chugiak School District, will make recommendations which will be of an advisory nature, and not binding on the borough school board or assembly.





Shear is a Professor of Political Science at the Llaska Methodist University.



THE BOROUGH By Jerry McCutcheon

The Courier requested that in the two previous articles I attempt to give both sides of the problem.

This will be the last article before election and therefore I feel I should state my position since I am a candidate for Borough Chairman.

I am for the 2nd class Borough and the the Borough Chairman plan without reservations, and this is why.

January 1st we will have the mandatory Borough Act.

This Borough may live but a short 8 months. The probability that the mandatory Borough will re repealed by the referendum is 50/50 .

Should the Borough continue to live, it will be fought with transitional and functional problems. A prudent person being cognizant of these facts must come to the conclusion we will have to proceed slowly on an economically sound and realistic basis and not upon the "grand plan" that some of the other Borough candidates have proposed.

"Stage one" ... until the Borough referendum is settled, the Borough Assembly should pass a resolution allowing the Anchorage Independent School District, the Spenard Public Utility Distrist, and the City of Anchorage to carry on their functions without interruption. " Stage Two", should be one of transition, rather than function.

1. Planning and Zoning 2. Taxation and Collection of which all three agencies will be involved. The personnel of these three agencies must be intergrated.



This year four busses make this fifty mile round trip each day at considerable expense to the taxpayers of all Alaska. The people of Alaska agreed the problem existed and thereby passed the Bond issue for the construction of the CHUGIAK HICH SCHOOL. MILLS OUTLINES SOLUTIONS TO HIGH SCHOOL OUESTION

CHUGIAK: Ralph Mills, candidate to the borough school board from the Greater Chugiak Area made the following statement in reply to questions concerning rumored plans to convert Churiak High School, now under construction to a junior high school.

"During the past two weeks, there have been a number of remors circulating in the Chugiak area concerning the future of the new Chugiak High School in the Borough school system.

I am sure that these rumors are the result of misinterpretation of statements in the press and irresponsible statements by a few people who do not possess all of the facts.

I wish to state some of the facts concerning our new high school and my views concerning its effective use in the new borough school system.

The Chugiak High School is scheduled to be completed in time for the opening of the school term in September, 1964. It will have tlassroom space for 300 students and initially the enrollment is expected to be slightly less than this num-

plum of our new school cannot possibly be as broad as the curriculum presently available in the two Anchorage High Schools.

This fact is of great concern to our young people who now attend Anchorage High Schools and their parents.

Some of these students would not be able to complete their planned courses of study at the new Chugiak High School because of the necessarily narrower curriculum and they and their parents are understandably concerned about this problem.

THIS DOES NOT MEAN THAT THE CHUGIAK HIGH SCHOOL IS NOT NEEDED AND SHOULD NOT BE USED FOR THE PURPOSE FOR WHICH IT WAS CONSTRUCT-

As the enrollment of the Chugiak High School increases, the number of courses offered will also increase. Further, our younger students who are now in grade school and junior high schcol have the opportunity to plan their studies around subjects offered at the new high school and, of course, many of our high school students who have not taken specialized courses, would not be harmed by attending the smaller school.

chorage aign school. students could be selected by the counselors at East based on an analysis of their course of study. School transportation would need to be provided.

The second possible solution which has been suggested is that the Chugiak High School be opened initially with grades 7,8,9 and possibly 10, and with one grade to be added each year until the complete senior high school is established.

These are several advantages of this plan. Our high school students would be permitted to complete their studies around the courses offered at the new high school, and would be able to graduate from the Chugiak High School.

By temporarily establishing the 7th and 8th grades in the new school, we would reduce the overcrowding that new exists , in the Chugiak grade school and will probably exist in the Eagle River Grade school next year.


