SCHOOL BUS BEHAVIOR

CHUGIAK: Reports of unruly behavior on Chugiak grade school buses has resulted in a policy of stricter bus discipline, according to Chugiak School Principal Bill Benyish.

Benyish stated that copies of school bus regulations have been sent home with all children, and parents are advised that the privilege of riding the school bus can be revoked if the rules are not observed.

Benyish also stated that bus monitors are to be appointed, and they will turn names of students who misbehave over to him for disciplinary action.

He also said that bus drivers have been instructed not to pick students up at stops other

With an election coming up, it is anticipated there will be an unusual demand for advertising space within the next month.

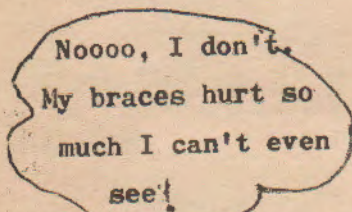

Nora Ekstedt followed her husband Jim around the world, wherever his work as telephone engineer led him.

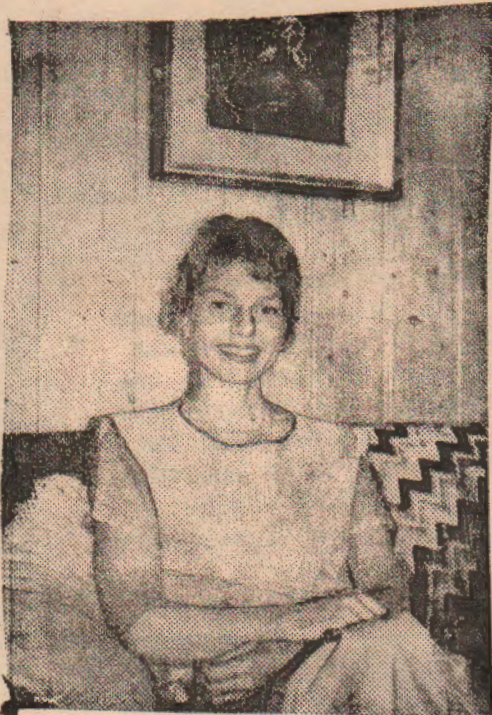
When they came to Alaska in 1960, it was at their own request, for like so many of us, they had always wanted to see the 49th State.

Damage to McDaniels 1954 Dodge pick-up was estimated at \$25. To the Volvo, \$100.

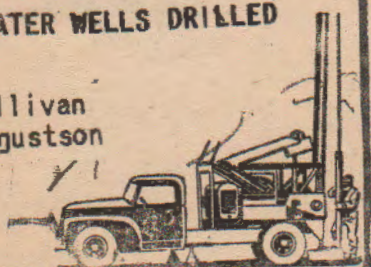
McDaniel was cited for driving too fast for conditions.

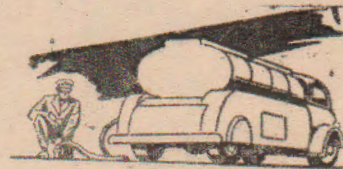

TRANSITION FROM STATE SCHOOLS TO BOROUGH By Chuck Smith Superintendent, Chugiak School System

The transition from State to borough school should cause few difficulties in the actual function of our schools.

There will be some changes, however, mostly in personnel procedures and supply acquisitions.

In the past our schools have been administered directly by the Commissioner of Education in Juneau.

This authority will soon be taken over by the new borough school board.

It is reasonable to assume that there will be few, if any changes during the present school year.

It is also reasonable to assume the new borough board will be in complete authority this coming September when school convenes.

When the new board takes command, our schools will be subject to the rules and regulations set forth by this group.

The local advisory school board will not continue to function after the borough board will be elected.

The administrators and officials of the affected areas are now holding conferences with the hopes that all possible transition rough spots will be

Arnold said the only persons not eligible for the contest are members of the Alaska State Centennial Commission, the Department of Economic Development and Planning, within which the Commission is located and members of their families.

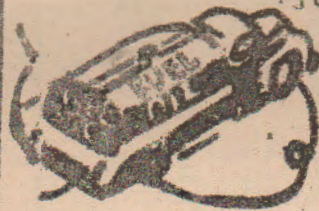

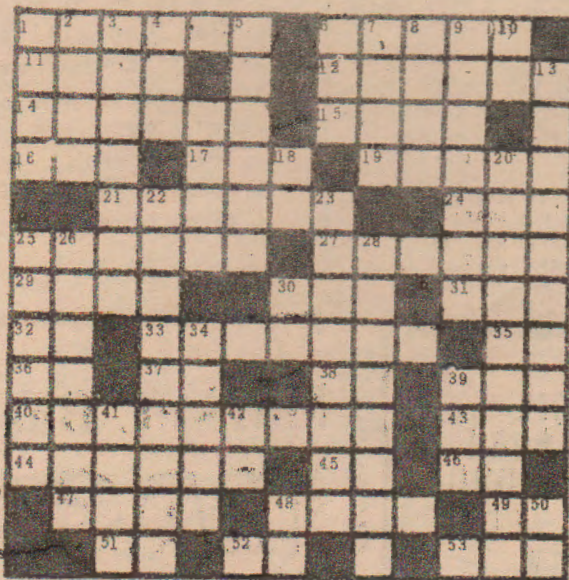

COST OF EKLUTNA PROJECT ANNOUNCED

WASHINGTON DC. Final cost allocation of the Eklutna power project was announced October 18 by the Federal Power Commission.

The Commission stated that 100 percent of the projects costs were allocable to power, such costs being on June 30, 1962, \$32,767,216.

The 1950 Ace authorizing the construction, operation and maintenance of the Eklutna project stated that the capital investment in the project would be allocated among each unit of the project.

In making its announcement last wee, the FPC stated that the "reference to an allocation to each unit of the project appears to come from predecessor bills relating to this project in which a development including additional units and the use of water resources for several purposes was contemplated."

As constructed, all of the facilities of the Eklutna project are utilized in the production of power, the development of other uses never having been accomplished.

The FPC stated that "this allocation shall be used for amortization of the capital investment in the project."

In 1954, while the project was still under construction, the allocable cost was determined to be \$30,700,000 for the purposes of amortization, pending submission of final cost data.

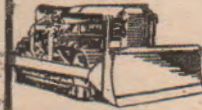

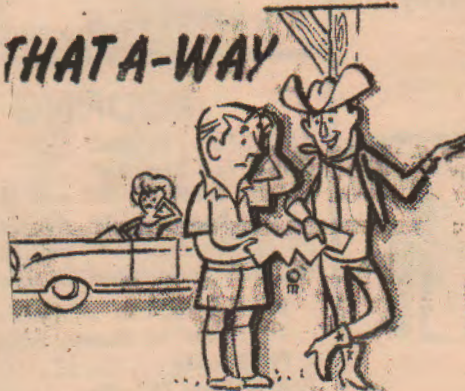
