PETITION TO SAVE HIGH SCHOOL CIRCULATED

CHUGIAK: The concern of many local citizens over the possibility that the Chugiak High School may he converted to a Junior High under the borough school systemless resulted in a petition being circulated throughout the community.

This petition states that those signing it do not favor converting the school to a Junior High School and states several reasons; among ATTEMPT TO ORGANIZE LOCAL CAP SQUADRON

CHUGIAK: Bob Thomas of Eagle River, a member of the Ancborage Civil Air Patrol Squadron is attempting to determine if enough interested persons can be found in the Greater Chugik Area to organize a local squadron.

Thomas address his remarks primarily to boys and girls age 14 through 20. He says: ... "this is a survey. If there are enough interested persons a CAP squadron could be organized in the Greater Chugiak Area. It will consist of not less than

CHUGIAK: Glenn Briggs was the apparent victor in Section one, with all but two precincts reporting.

Although Willis outpointed Briggs in both of the local voting precincts, the overall vote throughout the borough area showed Briggs ahead by a vote of 1106 to Willis's 998.

The two precincts that had not yet reported were Girdwood and Portage. These two precincts at the last borough election in September had a total combined vote of only 49, which would not be enough to change the result according to the borough election supervisor.

The total number of votes cast in the election (not counting the two unreported precincts were 6820.

The vote indicated the choise was for a second class borough, with a borough chariman at the head.

John Asplund was the aparent victor in the chairman race. All incumbent members of the Anchorage independent school boardwere elected to the borough school board.

The local vote was light, probably caused by the icy roads which kept many of the voters at home.

Total vote in the Chugiak voting precinct was 274, and was as follows:



The first three days of the opening were very successful, according to manager Don MacFarlane.


