

ORAL POLIO CLINIC OPEN MONDAY

SCHEDULED

CHUGIAK: Clinics for the administering of Oral Polio Vaccine have been scheduled at both the Chugiak and Eagle River Schools beginning January 27th.

Dr. Marshall Simpson, local physician in charge of the clinics met with representatives of both the Chugiak and Eagle River PTAs last Monday to explain how the clinics would operate.

The vaccine will be administered to any and all persons desiring it with no age limitations.

Dr. Sumpson explained that there would be a charge of \$1.00 for a series of three "drinks". The series may be purchased in coupon form, and books of three coupons may not be split, that is each member of a family must have his own coupon book.

ORAL VACCINE

Following are some of the questions that you may have heen asking about the new oral polio vaccine and their answers.

Q. What is the advantage of the oral vaccine over other types?

A. It is easier to administer, being taken by mouth. It provides indefinite immunity, unlike the Salk vaccine which must be renewed.

Q: How does it work?

A. It is swallowed, and builds up antibodies in the digestive tract.

Q: How long will it last?

A. It is a long term vaccine, similar to the smallpox vaccine. (It is believed by some to offer permanent immunity.)

Q: How long after taking vaccine does it become effective?

A: Two to three weeks.

Q: Can a person get polio as a result of tak-ing the vaccine?

Q: Who is eligible?


A: Everyone including infants.

Q: What about those who have already received polio shots.

A: They should take the oral series anyway.

Q: Suppose all but one member of a family should take the series, could he become immune?

A: Perhaps partial immunity, but everyone should get the vaccine.





COOK FOR JANUARY SHARON WOMAC

The Womac children urged their mother to submit the following recipe when they learned that she was to be cook of the month.

DAISY COFFEE CAKE

1 pkg compressed yeast 14 cup warm water % cup milk % cup sugar

1 tsp salt

2 ths shortening

2½ Cups sifted flour (approx.)

1 egg 2 tbs melted butter or oleo

% cup cinnamon sugar

SOFTEN yeast in water SCALD milk

ADD sugar, salt and shortening COOL to lukewarm ADD flour to make thick batter MIX well ADD softened yeast and egg BEAT well ADD additional flour (enough to make soft dough) TURN out on lightly

floured board KNEAD until smooth & satiny

PLACE in greased bowl COVER and let raise in warm place until double in balk (about 1½ hrs.) (next col) (cook of the month

PUNCH DOWN

ALLOW to "rest" for 10 minutes ROLL out to square about % inch thick BRUSH with butter or oles SPRINKLE with cinnamon sugar FOLD over BRUSH with butter or SPRINKLE with cinnamon sugar FOLD again ROLL to circle about 12 inches in diameter PLACE on greased baking sheet CUT with scissors or a sharp knife to within l inch of center making 16 pie shaped pieces TURN each over 2 or 3 times to make twists ALLOW to raise until doubled (about 45 min.) BAKE in mod. oven 350° for about 20 min. FROST with confectioners sugar while warm.

> STYLE SHOW DATE SET


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BIRCHWOOD: The date for the annual style show, sponsored by the Chugiak Ladies Club, had been set for March 30%.

Simpson urged that everyone take advantage of this program, as there are no plans to hold any additional clinics, or, at this time, to make the vaccine available at doctors offices. In the event that the vaccine should become available at doctors offices, Simpson said, it would be much more expensive than the present one dollar charge.

He explained that everyone should have the vaccine, whether they have been innoculated with the Salkvaccine or not.

Dates for the series are January 27th, March 10th and April 21st, at both schools.

The clinics will open at 12 noon and last until 6pm.

A physician will be in attendance and the vaccine will be administered by a nurse, assisted by PTA volunteers.

Then followed the wild chase toward Anchorage at high speed.

The State trooper stated that he had just radioed ahead for a road block at the Glenn Highway at Muldoon Road when the car left the road at mile 9, plowed thirty yards through the snow bank, came back on to the highway, only to go off the road on the opposite side, where it came to rest in the snow.

Both youths jumped out of the car and ran off into the woods. One of the boys was immediately apprehended by the State Trooper, and the other was recognized four hours later when he attempted to use a phone at the Ft. Richardson Military Police Headquarters.

The incident took place last Friday at 9:34pm.
The boys admitted to having taken the car from the lot at McBride motors in Anchorage. They said they had taken the car on Wednesday, but had hidden it until the Friday joy-ride.

It was also learned that a third companion of the two boys, a 17 year old Eagle River youth had been picked up earlier that

evening in Anchorage for having taken a Chevrolet ElCamino. That vehicle had been recognized at Yeagers Service by the owner who summoned City Police and the boy was taken into custody.


