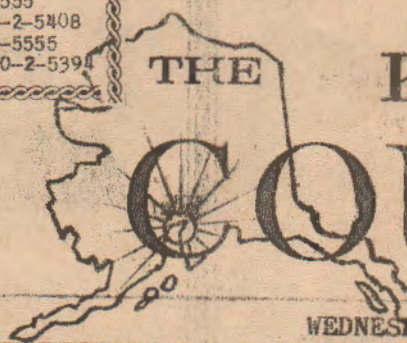

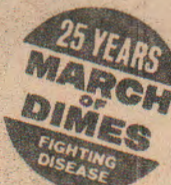
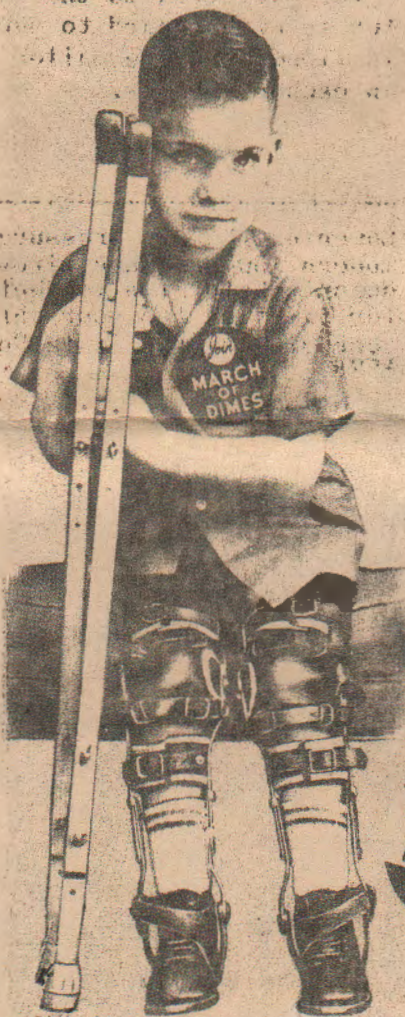
A list of the mothers who will be marching in the above mentioned districts will be published next week.

FIRE LEVELS BIRCHWOOD HOME

BIRCHWOOD: Fire completely destroyed a Birchwood home, while the owners were vacationing in New Mexico.

The fire broke out around 10:15pm on Friday, December 28th at the Grant H. Hutchison home on Birchwood Road.

The fire was discovered by William Garrison, who lives across the road from the Hutchison residence.

Garrison called the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company, but the house was too much involved in flame at that time for them to do much but attempt to cool it off.

The house was unoccupied at the time the fire broke out, but was inhabited (cont page 7 col 3)

BIRCHWOOD: Charges for lease of land on which aircraft are tied-down are now in effect at the Birchwood Arisstrip and at all other State owned airports.

Notices had been placed in all airplanes at the strip to the effect that as of November 11th, 1962 they were in trespass if they were using State Airport lands or facilities without being covered by a written lease or permit from the Division of Aviation.

The notice also stated that beginning with January 2nd, 1963, the regulations would be enforced and penalties applied.

Penalties perscribed for failure to comply consist of aircraft being removed and impounded by the State, and when so removed and impounded, such property to be redeemed by the owner, must be accompanied by payment of charges for costs of removal plus storage charges of \$1.00 per day.

Cost of leases are based on rate of the square footage per airplane, the average for a light plane being estimated at fifty square foot.

Rates increase with facilities available, i.e., length of runway, facilities available, lights etc.

The rates at Birchwood for the average light plane would prob- (cont page 7 col 1)

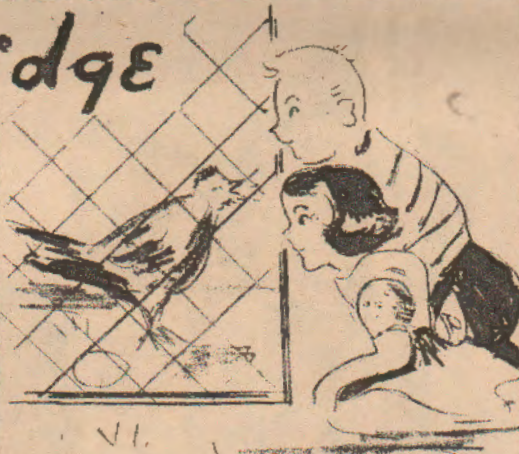

We immediately discovered that our cook for January and our cook for December had several things in common. Both are former Utah farm girls, both have Air Force husbands, and both love Alaska and plan to make Chugiak their permanent home.

Sharon Womac first came to Alaska in 1953, when she and her husband Jay and their then two children made their home in Mt. View. Even then, Sharon was much taken by the rural beauty of the Chugiak community and begged her husband to purchase some land there.

In 1957 they were rotated to Florida, where they spent two and a half years longing for the cool Alaskan climate.

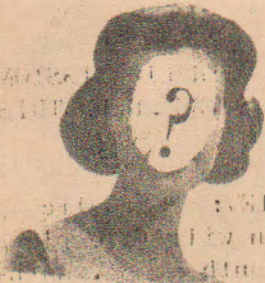

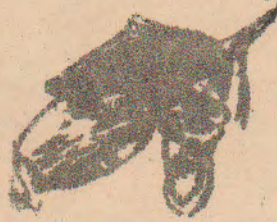

The classes are held at 9am. on Saturdays at the Chugiak Health Center across from the Chugiak School.

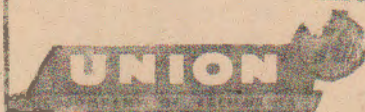

ably be around fifty dollars

At Palmer Airport the charge per average light plane would probably be seventy five dollars.

Users of the Palmer Airport last Friday called a meeting to protest some of the aspects of the new law.

The one aspect most strongly objected to was the provision in the law as stated in a letter from Eugene Roguska, Director of the Division of Aviation, which stated that owners of aircraft who kept their planes on their own property would be charged fees if their land was adjacent to the State Airport and they used the airport facilities.

This affects numerous individuals and business establishments at the Palmer Airport. One operator at Palmer had already started legal proceedings to protest this latter ruling.

State Senator Brad Phillips attended the Palmer meeting in attempt to resolve the differences. (next col.)

(Airport Charges)
Another item which the Palmer Airmen protested was the additional charge of 1/2 cent per year per square foot based on the fact that the Palmer Airport was equipped with lights.

According to the Palmer Airmen, these lights had been installed by the Palmer Airmans Association at their own expense and with their own labor and that the light bill was being paid by the Palmer Airmen's Association.

Senator Phillips stated that he would arrange for representatives of the Airmens Association to meet with Roguska to discuss the law.

MAIL TRUCK IN WRECK

EKLUTNA: The Mail Truck which carries the mail from Anchorage to Palmer, was wrecked Monday, December 31st at mile 24.

Raph Wood, driver of the Truck stated that he had just topped a rise and discovered a slow moving car ahead of him.

Wood was unable to stop on the icy road and swerved to miss the car striking the road bank.

The impace broke the van of the truck from the body, but inflicted no other damage.

Wood sent for another truck and the mail went through on schedule, although several hours late.

WORD ON SCHOOL FURNITURE

EAGLE RIVER: Dale Pierson, President of the Eagle River PTA stated that he had received a eply from the acting Commissioner of Education regarding the furniture for the Eagle River School addition.

Pierson has wired Isaacs when it became apparent that the furniture for the new addition had not been ordered and would not be on hand for the scheduled opening on January 2nd.

Pierson said that he was informed that the furniture would not be available until the end of January.



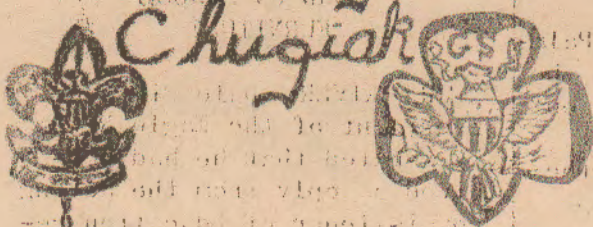

This is the number to call for either ambulance service or for fires located in the area served by the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company.

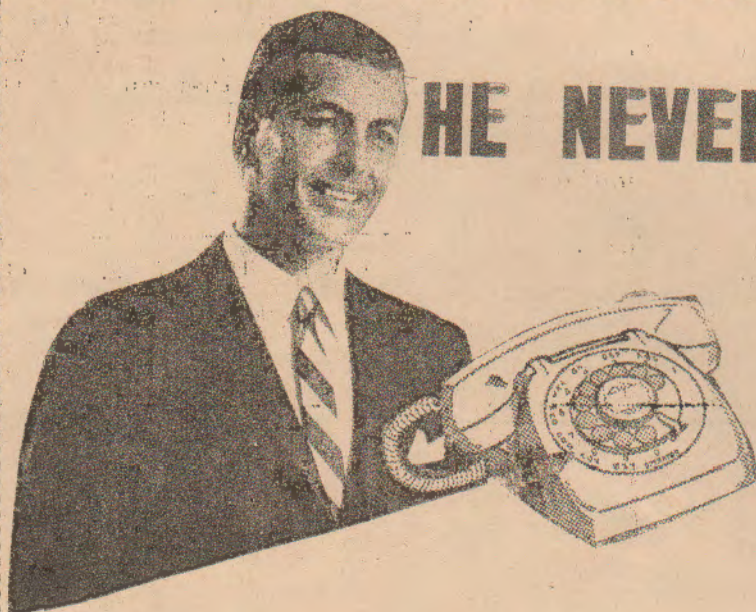
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IDEAL NEW YEARS EVE

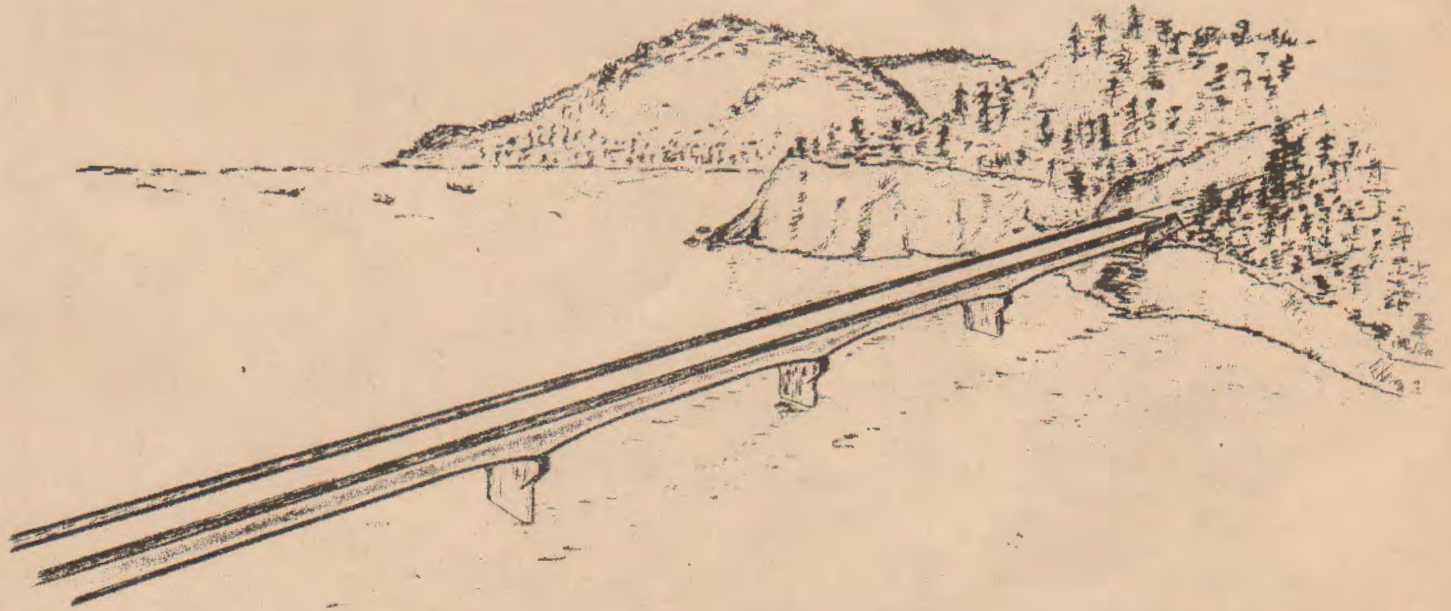

This is an engineer's sketch of a section of the proposed 1,050-foot girder bridge over the Susitna River near Sunshine located approximately 100 miles north of Anchorage to be advertised for bid next week.

JUNEAU: Highways Commissioner D.A. McKinnen announced that advertising for bids began this week on two major highway and bridge projects expected to cost nearly \$5,000,000. (Next col.)

One of the projects, a 5.7 mile job between Sunshine and the west bank of the Susitna River, includes a 1,050-foot continuous steel girder bridge over the susitna River--the longest of its type in Alaska

The bridge will span a wide portion of the river, which, although not in the same category as the "Mighty Yukon", has a drainage area above the bridge site of some 11,000 square miles producing currents of more than eight miles an hr.

This project is another in a series that will eventually link Anchorage to Mt. McKinley National Park through the Susitna and Chulitna River Valleys.

It will feature a 30 foot roadway with standard 3-foot railings allowing travelers an open view of the scenic wilderness valley.

Another project on which advertising will begin is a 20-mile section of the Chena Hot Springs Road north of Fairbanks.

It includes grading, drainage and placement of bituminous surface treatment and construction of two steel girder bridges over the Little Chena River and Jenny M. Creek.

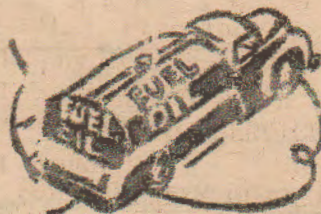
