CHUGIAK: The success of the local Oral Polio Clinic is threatened by lack of sufficient Registered Nurses to administer the vaccine.

Mrs. Roger Jonrowe, cochairman for the effort has requested that any Registered Nurses that may be living in quiet retirement in the community, come forth and offer their services for this vital cause.

Mrs. Jonrowe may be contacted at the Chugiak Post Office, phone HO-2-5590.

A minimum of two nurses will be required at each of the two schools where the clinics are scheduled.





CHURCH TO HOLD MOTHER DAUGHTER BANQUET

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

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Anchorage Area Physicians are sponsoring the Sabin Oral Sundays Program to save You and Yours from Polio!

YOUR DOCTOR SAYS: "Everyone should take Sabin Oral Vaccine—from new born children up to our eldest citizens. Even if you and your family have had the Salk shots you should take the oral vaccine. Sabin Oral Vaccine gives lasting protection against all three types of paralytic polio, and further will prevent your being a 'carrier' of the disease, thus endangering others.

WHAT IS THE VACCINE?—It is a weakened virus developed by Dr. Sabin and others with the support of the U. S. Public Health Service, The National Foundation, and others. It is comparable to the vaccine developed from Smallpox virus, where the word vaccination was first used. Like vaccination, successful immunization results in hardy resistance to infection, in this case from polio virus. With polio, however, which really consists of 3 distinct but similar diseases, 3 immunizations are necessary.

IS THE VACCINE SAFE?—Considerable publicity has been given to a few cases of polio considered to be derived from Type III Oral Polio Vaccine. In considering the many millions of doses given, however, the risk of acquiring polio is almost infintesimal, and the U. S. Public Health Service after study, is now recommending the community wide use of Types I and II for all people and Types III for children and young adults.

WHY TAKE SABIN ORAL VACCINE?—The taking of the oral vaccine differs from the Salk vaccine in producing an "active" immunity, one that is much more complete and long lasting. This means that persons exposed to polio virus not only will be protected from serious nervous system damage . . . but will not even acquire the disease in any form and most importantly cannot become carriers of the disease and infect other susceptible people whom they may contact. Thus in a community well immunized with the Sabin Oral Vaccine, the lack of sufficient number of susceptible persons will cause the disappearance of all polio virus. In this way even the few unimmunized people will be protected. But to achieve this goal approximately 80% of the entire population must receive vaccine.

WILL THIS BE AN ANNUAL PROGRAM?— No! This program will not be repeated. Once the community has been immunized there will be no need for an area wide program. New babies and arrivals in the community can be immunized at their family physician's office, hospital, or elsewhere.

SHOULD I TAKE THE ORAL VACCINE EVEN THOUGH I HAVE TAKEN THE SALK SHOT? Yes. As outlined above, the immunity from the Sabin vaccine is not only stronger and longer lasting but of a different type than that from the Salk vaccine. It not only prevents serious complications of polio, but actually prevents one's becoming infected and being a carrier of this serious disease and possibly endangering others.

WHY THE S.O.S. POLIO PROGRAM NOW?— Although polio has been greatly reduced, it is still a continuous threat to our life and health. A mass S.O.S. polio program will wipe out the threat. It is important that full community wide participation at one time be obtained, and many groups interested in community health are uniting to carry out this vital program.

WHERE AND WHEN CAN YOU GET THE SABIN ORAL VACCINE? — Feeding stations will be set up in all elementary schools and in some other convenient community locations in the Anchorage area. These addresses will be published and broadcast. The vaccine will be distributed on Sundays, Type I on January 27, Type II on March 10th, and Type III on April 21st, from noon until 8 p.m. Each of these three doses gives a lasting protection against one of the three types of poliomyelitis. It will take only a few minutes to get your cup of Sabin vaccine, which has a pleasant taste something like cherry soda. JANUARY 2.14, 1963


