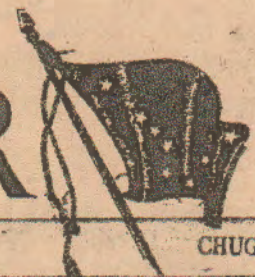

ICY ROADS CAUSE WRECKS

CHUGIAK: Slippery roads caused two accidents in the Chugiak Area last week, both involving military vehicles.

On Friday, at approximately 1:45pm, a State owned dump truck skidded out of control and collided with an army tow truck which was hauling a military vehicle out of the ditch at mile 19.

The dump truck had been towing a two-wheeled trailer loaded with a small tracked drilling rig. The trailer jackknifed when the driver of the truck applied the brakes in an attempt to miss the other vehicle.

Damage to the military vehicle was estimated at \$500. The State truck was undamaged, but the drilling rig sustained an estimated \$200 damage.

The second accident occurred on Saturday at 6:55am, when a military cargo truck, towing a two wheeled trailer skidded out of control on the Eagle River Hill and sideswiped a 1955 Chevrolet pickup truck driven by John E. Morden of the Eagle River Trailer Court.

Estimated damage was \$50 to the military vehicle and \$1,000 to the pickup.

POLIO CLINICS WELL ATTENDED

CHUGIAK: The Oral Polio Clinics in the Greater Chugiak Area were well attended with a total of 1819 persons attending. Of this figure 972 received their immunization at the Eagle River School, and 847 at the Chugiak School.

This did not include the large percentage of residents who are in the military and received their vaccine free of charge at the bases.

Assisting Dr. Simpson in conducting the clinics, were Dr. Sperry and Dr. Voght of the U.S. Public Health Service.

Local registered nurses who administered the vaccine were Mrs. Lynn Scott and Mrs. Pegel who worked

VACCINE STILL AVAILABLE

EAGLE RIVER: Dr. Marshall Simpson of Eagle River announced that he still has a limited supply of the Sab-in Oral Polio vaccine available for those who may have missed the clinic on Sunday.

Dr. Simpson explained that the vaccine will be good until this Sunday, after which it must be discarded.

Anyone desiring immunization is directed to come to Dr. Simpson's Eagle River office during the time that he conducts his regular office hours.

Through the years there have been many different types of campaigns held in this area, but none was ever received with such enthusiasm and whole-hearted support.

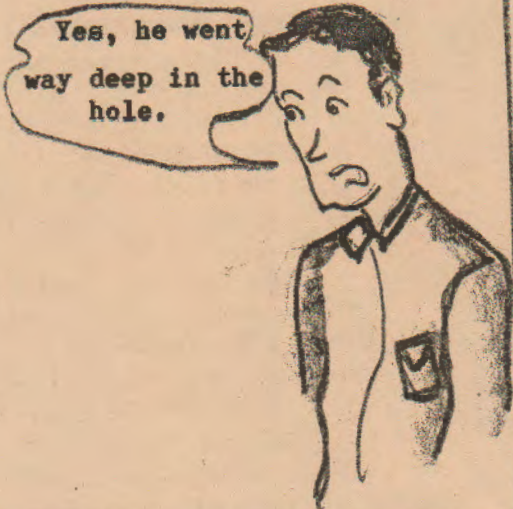
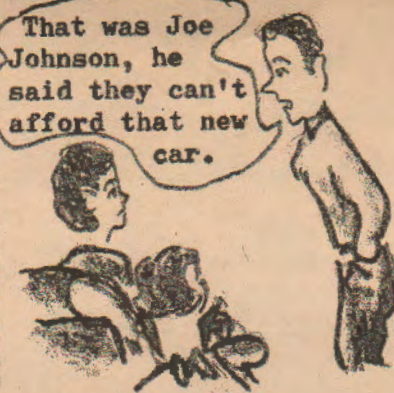

COOK OF THE MONTH

COOK FOR JANUARY
SHARON WOMAC

Many of us are forced to admit that when it comes to a flaky tender pie-crust, we can never be sure of the results. Sharon offers to share this recipe which she says never fails.

WATER WHIP PIE CRUST

- 3/4 cup homogenized shortening
- 3/4 cup boiling water
- 1 tbs milk
- 2 cups sifted flour
- 1 tsp salt

PLACE shortening in medium sized mixing bowl

ADD boiling water and milk

BREAK up shortening with fork

BEAT rapidly until smooth and thick and holds soft peaks.

ADD sifted flour and salt

STIR together till mixture cleans bowl and sticks together.

PICK UP and work into smooth dough

ROLL OUT between waxed paper

FILL with favorite filling

BAKE accordingly

**For pastry shells only

PRICK shell all over

BAKE at 450° 14-19 min.

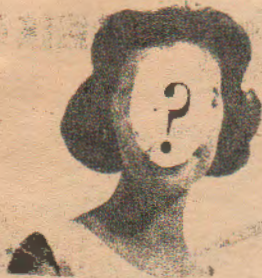

JUNEAU: The Alaska Ferry System, which provides a brand new motor route to the 49th State is shown below in the smaller insert, and by dots in the larger map.

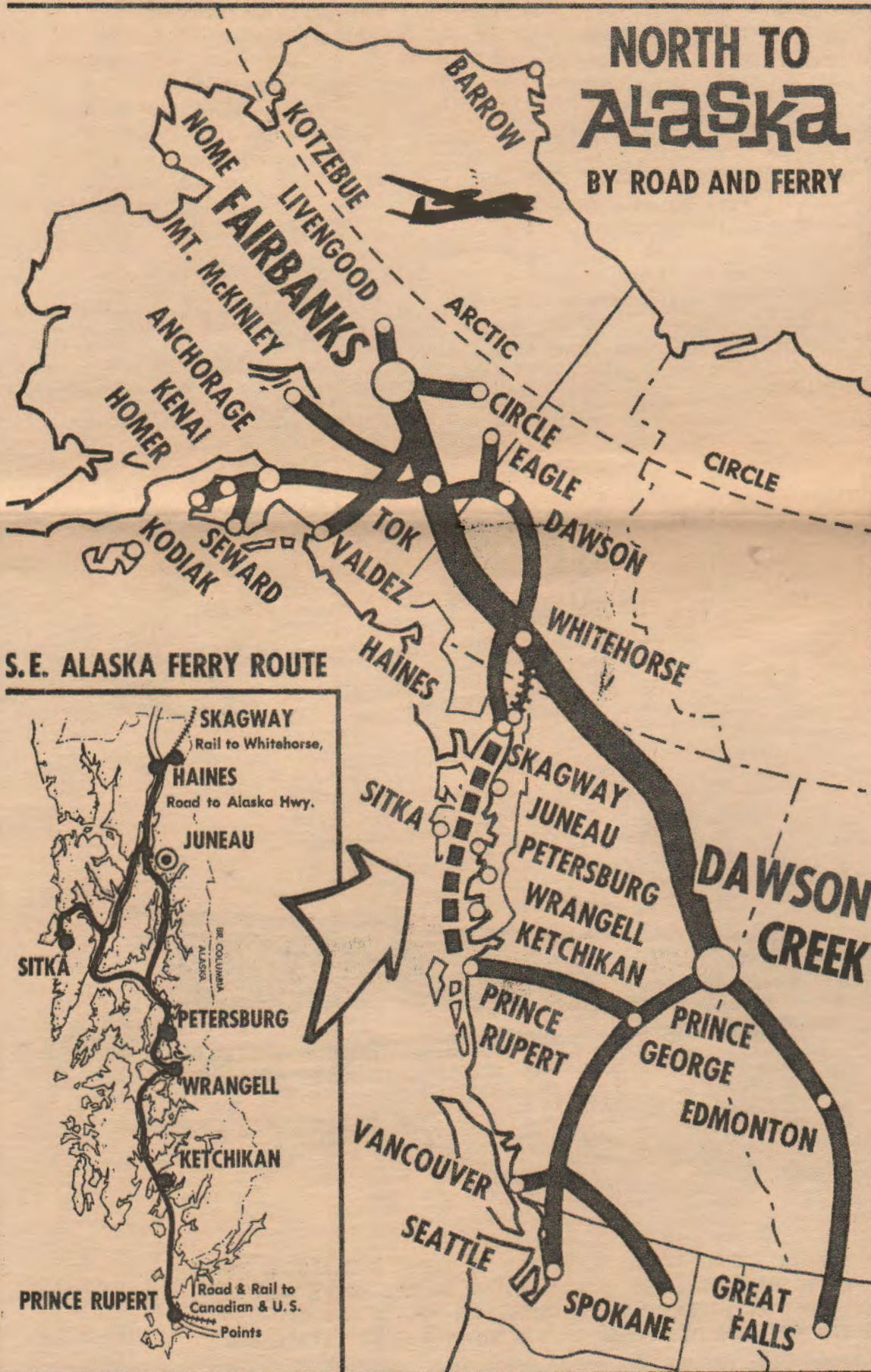
The Alaska (Alcan) Highway is shown with a heavy dark line.

State Trooper Ken Dubber of Eagle River has returned from an emergency visit to Paradise California.

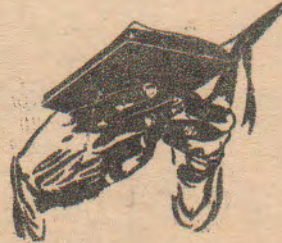

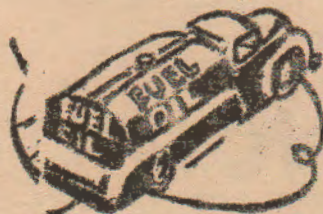
