EKLUTNA: Marv Early of Chugiak played in important role following a shooting accident last Sunday involving an Anchorage youth.

The boy, 12 year old Terry Nix of the Muldoon Road area was accidentally shot in the abdomen with a 22 rifle by a companion.

Young Nix, along with two brothers, David Cureton (10) and Forrest Cureton (12) had gone with the latter's step-grandfather to the gravel pit at mile 27 to do some target practicing.

While the boys were lined up with their rifles, they thought they heard a small animal in the woods behind them and turned to look.

When they could see nothing, they turned back, and while turning one of the Cureton boys gun accidentally discharged, striking young Nix.

The boys grandfather, Harold H. Kirk while attempting to get his pick-up turned around to take the boy to the hospital became stuck in the snow.

He flagged down Early who was driving by, and the latter took the boy to Providence Hospital where he is in satisfactory condition.

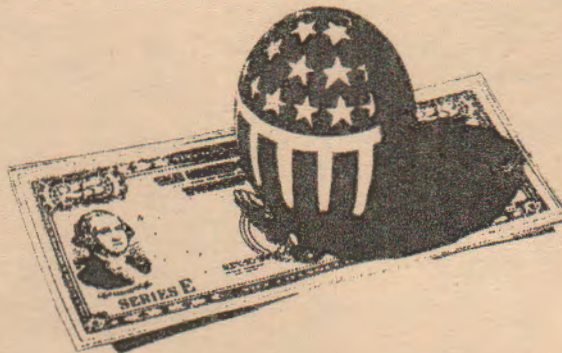

ANCHORAGE: An area chairman for the Greater Chugiak Area will soon be appointed to head the 1963 Freedom Bond Drive, according to Mrs. Helen M. Fischer, recently appointed State Director.

Final preparations are underway for this week's formal opening in Anchorage of the Treasury Department's Alaska State Office of the U.S. Savings Bond Division.

Every state in the union has had a state office since World War II, with the exception of Alaska and Hawaii.

A few years ago the Hawaiian office was set up and the establishment of the Alaska office completes the 50 state offices.

EAGLE RIVER: Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Fly of Eagle River reported the theft of between \$3,000 and \$4,000 worth of building materials and electrical and plumbing fixtures from two homes which they are building on the Eagle River Loop Road.

Mrs. Fly stated that they believe the theft took place between February 3rd and 5th. She said that the contractor had visited the building site on Sunday, February 3rd, and at that time nothing appeared to be missing. On Tuesday, February 5th, when he revisited the site, it appeared that someone had backed a truck in and removed the items.

Mrs. Fly said that among things that were taken were two sets of sliding thermopane patio doors, two sets of combination exterior and storm doors, a large quantity of plywood some of it finished and electrical plumbing fixtures and fittings.

Both of the homes which the Flys are building are of the prefabricated variety.

No one had noticed any suspicious activity. State police have been called in and are investigating.

Mr. and Mrs. Fly announced that they are offering a reward for information leading to the recovery of the items.

We regret to announce that our cook for February had to go outside on an emergency trip due to the death of her mother. However, we have a very able substitute in the person of her 15 year old daughter Lora Lee, who has taken over the responsibility of cooking at the Pierson home in her mothers absence.

This week Lora Lee gives us the recipe for a delightful little spicy cookie that her mother had taught her to make.

PFEFFERNEUSE

COMBINE:

- 1 1/2 cups honey or light syrup
- 2 cups shortening

BOIL until bubbly in large kettle

DISSOLVE 1 tbs soda in vinegar

ADD to boiling syrup
STIR hard to beat out bubbles

COOL

ADD 3 eggs, well beaten
SIFT together

- 1 cup & 2 tbs sugar
 - 1 1/2 tsp cloves
 - 2 tsp cinnamon

- 1 tsp nutmeg
 - 1 1/2 tsp allspice
 - 1 tsp salt
 - 10 cups sifted flour
- MIX well with syrup mixture
ROLL out about 1/4 inch thick
CUT with cookie cutter
BRUSH tops with mixture of
1 beaten egg white
1 tbs water
BAKE from 5 to 7 minutes
at 350°.

Herman Nelson Heater which was being used to heat the place.

Mrs. Buxton had attempted to relight the heater which thereupon became overheated and caused the plastic covered greenhouse to catch fire.

Members of the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company assisted by members of the Eagle River Fire Company and the State Police responded, and doused the fire by shoveling snow on it.

The Fire truck was unable to make it up the steep hill to the Buxton residence.

Damage was estimated at \$1,000. Approximately 36 feet of the 80 foot building remains standing. The loss included many young seedling plants.

The fire broke out at about 4:30am. The loss was not covered by insurance.

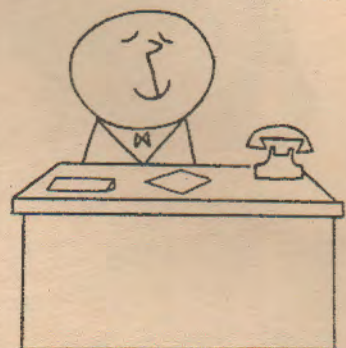

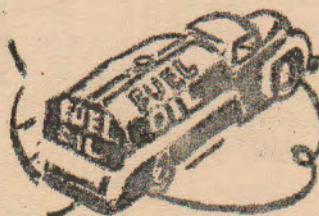
