EAGLE RIVER HOME BURNS

EAGLE RIVER: An unoccupied home, belonging to Earl Monroe of Eagle River was completely destroyed by fire on February 17th.

The fire was discovered by Mel Oliver, bar-tender at the 300 Room, who notified state police.

Both the Chugiak and Eagle River Fire Companies responded, but the fire had been burning for approximately one hour hefore it was discovered, and had progressed to far for it to be extinguished.

The loss was estimated at \$19,500. Although the house was unoccupied at

LOCAL MAN IS OLDEST FIFTY MILER

CHUGIAK: The oldest person to complete the fifty mile hike from Palmer to Anchorage last Monday, was Paul Mitchell, 64 of Old Chugiak.

Mitchell was one of the 72 out of a field of 482 who completed the fifty miles.

Mitchell, who is retired has lived on his homestead at mile 18 since 1949. He came to Alaska in 1945. Although he owns a car, Mitchell does a great deal of walking, and was in good shape for the hike.

He is presently suffering from a slight infection resulting from hlisters received during the hike.

PALMER: The Matanuska Telephone Association, Inc. announced this week that toll-free service to Anchorage from the Greater Chugiak area will be initiated in June of this year.

This service will become available when the new exchange at Eagle River is placed in operation, and the outside plant facilities for the Greater Chugiak Area are completed.

To originate a call to the Anchorage area, a single digit. (3) will be dialed. The Anchorage ACS operator will answer "number please". The number to be called must then be given to the operator, and she in turn will dial it. The operator will not wait on the line after she has dialed the number.

The calling party will hear a ringing signal and when the called party answers, then the conversation may be started.

If the called party does not answer, or a busy signal is heard, the caller will hang up and place the call later.

The same proceedure will be followed for calls to Elmendorf, Ft. Richardson, or Alaska Railroad phones.

When the City of Anchorage completes their planned telephone expansion program in about two years direct dialing, without the aid of an operator will be initiated.

clean.


VFW AUXILIARY SEEKS NEW MEMBERS




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COMMUNITY BASKETBALL SCORES



areas where existing indenendent school districts are scheduled to go out of existence on July 1, 1963, or where continued operation of State-operated schools cannot be justified.

Me said the bill was submitted at the request of the Alaska board of Education and resulted from a study requested by the Legislature last year.

The study recognized that some provision must be made for a continuation of local school functions after July 1, 1963, if no locally initiated government is organized to succeed to the functions of independent and incorporated school districts in areas where school districts are now in existence.

Under the proposed legitlation, incorporation proceedings would be initiated by the Board of Education.

The Local Affairs Agency would study the proposed area to determine whether it meets standards for borough incorporation and the Local boundary Commission would not hearings in the area and prepare a proposal for incorporation of a second class borough.

Proposals would be submitted to the Legislature and would be considered approved if specific action disapproving them has not been taken within 45 days or by the end of the session.

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
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
