PLANS FOR CHUGIAK HIGH SCHOOL REVEALED

EAGLE RIVER: Drawings for the new Chugiak High School were viewed yesterday at a meeting held at the Eagle River School.

Members of the Chugiak Advisory School Board, along with Chuck Smith, superintendent and Don Harmon and Conrad Kruse school principals met with Mr. George Fuller, Chief architect for the Department of Public Works, Mr. George Hayes from the Anchorage Field Office of the Dept. of Education and a representative of Crittenden Associates, architectural firm that is designing the school.

Plans for the school show accommodations for 400 students with means for adding additional classrooms to accommodate a total of 300 students.

There is a gymnasium with a standard high school basketball court plus bleachers to seat 750 spectators; a combination cafeteria and auditorium, library, home economics room, shops, and science labs, plus administrative offices.

CIVIL DEFENSE CLASSES TO BEGIN

OLD CHUGIAK: The Chugiak Health Center, has been chosen as the location for a series of Civil Defense classes which will begin next Monday, March 4th at 7:30pm.

The first will be classes in "Medical Self-Help."

This will be a series of six weekly classes, conducted by Mrs. Ollie Walker.

Following this there will be a series of Radiology classes, to be conducted by Mr. Robert Freer of Eagle River.

The Health Center is located in the old Methodist Church building across from the Chugiak School.

PETERS CREEK: Three persons were injured in two separate accidents that took place at the same spot and within less than two hours of each other last Monday morning.

Deep ruts in the road ice just north of Peters Creek Bridge caused two cars to lose control and crash into the bridge railing.

At 7:00am, a 1961 Pontiac Station Wagon, driven by Maxine Bullington of Mile 21½ struck the bridge damaging first the front of the car and then bouncing off the railing and striking the rear of the car.

A passenger, Mrs. Nick Van Kampen of mile 21½ suffered knee and chest injuries and was taken to Providence Hospital by a passing motorist. Damage to the car was estimated at \$650.

At 8:50am, a 1956 Oldsmobile, driven by Clifford M. Boyd Sr. of Anchorage, lost control at the same spot and skidded 165 feet sideways and struck the bridge on the right hand side.

Boyd suffered severe lacerations of the forehead. One passenger in his car received a fractured jaw, while a second and third passenger were uninjured.

The Oldsmobile was a total loss.

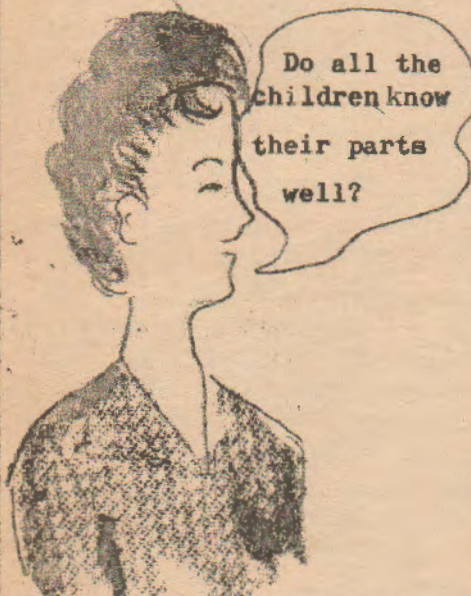
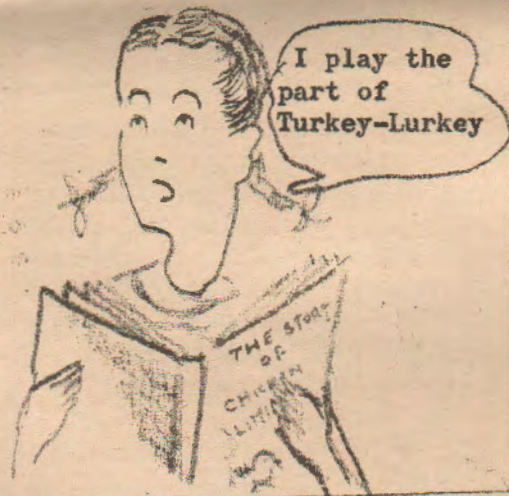
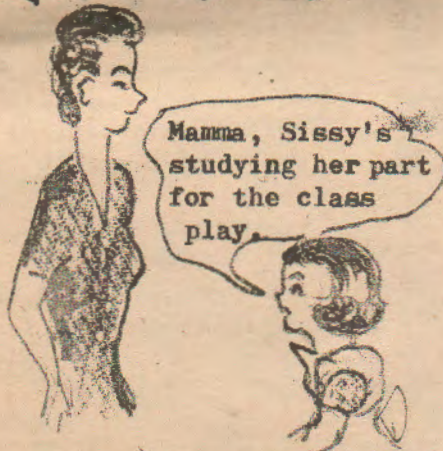

While her mother is in the States, our Junior Cook of the Month has found the following recipe to be a favorite with her father and sister; and one that she can prepare in a hurry after she gets home from school

BEEF STEW
 (Pressure cooker)

- 1 tbs fat
- 2# beef cubed (moose or caribou)
- 1 large onion diced
- 4 cup water
- 2 small potatoes diced
- 2 cup green beans or peas
- 1 small carrots diced
- 1 cup canned tomatoes
- 1 tbs flour
- 4 cup water
- Salt & pepper to taste

HEAT cooker

ADD fat

BROWN meat

ADD onion, salt & pepper,
 1/4 cup water

PLACE vegetables over meat

PLACE cover on cooker

ALLOW steam to flow from vent

PLACE weight on vent pipe

COOK 10-12 minutes with indicator on cook

TURN off heat

ALLOW indicator to return to off

REMOVE lid

MAKE paste of flour & 1/4 cup water

STIR into thicken stew

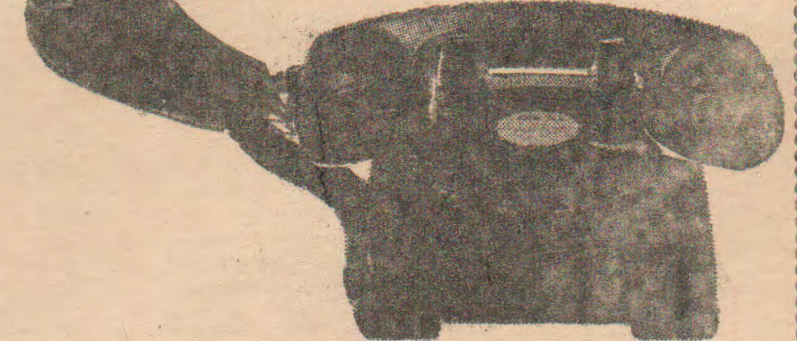
Tentative plans call for advertising for bids in the spring with construction to begin in early August.

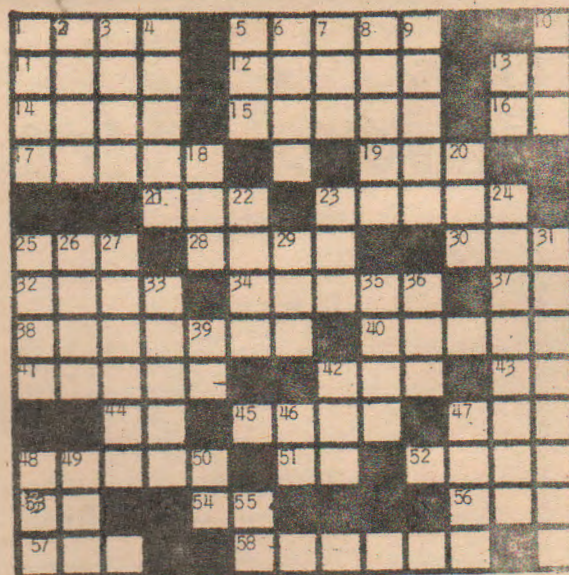

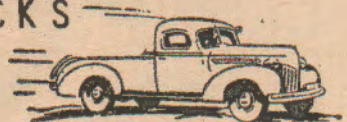

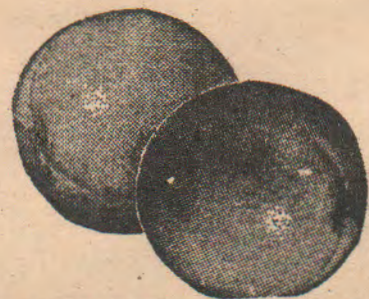
