OPEN HOUSE AT EAGLE RIVER SCHOOL

PROWLERS IN BIRCHWOOD

PROWLERS CAUSE CONCERN TO BIRCHWOOD FAMILIES

BIRCHWOOD: Several families in the Jayhawk Drive vicinity have reported that they have been troubled by prowlers several nights this past week.

Several instances have been reported where gas and fuel oil tanks had been tampered with, and also evidence of "Peeping Tom" activity.

State Police were summoned on one occasion and are investigating.

One resident stated that she had in one instance fired a pistol in the direction of what appeared to be a fleeing figure. She did not believe that she had hit anyone.

MILITARY MAN INJURED IN WRECK

FIRE LAKE: A Fort Richardson soldier was seriously injured when the jeep he was driving skidded out of control on the Fire Lake Hill and overturned in a ditch just north of the Fish Hatchery Road.

Peter F. Pavia suffered fractured ribs and internal injuries. Two passengers in the jeep, Lt. William Jamison and Kenneth E. Baggs were thrown clear and uninjured.

The driver was taken to the 5040th Air Force hospital in a military ambulance. The jeep was a total loss.

The accident occurred at 11:15am last Saturday.

GLENALLEN FAMILY INJURED IN WRECK

EAGLE RIVER: Three members of a Glennallen family were injured when the 1957 Ford Station Wagon in which they were riding collided with a disabled car on the Eagle River hill.

Raymond S. Heaton, driver of the car received a cut lip, while his wife Mable suffered a bruised ankle and son Bruce (15) received lacerations to the forehead.

The car they struck was a 1952 International truck which belonged to Robert S. Boyd of Palmer. The truck had been left in the lane of traffic. There was no driver in the truck at the time of the accident.

State Police took the injured family to the office of Dr. Marshall Simpson where they were treated and released.
