The hours will be 11am to 6pm from the first of the month through the 15th, and from 11am to 5pm for the balance of the month.

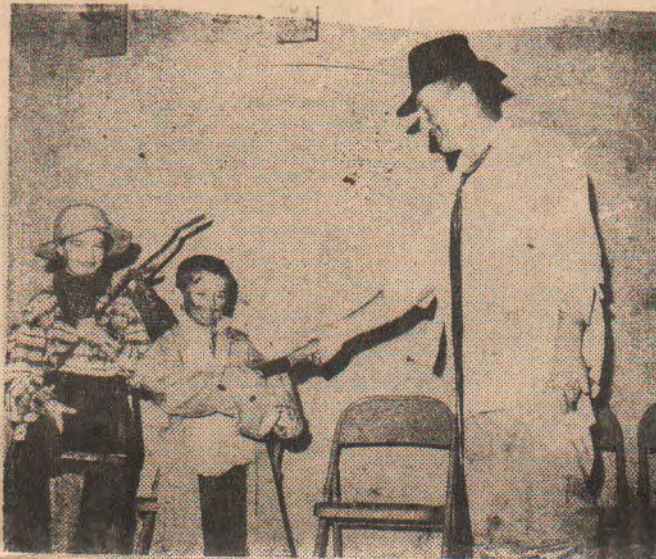

Allen said that the shorter route would benefit only the stranger who passes through once, and seriously hurt the economy of the localities by-passed.

He added that funds saved by improving the Highway along its present lines could be used to construct roads so badly needed throughout the rest of the state.

The proposed change would by-pass most of the Greater Chugiak Area, Goat Creek and The Butte.

COOK FOR MARCH  
PEG TISSINGTON

Peg said that many of her friends had been asking for this recipe, and she feels sure that many other who have been successful in their rabbit hunting will enjoy it.

HASEN PFEFFER

- DRESS large rabbit
- ADD 2 cups vinegar
- 3 cups water
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 small onion sliced
- 2 tsp salt
- 1/2 tsp black pepper
- 1 tsp pickling spick
- 2 tbs. flour
- CUT rabbit into serving pieces
- COMBINE remaining ingredients with the exception of the flour.
- POUR over the rabbit
- LET STAND in refrigerator 36 to 48 hours
- REMOVE rabbit
- WIPE dry
- HEAT pressure cooker
- ADD fat
- SEAR rabbit in fat until brown
- GRADUALLY ADD 1 cup of picklung liquid
- CLOSE cover securely
- PLACE regulator on vent pipe
- COOK for 15 minutes at 15 pounds
- REMOVE from heat
- ALLOW pressure to drop of its own accord
- THICKEN gravy with flour
- SERVE

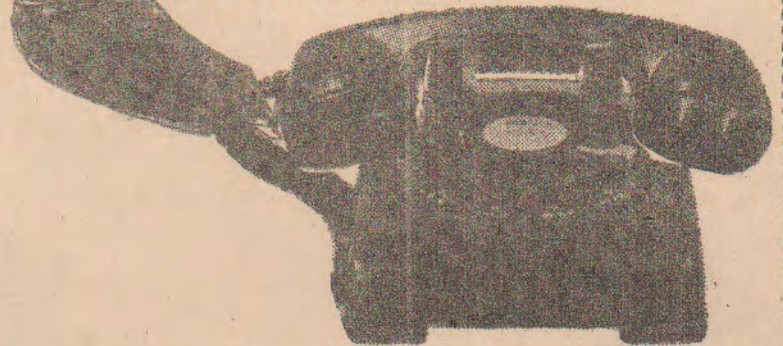

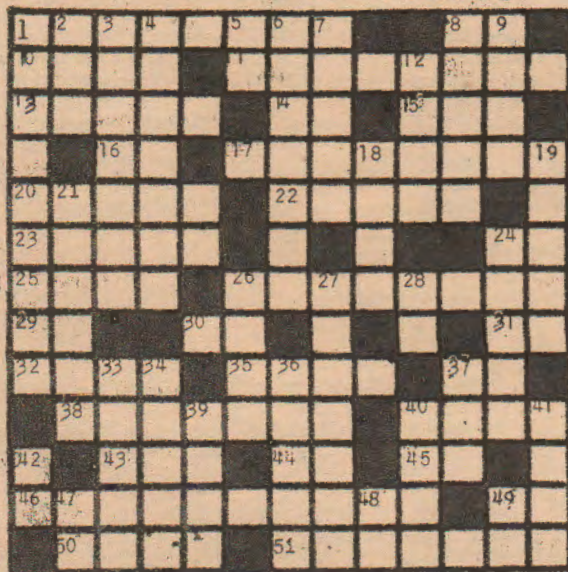

- 1 spontaneous combustion
- 1 unknown

The total loss from the above fourteen fires is estimated at \$74,500.
