SCHOOL BOARD ELECTION SET

BIRCHWOOD FAMILY LOSES HOME

BIRCHWOOD: A small house trailer, belonging to Ray S. Addison of Birchwood, was completely destroyed by fire last Monday night.

The six Addison children were alone in the trailer when the fire broke out.

DEMOS ELECT OFFICERS

CHUGIAK: A joint meeting of democrats of the Chugiak and Eagle River precincts was held last Thursday night at the Chugiak VFW Hall.

Members from each voting precinct held separate elections and voted 28 to 1 in favor of remaining a joint caucus.

Geore Allen, who has held the post of Chairman for the past eight years declined renomination.

Officers elected were; George H. Smith of mile 23, Vice Chariman, Mrs. Jesse Nicholes, and Secretary Mrs. Ed. Willis.

A standing ovation was given to outgoing chairman George Allen.

THERAPIST TO HOLD CLASSES

CHUGIAK: Peggy Hamilton, therapist for the ACCA Treatment Center will begin holding regular classes for speech and hearing therapy here beginning April 19th.

Last Friday, Miss Hamilton held the first speech and hearing evaluation tests in the area.

Tests were held at the First Baptist Church in the Eagle River School vicinity, and in the Health Center across from the Chugiak School.

Mrs. Howard D'Spain, who has been working with Miss Hamilton expressed concern that out of the 45 students that were recommended by their teachers as needing evaluation tests,

CHUGIAK: Wayne Hull, Chairman of the Chugiak Advisory School Board, announced annual election scheduled for April 8th, at 8pm in the Multi-purpose room of the Chugiak School.
