REMINDER OF DECLARATION OF CANDIDACY

CHUGIAK: Wayne Hull, Chairman of the Chugiak Advisory School Board reminds that he is accepting declarations for candidacy for two positions to be filled on the board on the April 8th election.

Anyone desiring to run for either of the two seats must submit their declaration not later than 48 hours prior to the election.

To be eligible, candidates must be a registered voter in either of the two voting districts in the Greater Chugiak Area.

Declarations may either be mailed to Hull or may be submitted at the offices of either of the two local schools.

PALMER: Outside plant construction for the Matanuska Telephone Association has begun with the arrival last week of crews from the Zontelli Construction Company.

The Minnesota firm has set up headquarters in Palmer, but the first phase to be undertaken will be line construction to new subscribers in the Greater Chugiak Area, according to MTA manager Max Clement.

When these lines are completed, then the crews will return to Palmer and finally to Sutton, Wasilla and Big Lake.

Approximately 400 new subscribers are expected to receive phone service this year from this new expansion program. A five year long range planning basis is expected to eventually serve 1500 new customers.

In addition to providing service to new members, the program will bring improved service to existing users.

Clement reminds residents of the Greater Chugiak Area that May 1st is the cut-off date, after which applications for new phones will be placed on a "when available" basis.

All applications for new phones must be accompanied by a ten dollar deposit.

The balance of the membership fee (forth dollars) is payable when phone service is installed.

PEG TISSINGTON

It was difficult to choose a final recipe from the group which our cook for March had given us, however, we settled on this hearty casserole.

CHEESE AND CABBAGE ROLLS

- 3 ounces, grated American cheese
- 12 large cabbage leaves
- 1 1/2 cups cold boiled rice
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1/4 tsp black pepper
- 1/4 tsp paprika

MIX rice, cheese and seasonings together

PAR-BOIL leaves in boiling water

REMOVE and fill each leave with cheese mixture.

ROLL UP and tie each roll with a clean string

PLACE in buttered casserole DOT with butter

COVER and bake in slow oven (325°) for 1 hour or until tender.

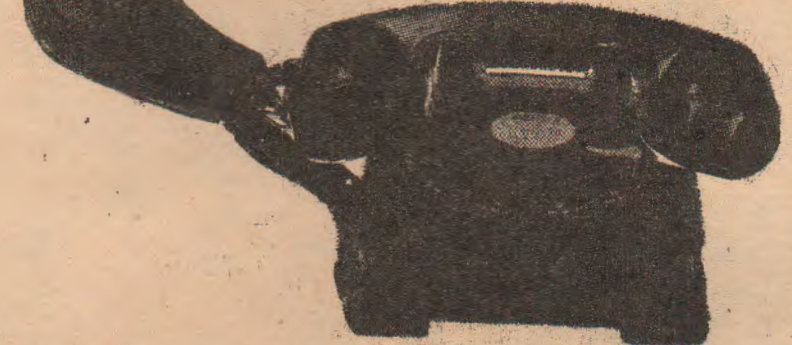
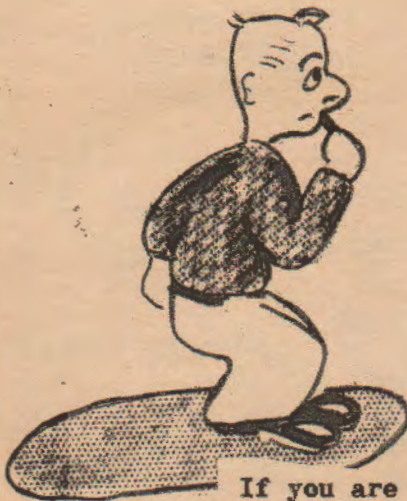

HITS MOOSE**


