plained that even in they do not take mon than the two remain ing immunizations, they will be afford ed a greater measur of protection than they would have ordinarily.


He added that if they desire to receive the first immunization which was missed, then this may be taken later from their personal physician. Coupon books will be for sale at both





SPEECH & HEARING THERAPY PROGRAM TO BE HELD

CHUGIAK: A Speech and Hearing Therapy Program, sponsored by the Chugiak Chapter of the ACCA, will be-gin on March 15th in the Greater Chugiak Area.

Appointments are now being made through Mrs. Howard D'Spain, who is helbing the therapist, Miss Peggy Hamilton, this year.

Miss Hamilton has requested parents accompany their children to the Therapy Center, and be present while therapy is being given.

Parents residing in the area served by the Chugiak School, will take their children to the Chugiak Health Center, located in the old Methodist Church bhilding. Those residing in the Eagle River School area, will go to the First Baptist Church of Eagle River.

This program is available to pre-schoolers, and not limited to students.

Parents who feel that their pre-school child has a speech or hearing problem, may call and make an appointment for an evaluation.
