JIM EKSTEDT SEEKS MEA POST

PALMER: Jim Ekstedt of Eagle River is one of ten candidates nominated to run for three vacancies on the Board of Directors of the Matanuska Electric Association.

In addition to Ekstedt, those running are Phil O'Neil of Sutton, incumbent, C. Ivan Branton of Wasilla, incumbent, Henry L. Corbin, Butte, James D. Frey, Butte, Lew E. Hanks, Palmer, L. Fl (Joe) Martin, of Wasilla, Richard J. Miller Jr. Palmer, Clair Johnson, Big Lake, James Carson, Wasilla.

Paul Samson, member of the nominating committee from the Greater Chugiak Area, stated that Virgil Flint of Eagle River, incumbent had refused re-nomination.

Flint was appointed to the board to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Victor Falk Jr.

The election will take place at the annual meeting, which will be held this year on April 13 at the Central School in Palmer.

I'm Ada Fetrow, your 1963 Easter Seal Child. I'm three years old, and I will represent all the handicapped children in the Greater Chugiak Area during the 1963 Easter Seal Campaign. What does an Easter Seal mean to me? It means Faith and Hope. Hope that through your help I may be able to hear like other children. Faith that you won't let me down in providing the necessary care. Because of your faithfulness in purchasing Easter Seals in the past, I have been receiving help from A.C.C.A. Last year, in the Greater Chugiak Area, the A.C.C.A. provided more than 200 treatments to children with speech and hearing defects.

The Easter Seal Program for the physically handicapped is one important way you can share your Easter joy with others. Won't you help?

CHUGIAK: The second in the series of three Oral Sabin Polio Clinics will take place this Sunday, March 10th at both the Chugiak and the Eagle River Schools

Dr. Marshall Simpson, local physician in charge of the clinics stated, that anyone who has not already received their first immunization may still purchase coupon books and receive the second and the third immunization.

Dr. Simpson explained that even if they do not take more than the two remaining immunizations, they will be afforded a greater measure of protection than they would have ordinarily.

He added that if they desire to receive the first immunization which was missed, then this may be taken later from their personal physician.

Coupon books will be for sale at both clinics.

SPEECH & HEARING THERAPY PROGRAM TO BE HELD

CHUGIAK: A Speech and Hearing Therapy Program, sponsored by the Chugiak Chapter of the ACCA, will begin on March 15th in the Greater Chugiak Area.

Appointments are now being made through Mrs. Howard D'Spain, who is helping the therapist, Miss Peggy Hamilton, this year.

Miss Hamilton has requested parents accompany their children to the Therapy Center, and be present while therapy is being given.

Parents residing in the area served by the Chugiak School, will take their children to the Chugiak Health Center, located in the old Methodist Church building. Those residing in the Eagle River School area, will go to the First Baptist Church of Eagle River.

This program is available to pre-schoolers, and not limited to students.

Parents who feel that their pre-school child has a speech or hearing problem, may call and make an appointment for an evaluation.

Both local schools have cooperated by referring students who appear to be in need of therapy; however, these records may be incomplete, and parents who believe that their school child has a problem should call and verify whether or not their child has been referred.

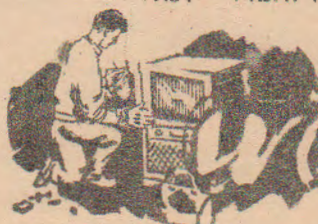

LIONS FETE LADIES By Glenn Briggs

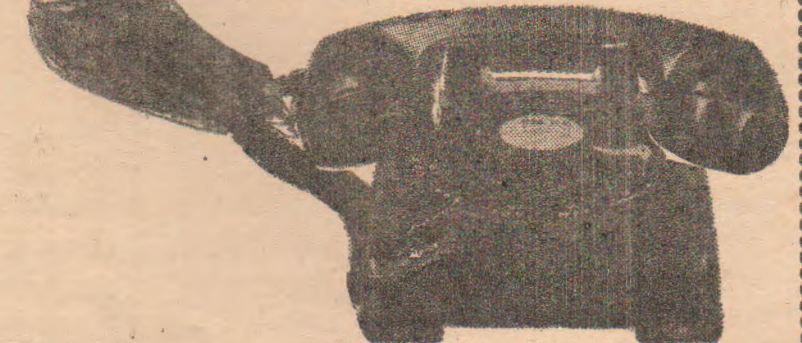

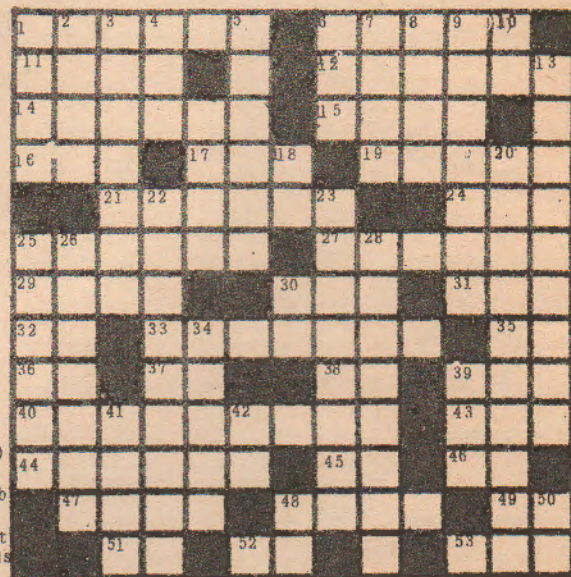

BURNING CYCLE ENDANGERS GAS PUMPS

The cycle was parked next to the pumps when the fire broke out. McCrary and another customer at the Shopping Center pushed the cycle away a few feet and were able to beat the fire out.

The cycle did not appear to be severely damaged, and McCrary was able to ride it away.

LIVESTOCK DIE IN FIRE

EAGLE RIVER: A tragic fire completely destroyed a 60' by 110' barn at the Vanover Hog Ranch in Eagle River, and burned to death all the animals trapped in it.

The fire was discovered at 5:20am on March 2nd by a neighbor Art Headlough, who was returning from work.

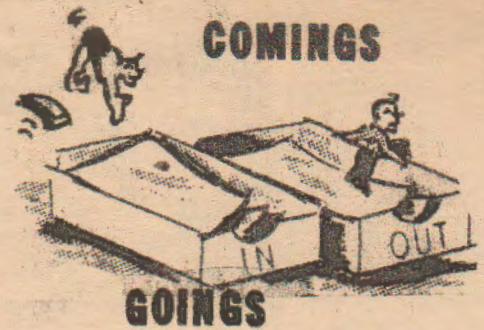
The Eagle River Fire Company responded, but was unable to save the building or any of the animals.

Lost in the fire were 21 brood sows, 125 young pigs, 1 boar and 2 Shetland ponies. One brood sow that managed to escape suffered slight burns.

Vanover estimated the loss at \$66,00 for the live stock and \$6,000 for the building. The loss was not covered by insurance.

The cause of the fire has not yet been determined.

At the time of the fire the building contained a coal stove located at one end, and a series of heat lamps.

CHIEF CHUGIAK ESCAPES INJURY IN TWO ACCIDENTS

OLD CHUGIAK: Fred Bustrum, better known locally as "Chief Chugiak" escaped injury on two separate occasions when his car, a walk-in delivery van type vehicle overturned after he lost control on icy roads.
