

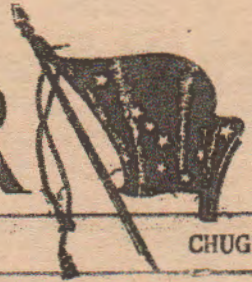

**TOTAL BLACKOUT
HITS AREA**

CHUGIAK: The power outage, experienced last Monday at 1:10pm affected the entire Palmer, Greater Chugiak and Anchorage Areas plus users in areas to the south.

The outage was caused locally when the gas turbine in the City of Anchorage failed and an attempt was made to switch over to the Eklutna Power Plant, causing an overload.

The outage in the Greater Chugiak Area lasted approximately twenty minutes. Anchorage was without power for over an hour.

The cause of the failure of the gas turbine has not as yet been announced.

PTA GROUPS MEET

CHUGIAK: The PTA's of both local schools held their April meetings last night.

Election of officers was the main order of business at the Chugiak School with the following elected: President, Dorothy Jonrowe, Vice President Ruth Hartman, Secretary Betty Pyles and Treasurer, Betty Kirsch.

Mrs. Jonrowe had been nominated in absentia, pending her acceptance; and upon learning of her nomination declined to serve for personal reasons.

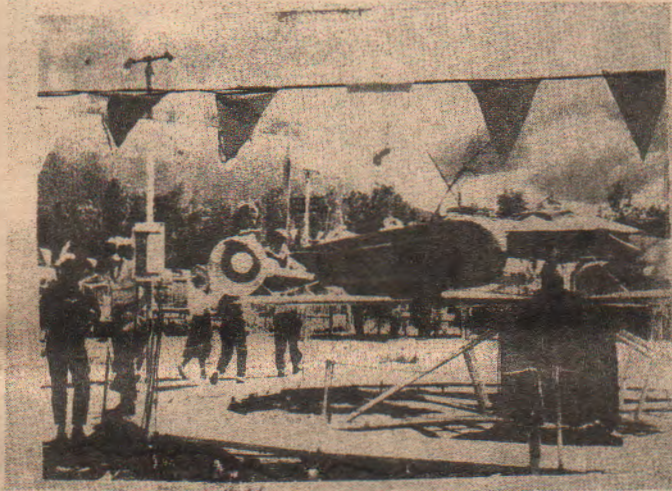
Eight Grade graduation and banquet were discussed and voted upon.

TO SCHOOL BOARD**

CHUGIAK: Dale Pierson and Al Tanner were elected to the Chugiak advisory School Board at an election held Monday night at the multi-purpose room of the Chugiak School.

A total of eighty persons registered and voted in the election.

Pierson was elected to the one year term, and received 45 votes to his opponent, Dorothy Jonrowe's thirty five.

Tanner defeated two opponents for the three year term, receiving forty four votes to twenty three for Howard B'Spain and twelve for Jesse Wooten.

Tanner, an incumbent member of the board had been appointed last year by the board following the resignation of Gib Reid.

In the past the sometimes almost comical gaggle of cars tied up on the hill was a regular occurrence, whenever the weather took a turn.

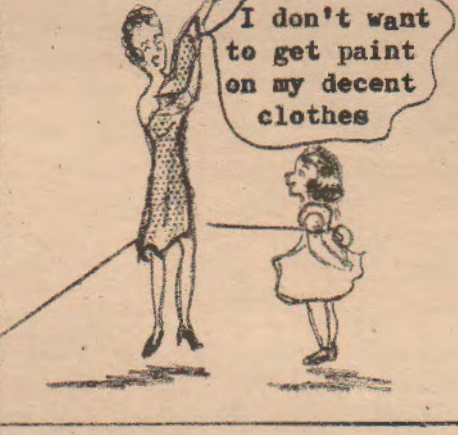
The absence of any such a jam, in view of the fact that this winter has had an unusually heavy amount of road ice is a very great relief to residents of this area.

COOK FOR APRIL
ADDIE ALLEN

For her second recipe, Addie offers this unusual dessert, so appropriate for a ladies luncheon.

GELATIN SQUARES

- 1 envelope Gelatin
- 4 tbs. cold water
- 1 cup boiling water
- 2/3 cup sugar
- 3 egg whites unbeaten
- 1/4 tsp salt
- 1 tsp vanilla

SOAK gelatin in cold water
ADD boiling water & sugar
LET cool

ADD egg whites, salt and vanilla

BEAT until mixture is stiff and forms peaks
TURN into 9"x9"x2" pan
LET stand in refrigerator overnight

TO SERVE cut in 1 inch squares and roll in crushed graham crackers
ARRANGE in sherbert glasses
SERVE with lemon sauce.

LEMON SAUCE:

- 3 egg yolks
- 2/3 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup melted butter
- 1 tsp grated lemon rind
- 2 tbs lemon juice
- 1/2 cup cream, whipped

BEAT egg yolks well
ADD remaining ingredients
MIX thoroughly together
DO NOT COOK

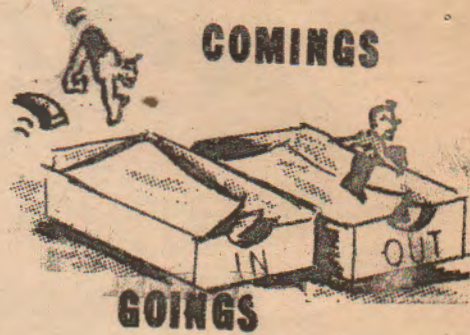

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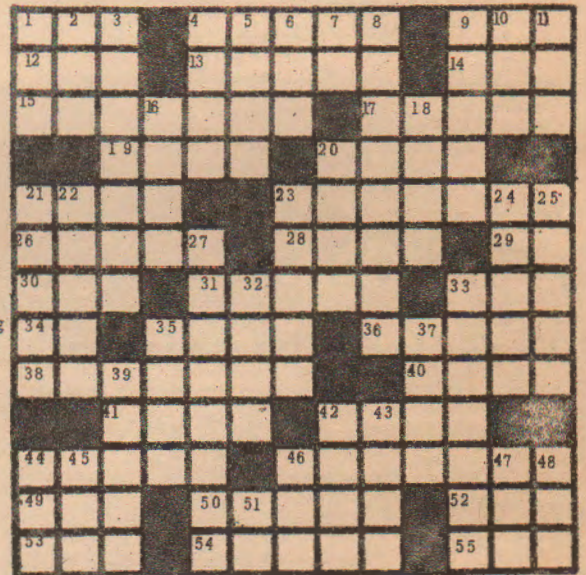

Parents of those children who were seen last month will be contacted through the mail for their April appointment.

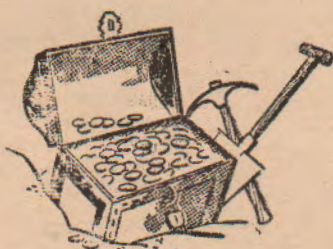
All parents of children in need of speech or hearing examinations are urged to make use of this service which is made available to the public through the local Alaska Crippled Children Association Chapter.

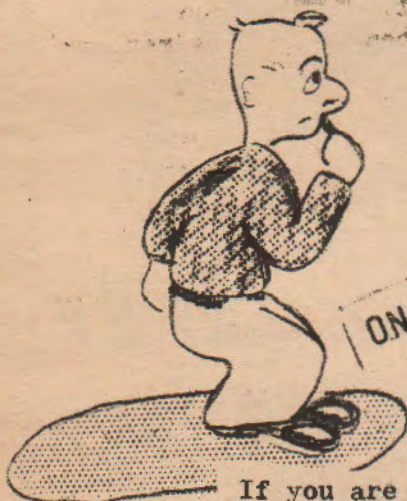

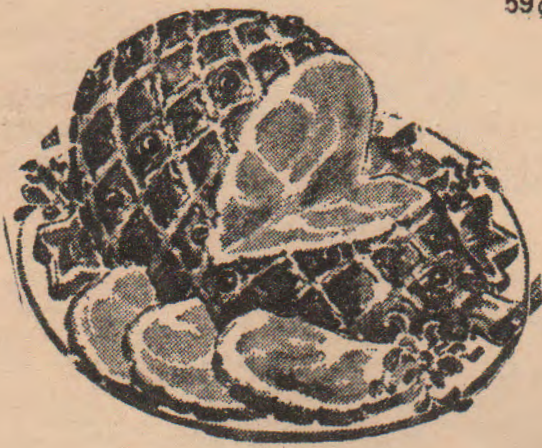
