SCHOOL BOARD ELECTION

TO BE HELD NEXT MONDAY

POLICE END LOCAL YOUTHS CRIME SPREE

EAGLE RIVER: State Police last Saturday evening took into custody a seventeen year old Eagle River boy, ending a crime spree that included burglary, larceny and four counts of auto theft.

The boy had stolen a Nash Rambler from Dorothy Ericson, an Eagle River School teacher and driven it to Tok, Valdez, Fairbanks, finally abandoning it at Delta Junction.

From there he stole a 1962 Ford Galaxie which he drove to Eagle River and then abandoned it.

From this point he hitch hiked to Seward where he stole a Renault and after driving it around abandoned it and then took a 1962 Chevrolet Pick-up, in which he returned to the Anchorage Area. While in Seward he also broke into a building and stole some money.

It was on Saturday, March 30th that the stolen pick-up was spotted by MP's on Ft. Richardson.

They summoned the State Police and the boy was taken into custody. At that time he was playing basketball at the gymnasium on post.

He has been turned over to the Youth and Adult Authority.

FOUR SEEK SCHOOL BOARD POSTS

CHUGIAK: Four candidates have declared their intention to run for two seats on the Chugiak Advisory School Board.

The annual election takes place next Monday at 8pm at the Chugiak School.

A three year and a one year term are to be filled.

Candidates must present their declaration to run to School Board Chairman Wayne Hull. Deadline for declaring is 6pm on Saturday, April 6th.

To date four candidates have announced their desire to run. For the three year post the candidates are Al Tanner (incumbent) of Peters Creek, and Howard D'Spain of Fire Lake.

For the one year post, Dorothy Jonrowe of Old Chugiak and Dale Pierson of Eagle River.

The school board has appointed the following three to act as election judges; Ed Bellringer, Marie Zib and John Steeby.

Voters must be legal residents of either the Chugiak or Eagle River Voting precincts and be of legal voting age.

Registration will be at the door. Voting will begin at 8pm and last not later than 9pm.

Candidates names may be written in on the ballots, but no nominations will be accepted from the floor.

The show took place at the Chugiak School last Saturday night and played to a near capacity house.

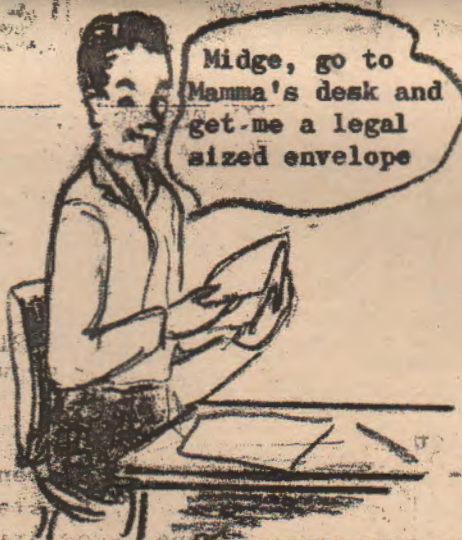
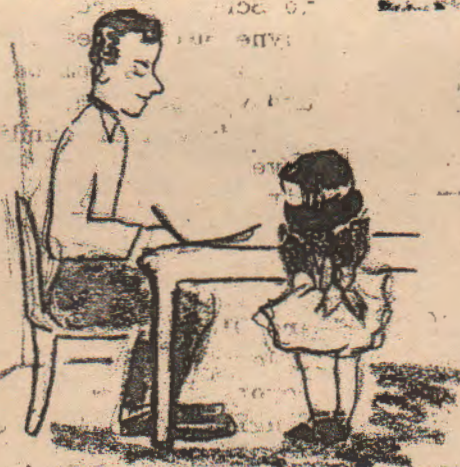
Over eighty separate outfits were modeled, ranging from playwear to after five and winding up with a complete bridal party.
