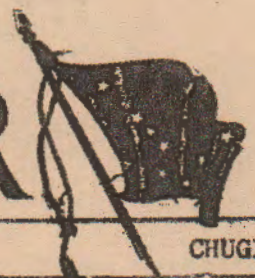

**CHUGIAK GRAD TO GET MEA SCHOLARSHIP**

**CHUGIAK SPELLER  
 SECOND HIGHEST  
 IN STATE**

ANCHORAGE: Charles W. Campbell, eighth grade student from the Chugiak School emerged from the Alaska State Spelling Bee as the Second highest speller in the State of Alaska.

Charles went down after spelling "requital" incorrectly.

Topping Charles by spelling the word right was Ruth Avery, eighth grader from Central Jr. High in Anchorage.

Ruth then went on to spell "labyrnth" correctly, and win the championship.

Campbell by earning the second highest spot has come farther in the State Spelling contest than has any other student from this area.

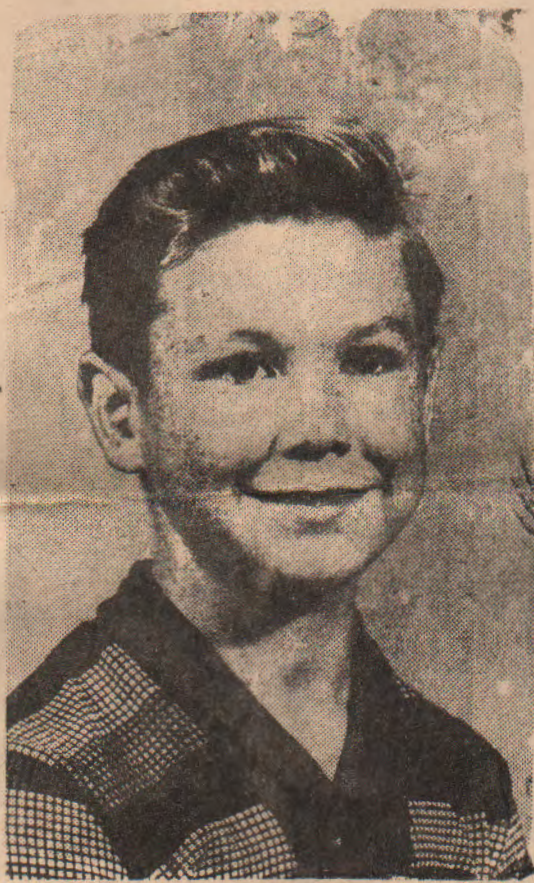
Charles, age 14, is the son of T/Sgt and Mrs. Billy Campbell of Birchwood Road.

Charles was born in Washington D.C. and came to Chugiak last year from Hyattsville Junior High in College Park Maryland.

Carolyn Ekstedt, top speller from the Eagle River School came in 20th out of a field of 61.

This was the highest prior to this year that any local speller had come.

The walls of the high vaulted living room are lined with trophies which her hunter-guide husband has brought home.

Ruth Needels is very proud of her lovely new log home; and she and her husband Gene have worked hard to make it into a showcase for their collection of trophies.

As have many residents of this community, the Needels have designed and built their own home, and have designed it to reflect their interest in Alaskan wildlife.

The furniture and fittings of their living room are all hand made and fashioned from hide and antler. One entire wall is paneled in squares of tanned moose leather.

Ruth and Gene moved to Chugiak last July, as soon as the home that they were working on was near enough to completion to be livable.

They had purchased six acres at mile 21, a piece of land that was originally part of the old Montgomery homestead.

Before moving out here they had lived in Nunaka Valley. Ruth admitted that Gene's trophies had begun to crowd them out of their small home, and they decided to move to the country and build

### NO INJURIES IN MILE 30 WRECK

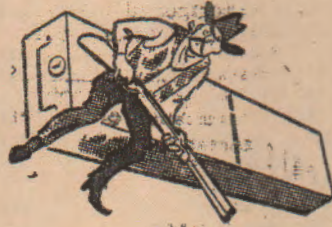
**EKLUTNA:** There were no injuries other than minor injuries to individuals involved in a rear-end collision at mile 30 last Saturday.

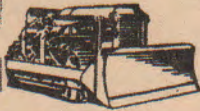

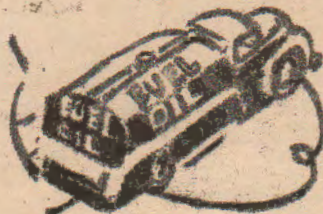
