

CHUGIAK GRAD TO GET MEA SCHOLARSHIP

CHUGIAK SPELLER SECOND HIGHEST IN STATE

ANCHORAGE: Charles W. Campbell, eighth grade student from the Chugiak School emerged from the Alaska State Spelling Bee as the Second highest speller in the State of Alaska.

Charles went down after spelling requital" incorrectly.

Topping Charles by spelling the word right was Ruth Avery, eighth grader from Central Jr. High in Anchorage.

Ruth then went on to spell "labyrnth" correctly, and win the championship.

Campbell by earning the second highest spot has come farther in the State Spelling contest than has any other student from this area.

Charles, age 14, is the son of T/Sgt and Mrs. Billy Campbell of Birchwood Road.

Charles was born in Washington D.C. and came to Chugiak last year from Hyattsville Junior High in College Park Maryland.

His father is stationed at Elmendorf Air Force Base, where he is attached to the 5009 Support Group.

Ruth Needels is very proud of her lovely new log home; and she and her husband Gene have worked hard to make it into a showcase for their collection of trophies.

As have many residents of this community, the Needels have designed and built their own home, and have designed it to reflect their interest in Alaskan wildlife.

The furniture and fittings of their living room are all hand made and fashined from hide and antler. One entire wall is paneled in squares of tanned moose leather.




There are to be several unusual acts in addition to the traditional variety, and a show of at least two hours is promised.



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


