
PONY LEAGUE SEASON STARTS SUNDAY

This is the job of the local government were told. When your community becomes incorporated you can build your own high school, control your own dump etc. etc.

If the group known as Chugiak High School had accepted this decisionwithout a struggle, we would be looking forward to sending our children by bus to Anchorage High School for the next twenty page 2

years, instead of a lovely new school of our own within the next two.

One might be led to suppose that the "do-it-yourself" brush-off is standard proceedure whenever a small community asks the state to help solve a local problem.

On the basis of our experience with the high school, this should be very encouraging, and all that is now needed is a dedicated stubborn group of individuals such as Operation Chugiak High School to begin nagging, needling and <u>proving</u> to our State that the problem exists and that we won't go away until it is solved.

The residents of this community are not trying to shirk their duties, but local government is still in the future, and the residents of the Greater Chugiak Area are powerless to hurry it

along. The problem of the dump
