VIRGIL FLINT NAMED LION OF YEAR

GIRLS AND WOMEN CALLED OUT FOR SOFTBALL

The reasons given for not controlling the health hazard that the Birchwood Dump has become are the identical reasons given us as to why the

State could not build a high school in this community.

This is the job of the local government we were told. When your community becomes incorporated you can build your own high school, control your own dump etc. etc.

If the group known as Chugiak High School had accepted this decision without a struggle, we would be looking forward to sending our children by bus to Anchorage High School for the next twenty

years, instead of a lovely new school of our own within the next two.

One might be led to suppose that the "do-it-yourself" brush-off is standard procedure whenever a small community asks the state to help solve a local problem.

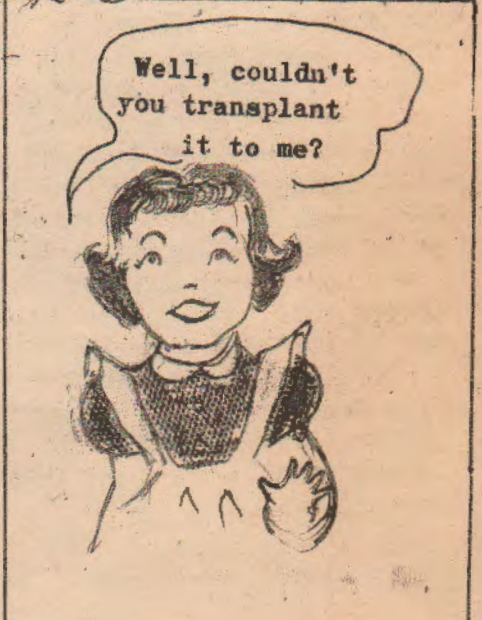
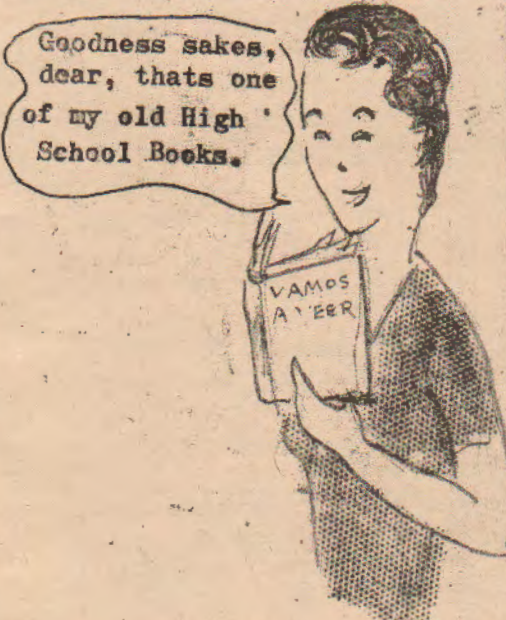
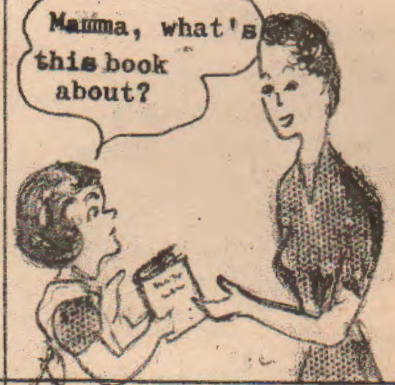
On the basis of our experience with the high school, this should be very encouraging, and all that is now needed is a dedicated stubborn group of individuals such as Operation Chugiak High School to begin nagging, needling and proving to our State that the problem exists and that we won't go away until it is solved.

COOK FOR MAY

Moosemeat is a staple in most Alaskan diets, but many newcomers are at a loss as to how to prepare it.

Ruth offers these two simple recipes that are favorites of hers.

BARBEQUED MOOSEBURGER

- 1 lb mooseburger
- 1/4 cup oil or butter
- Instant minced onion (2 lbs.)
- 2 Tbs. Worcestershire Sauce
- 1 can tomato sauce
- 1 cup water
- mushrooms (opt)

BROWN burger in oil
ADD minced onions & tomato sauce

ADD water and Woster. sauce
SIMMER until thickened
SPRINKLE with flour

STIR until thickened
SERVE on hamburger buns

*Excellent with mustard and dill pickles.

MOOSE ROAST

SEASON meat with salt and pepper and small amount of garlic salt

PLACE on rack in open roaster

LAY several strips beef suet across top of meat

ROAST in slow oven 350°

*Meat thermometer is good to indicate desired doneness.

** Very good rare or medium rare.

Awards were given out to the following cubs: Frankie McAllister, Bobcat pin; Eric Braendel Wolf badge.

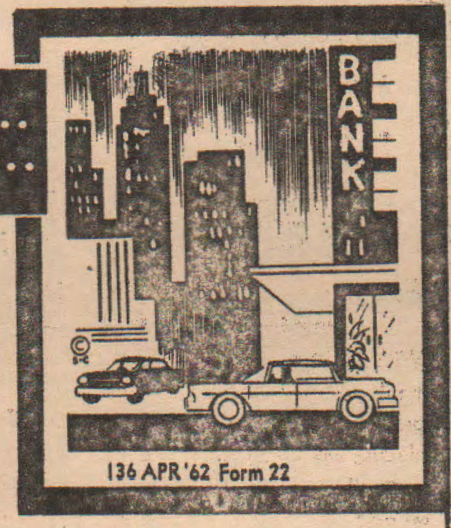

BLAST PRODUCES
"FOUR ALARM" FIRE

EKLUTNA: A blasting operation by the Alaska Railroad on the Eklutna Flats last Wednesday, touched off what might be described as a "Four Alarm" brush fire.


(Brush Fire)

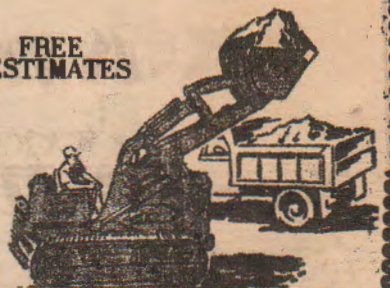

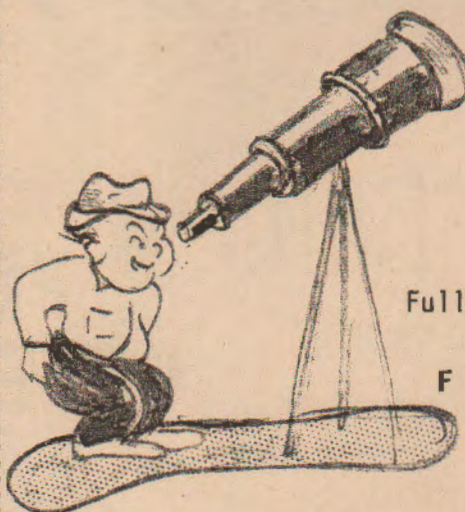

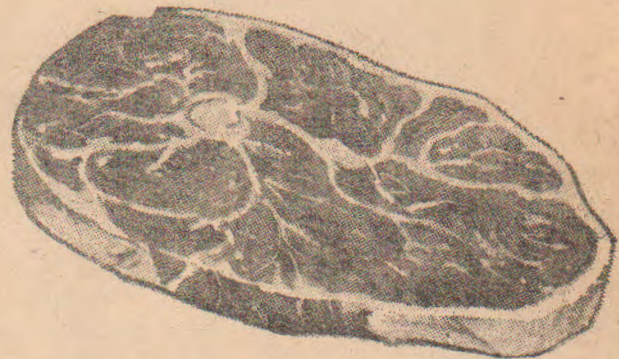
