LOCAL MAN FINDS CORPSE

EKLUTNA: A partially decomposed corpse was discovered by Walter Morris of Peters Creek last Sunday, while the latter was hunting for muskrat sign in the Eklutna area.

Morris came upon the body on the bank of Eklutna Creek, a small stream which flows out of the old Eklutna Hydroplant near the FAA station.

The body was clad only in a short sleeved cotten shirt and jeans and was slumped against the steep bank with the feet in the water. It was not wearing shoes or socks or any jewelry.

Morris ran back to the highway, and after a time was able to flag a car and ask the driver to call the State Police.

Trooper Bill Williams, from the Chugiak area responded and in turn summoned the Palmer City Police, who arrived with the Palmer ambulance. The remains were then transported to Palmer.

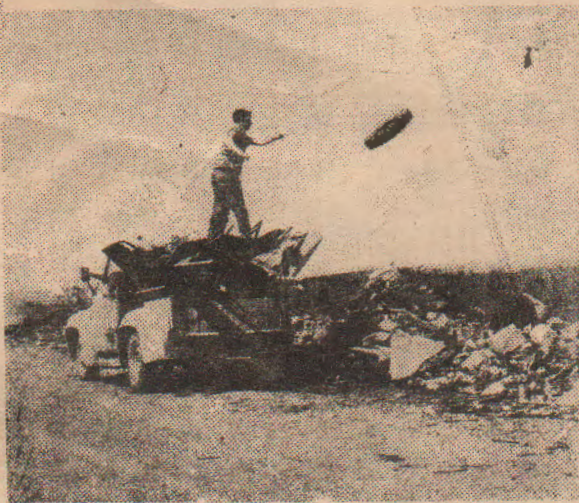
Subsequent investigation revealed that the dead man was Marvin Bernard Nickoli, 30 of Glennallen.

The last time Nickoli had been seen alive was two days before Thanksgiving of last year. He had been visiting a brother, Nick in Anchorage and had said that he was planning to hitch-hike back to Glennallen.

A autopsy revealed no immediate evidence of foul play. Police have tentatively listed possible cause of death as drowning.

There had been no missing persons report on file for Nickoli.

Morris, who discovered the body is employed as a maintenance man at the 5040th Air Force Hospital.

A PUBLIC DISGRACE

It is doubtful if any resident of the Greater Chugiak Area can pass the community dump on the Birchwood road without mixed feelings of disgust, shame and guilt.

Over the past years this area has progressed from a necessary evil to a public disgrace, a health menace and a community eyesore.

Rubbish is heaped four feet high for almost a quarter of a mile along the side of the road....no, it is no longer along the side (next col)

of the road, the trash is beginning to pile up on the very driving surface of the road.

Flies and maggots swarm over rotting moose hides, carcasses of dead animals and decaying garbage. Acrid smoke billows from the smoldering trash; while an occasional explosion as a discarded pressurized can blows up, sends showers of sparks into the neighboring woods and bushes.

The woods across the road from the dump are thoroughly littered with

COOK OF THE MONTH

COOK FOR MAY RUTH NEEDELS

One would expect the wife of an Alaskan Big Game guide to have a file of recipies on the preparation of wild game, and Ruth Needels has not disappointed us.

During the next month we will learn many tasty ways to prepare our Alaskan meats.

PAN FRIED PTARMAGIN

1/4 cup butter or oleo flour dash of pepper minced instint onion thyme

SOAK birds overnight in salt water which has been changed several times.

SPLIT breasts DUST with flour & pepper BROWN in butter SPRINKLE with onion and lightly with thyme COVER COOK slowly over low heat TURN occassionally REMOVE lid just before serving to allow meat to brown.

MOOSE ROAST

SEASON meat with salt, pepper and small amount of gralic salt. PLACE on rack in open roaster PLACE several strips bee: suet across meat ROAST in slow oven (350° INSERT meat thermometer to test for desired doneness.

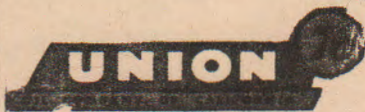

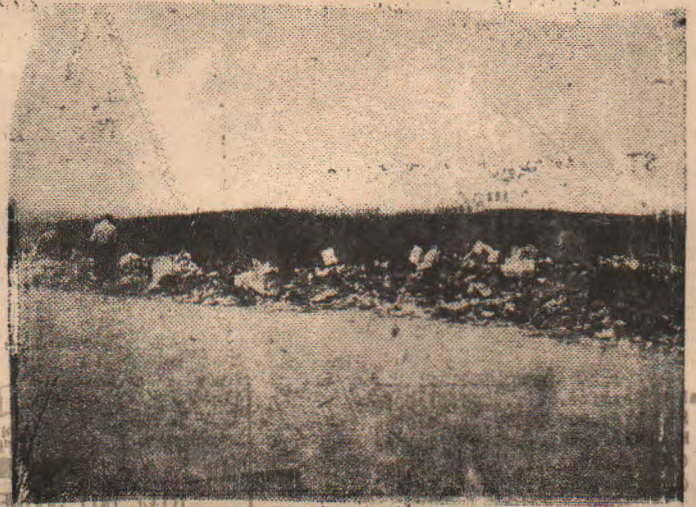
The State has been remiss in permitting this condition to come about. There has been talk of a petition asking the State to close (next col.)

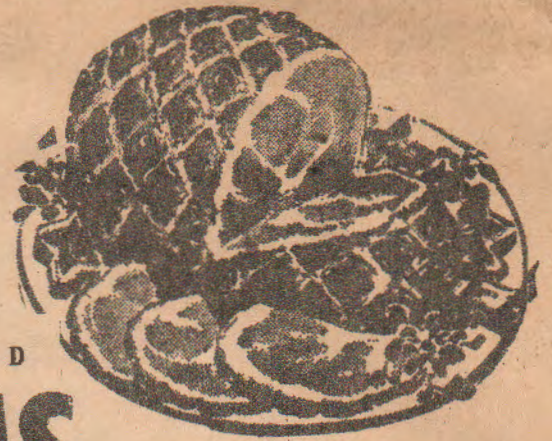
