

MAN DIES FOLLOWING ACCIDENT

LOCAL GIRL ENLISTS IN WAC

PETERS CREEK: Margaret Lynn Halverson, of Mt. Eklutna Drive in Peters Creek has enlisted in the WAC, and left on Monday for her basic training at Ft. McCleller and Alabama.

Margy, as she is known to her friends, was born in Minneapolis Minnesota and came to live in Chugiak in 1954.

She is a graduate of the Chugiak grade school and graduated from East Anchorage High School in the class of 1963.

Her parents are Mr. and Mrs. Faville Halverson of Mt. Eklutna Drive.

Following her basic training, Margy will go to San Antonio Texás where she will train for a Dental Technician.

Qualifications for enlisting in the WAC are very strict, according to Recruiting Sgt. Prunier of Ft. Richardson.

Although a number of girls apply, WSgt Prunier stated, only four from the Anchorage area have been accepted in the two years that he has been stationed here.

The vehicle, which was headed south left the road, rolled completely over and landed on its wheels on the left hand side of the road.

Wymer and his tow passengers were taken to Providence Hospital in the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company's Ambulance.

His wife, Ameli, and an unidentified teen-aged passenger were treated for bruises and released.

Exact cause of Wymers death was undetermined pending autopsy, but was believed to have resulted from head injuries or possibly a broken neck.

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

> HEALTH COUNCIL VOLUNTEERS ASSIST NURSE



Children who last term attended grades four through six are eligible for this camping session.




