
# DATE DELAYED

### MISSING BLASTING CAPS ENDANGER CHILDREN

PETERS CREEK: Twelve dynamite caps, which were missing from the property of Ted Sidor of Mt. Eklutna Drive in Peters Creek, have caused grave concern to parents of that area. Several of the caps were last seen in the possession of a nine year old boy, who according to his playmates had been attempting to light them with matches.

When the State Police were called, the boy was unable to tell what he had done with the caps, and to none of the twelve have been recovered.

Sidor said that he had left the caps in a glass jar outside of his trailer house. He had OLD CHUGIAK: Word has been received that a local man was one of the passengers on the illfated airlined that crashed on Monday in the Gulf of Alaska, killing all of the 101 passengers.

Leroy Anderson, 33 who lived at mile 17½ has apparently been returning from a vacation trip to the states aboard the Northwest Orient DC-7 which had been chartered by the military.

Mrs. Ollie Walker, of mile 18, a friend and neighbor of the Andersons, had received a phone call from Crystal Lake Illinois, at which time Mrs. Anderson told her that she had received a telegram from the Air Force informing her that her husband had been aboard the plane.

Anderson is survived by his wife, Barbara and four small children, ages rang-
