POST OFFICE OCCUPIES NEW QUARTERS

EAGLE RIVER: The Eagle River Post office has moved into the new quarters located in the South end of the shopping center building.

Although remodeling is not yet complete, the office is open the same hours as in the past.

Wholly unknown to Daily News management, Ayers fraudulently solicited customers on his route for three months subscriptions, payable in advance, with the promise to deliver a Seattle Sunday paper weekly to new subscribers and others who made a three month advance payment. After collecting a


considerable amount of money by this confidence game, Ayers skipped the state.

He had been working as an independent contractor slightly over a month.

R v. Gould is Director of Missions for the Methodist Church, and was conducting an inspection of the Methodist Church in this area.





PHONE CHANGE-OVER CREATES LOCAL PROBLEMS

CHUGIAK: The switch-over to the new Matanuska Telephone system in the Great er Chugiak Area has created numerous problems that "were not anticipated.

According to Max Clement, manager for MTA, the splitting of numerous party lines in the Chugiak exchange necesitated individual switch-overs on each pole. This took approximately twice as much time as originally planned.

As a result some residents were without phone service for two or more days.

However, Clement assured, most phones would be back in service by Wednesday.

The toll free service to Anchorage is operating smoothly, and local subscribers are enjoying the novelty of being able to call the city or the military bases without

having to contact the long distance operator.

Clement went on to say that there would be further changes in numbers in the Chugiak exchange, with more equipment to be transferred from the Palmer office, and more circuits made available.

Some of the numbers now

assigned to subscribers are temporary ones and will be changed within the next few months.


