

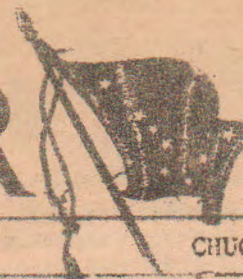

ANCHORAGE: Embezzlement charges have been filed against Bob Ayers, formerly contract carrier for the Anchorage Daily News in the Palmer and Greater Chugiak Area.

The charge was brought on a complaint of the newspaper against Ayers who skipped the state several weeks ago.

Authorities are now looking for him in the lower 48.

Wholly unknown to Daily News management, Ayers fraudulently solicited customers on his route for three months subscriptions, payable in advance, with the promise to deliver a Seattle Sunday paper weekly to new subscribers and others who made a three month advance payment.

After collecting a considerable amount of money by this confidence game, Ayers skipped the state.

He had been working as an independent contractor slightly over a month.

Contrary to certain statements he apparently made, he was never employed in any capacity by the paper.
