NO SHIFTS AT EAST THIS YEAR

ANCHORAGE: There will be no double shifts at East Anchorage High School this year, a spokesman for the school stated.

PETERS CREEK: Arthur Waldar Johnson, well known Chugiak businessman died in Anchorage Presbyterian Hospital last Friday, the victim of serious heart condition complicated by recent major surgery.

Johnson was born on November 21, 1906 in Burnett Washington.

He and his wife Lorraine came to Alaska in 1949 and resided in Sutton where he worked for the Evans-Jones Coal Company.

They moved to Palmer in 1955 and to Chugiak in 1957, where they operated Lorraine's Department Store in the Eagle River Shopping Center and made their home on Coronado Road in Eagle River.

In November of 1962 they purchased Allen's Grocery at mile 23 and re-named it the Peters Creek Shopping Center.

Johnson is survived by his wife Lorraine, his son John age 13, a brother George of Eska Alaska, and two brothers Theodore of Lakoma Washington and Jalmar of Buckley Washington; and three sisters, Irene Wilkenson of Eska Alaska, Mrs. Ellen Sorenson and Mrs. Aima Sorenson both of Graham Washington.

Dear Editor,

Please print this letter of explanation to the residents of Eagle River and Chugiak.

The gate in Eagle River Valley has been erected for our protection and is locked every day of the year, not just for hunting season.

It is on private property on a privately built and maintained road.

When you leave the base of the big hill you are entering private property.

In the past we've let hunters through, but some have abused the privilege to the extent of target practicing, parking in driveways and fields, peeping toms, breaking into cabins and appropriating sundry objects.

No. 1: Mt. McKinley Park

Having made the trip to Mt. McKinley Park, we now feel justified in recommending it to our readers.

We feel that anyone planning this drive should allow a minimum of four days for the outing. The trip to the park can be made in one day of hard driving or in two days in a more leisurely manner.

The paved road is left behind at Paxson's Lodge on the Richardson Highway, where


the traveler must slow his pace due to road construction.

This seemingly deserted country, becomes teeming with activity during the hunting season.

With berry-picking time still in mine, Margaret this week gives another recipe that can be used with any of our Alaskan wild berries.

BERRY ROLL

1 qt berries
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup sugar
 Cinnamon to taste
 $\frac{1}{2}$ stick melted
 Bisquick or your favorite biscuit recipe.

PREHEAT oven to 375°
 BRING berries and sugar to boil
 ADD $\frac{1}{3}$ cup water
 POUR through sieve
 PUT hot juice in 6x10x3 in. baking dish
 MIX biscuit dough, adding
 2 tbs sugar
 1 egg
 $\frac{1}{4}$ cup oil
 ROLL out as for cinnamon rolls $\frac{1}{4}$ inch thick
 BRUSH with melted butter
 SPREAD berry pulp evenly
 SPRINKLE with cinnamon
 ROLL up and cut in 2 inch slices
 PLACE in hot juice using pancake turner
 BAKE for approximately 45 minutes.

Donation of baked goods for the sale is being solicited by club members.



Shortly before arriving at the park the road plunges down to a lower elevation, where we stop for a moment at the small railroad village of Cantwell.

In this tiny community is an air of excitement and expectancy as the residents anticipate a coming boom to accompany the building of a cement plant in the near future.

In the park itself, we experience the feeling of entering another world, where the animals, trees and even the wildflowers are protected.

Upon checking in at the ranger station at the park entrance the visitor is acquainted with the rules and regulations they must observe during their stay.

The McKinley Park Hotel offers luxurious accommodations for those who wish them, but the average visitor will prefer to stop at one of the numerous campgrounds.

These are all very well kept and some even boast modern inside restrooms with running water.

Wildlife abounds in the park, and may be seen at all times. These can range from the hundreds of park squirrels that inhabit the campgrounds to the mighty grizzly bears.

The only road through the park winds for almost a hundred miles, crossing high ridges and through breathtaking passes.

Here we observed hundreds of Park caribou and although wolves are considered rare, we saw two.

The mountain for which the park is named may be seen on clear days. Unfortunately such was not the case during our visit. Mighty McKinley remained shrouded in clouds during the two days of our visit.

An interesting game to play while in the park is to observe the license tags of the cars of the other visitors and see how many of the other fifty states are represented and which is the farthest away. One item of interest among the tourists was the large percentage of elderly couples that were touring.





The clothes were found carefully arranged next to an abandoned foundation in a lot near the Bartram home.

A second cache of clothing, also consisting of women's garments was found some days later in the woods not far from the first location. Mrs. Bartram was able to identify part of these as her own, but several pieces did not belong to her.

It appeared to Mrs. Bartram's husband and another neighbor who examined the second cache that someone might possibly be camping in that vicinity.

Mrs. Bartram added that with the exception of a small bottle of wine, nothing else appeared to be missing from her home.

State police were notified in the case of both finds and are investigating.

Parents of small children residing on Mt. Eklutna drive have been keeping their children close to home since the incident came to light.




