PIERSON & WILLIS SEEK BOROUGH SEATS

SOLUTION SEEN TO DUMP PROBLEM

CHUGIAK: A workable solution to the problem of the Birchwood dump was offered this week by State Senator Nick Begich.

Senator Begich stated that he had become aware of the dump problem through the series of articles printed within recent weeks in the Knik Arm Courier.

Begich said that he had discussed the problem with Levi Browning, State Commissioner of Health and Welfare, and that Mr. Browning had made the following suggestion.

The area in the vicinity of the Birchwood Airstrip which has been designated by the State as the future site of a sanitary fill, could be deeded to a recognized civic organization, such as a community club or the Chugiak Benefit Association.

This organization in turn could lease the area to a private individual who could charge a small dumping fee, in return for maintaining the dump.

Once a recognized dumping area has been established, then the State could close the dump on the Birchwood Road.

RUSSELL OBERG RE-ELECTED TO MTA BOARD

PALMER: Russell Oberg, of mile 21½ in Peters Creek was re-elected to serve a 3 year term to the Board of Directors of the Matanuska Telephone Association.

Oberg was nominated from the floor by Vernon Moore, when the latter's candidacy was disqualified at the last minute.

Moore was disqualified on the basis of his employment with an organization that might be considered as being in competition with the MTA.

CHUGIAK: Two well known local men have announced their candidacy for the offices of borough assemblyman and borough school board member respectively.

Ed Willis, of Eagle River who is presently Chairman of the Chugiak Advisory School Board is seeking the seat of Borough Assemblyman. Dale Pierson, also of Eagle River is seeking the school board position. Pierson is also a member of the Chugiak Advisory School Board, holding the office of Secretary.

Petitions for the candidacy of both men are being circulated throughout the community. Fifty signatures are required, and the petitions must be in not later than August 17th.

Voter residing within the proposed Captain Cook Borough will be given the opportunity to vote for borough assemblymen and school board members at the same time that they vote whether or not they are in favor of the borough.

Therefore, the voter have the unique opportunity to vote for the assemblymen and school board members of their choice while at the same time they might be voting against the borough.

The area for which Willis seeking the seat of borough assemblyman extends from the Eagle River Bridge through

**WORK TO BEGIN ON
CHUGIAK HIGH SCHOOL
NEXT WEEK**

CHUGIAK: Construction on Chugiak High School is scheduled to begin early next week, according to Leonard Thomas, manager and spokesman for the J. B. Warrack Co. of Seattle.

Warrack had entered a low basic bid of \$1,279,000 for the construction of the new high school, to be built on the Birchwood Road.

The single story, concrete block and steel frame building will contain 60,000 square feet of floor space.

The bid invitation also called for five alternates.

Alternate no. 1 asked for bids for the construction of four additional classrooms no 2 for bids on furnishing and installing a hardwood floor in the gym no 3 for furnishing platform equipment and no 5 for completing the gym and boys' and girls' locker rooms by Dec 15, 1964, a deduct item.

**RUMOR CONCERNING HIGH
SCHOOL EXPLODED**

CHUGIAK: A rumor concerning the soon to be built Chugiak High School was blown sky high this week by Nick Begich, superintendent of on base schools at Fort Richardson.

According to the rumor, high school students from Ft. Richardson would be transferred to Chugiak High School as soon as it is completed. Ft Richardson students are presently attending Anchorage East High School.

Begich pointed out that Fort Richardson had a twenty year agreement with the Anchorage Independent School District to send their high school students to Anchorage Schools.

Begich went on to say that the great number of high school students from Ft. Richardson would in themselves overcrowd Chugiak High School immediately.

Begich further added, speaking this time as State senator, that he was very much aware of the critical shortage of classrooms in the Chugiak school system, and that any legislation that concerned more or better school facilities for the Greater Chugiak Area would have his full support.
