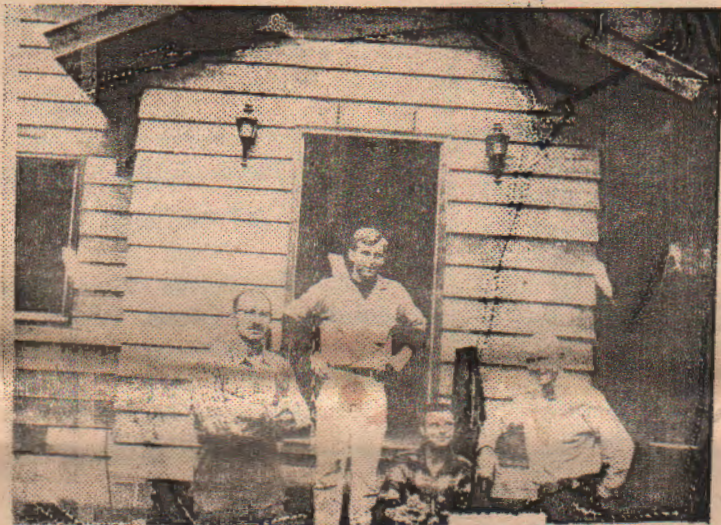

GEORGE ALLEN OPPOSES CAPTAIN COOK

PETERS CREEK: George M. Allen, of mile 23, past democratic Chairman for the Chugiak Precinct, came out opposed to the Captain Cook Borough in a pre-election statement.

Allen predicted the defeat of Captain Cook by a vote of four to one.

Allen also stated that he favored the election of George Byer for Borough Chairman, as opposed to John Asplund, who is running for the same post.

FIRE COMPANY SAVES HOME

LITTLE PETERS CREEK: The Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company, answering an early morning call yesterday, arrived in time to save a home in Little Peters Creek from being completely destroyed by fire.

The house, belonging to Ferne Peters, is presently occupied by the Fred Smith family.

Mrs. Smith attempted to call the fire company after efforts to extinguish the fire with a hand extinguisher proved futile.

CHUGIAK: Residents of the Greater Chugiak Area will go to the polls next Tuesday to decide, primarily, whether or not they favor the Captain Cook Borough.

They will also vote for one borough chairman, seven borough school board members, seven borough assemblymen, and whether they are in favor of a borough chairman form of government or a borough manager form of government.

The polling place in the Chugiak Voting precinct is the Chugiak VFW Hall at mile 21. A polling place in the Eagle River voting precinct has yet to be decided upon.

The polls will open at 8am and remain open until 8pm.

To be eligible to vote in this election one must be nineteen years of age or over, a resident of the State of Alaska for at least one year, and a resident of the precinct at least thirty days.

Election Chairman in the Chugiak voting precinct is Mrs. Faville Halverson, in the Eagle River voting precinct, Mrs. Jack Stewart.

IT'S CRANBERRY SEASON

COLLEGE: One of the most pleasant gifts of The Great Land is its berries. Cranberries, are one of the favorites of both men and bears.

There is no end to the uses for cranberries and cranberry products. A new publication available from the University of Alaska Cooperative Extension Service offers some of the Northland's best recipies for wild cranberries.

It explains several ways to store the lowbush cranberry, also commonly called lingonberry. They can be kept raw in a cold place simply by hanging them in a bar, according to the bulletin, or they can be kept raw with sugar added, in cold water or by canning.

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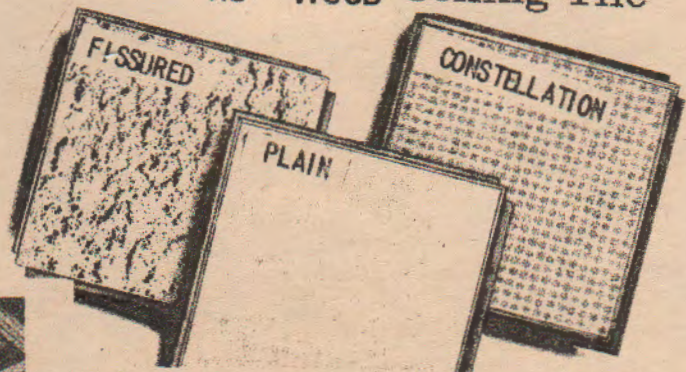



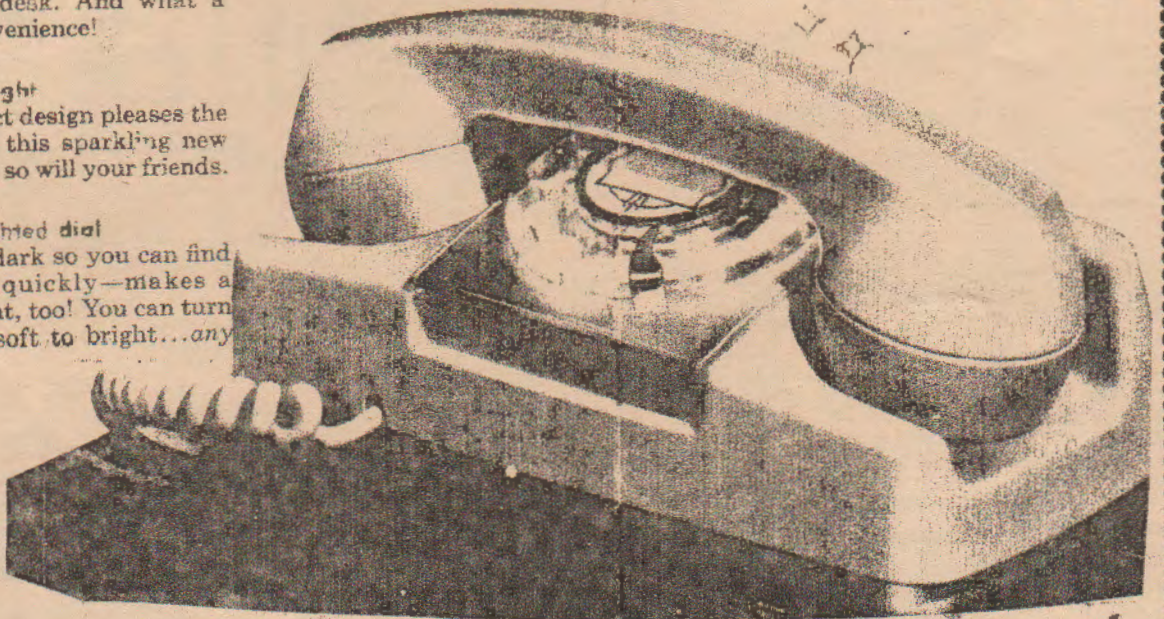

Allen said that Asplund's seeking this post, after his part in the drawing up the proposed Captain Cook borough, smacks of a man seeking self gain. "In fact," Allen added "The man is covering his bets by running for both the position of chairman and borough assemblyman on the same ballot."

With regards to the local candidates, Allen gives his support to Ed Willis for borough Assemblyman and Dale Pierson for Borough School Board member.

Allen advises local voters that they should limit their votes for borough school board to a single vote for Pierson, rather than voting for seven members as the ballot states.

Allen explained that by not voting for six other men, the chances of Pierson being elected are increased by withholding those votes from his opponents.

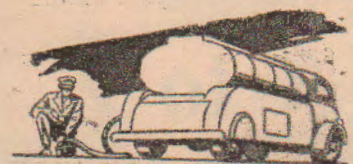

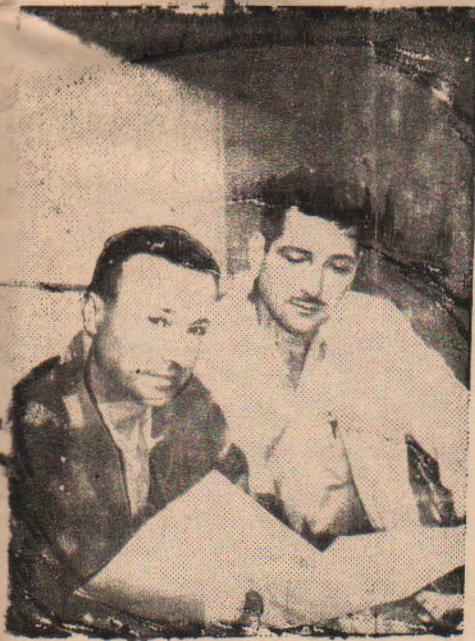

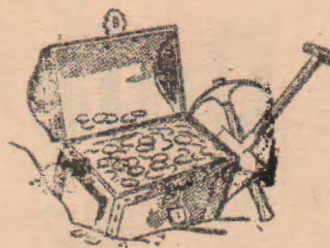
