#### GEORGE ALLEN OPPOSES CAPTAIN COOK

PETERS CREEK: George M. Allen, of mile 23, past democratic Chairman for the Chugiak Precinct, came out opposed to the Captain Cook Borough in a preelection statement.

LITTLE PETERS CREEK: The Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company, answering an early morning call yesterday, arrived in time to save a home in Little Peters Creek from being completely destroyed by fire.

The house, belonging to Ferne Peters, is presently occupied by the Fred Smith family.

Mrs. Smith attempted to call the fire company after efforts to extinguish the fire with a hand extinguisher proved futile. Greater Chugiak Area will go to the polls next Tuesday to decide, primarily, whether or not they favor the Captain Cook Borough.

To be eligible to vote in this election one must be nineteen years of age or over, a resident of the State of Alaska for at least one year, and a resident of the precinct at least thirty days.



TRAVEL ALASKA No.2 HIKING THE OLD MAIL TRAIL By:: Bill Lowe

A broken line marked "Trail" on a map and the challenge of Alaska's mountains and valleys were the inspiration for a recent expedition over the old Eagle River-Girdwood mail trail.

Four men, Captain Robert Herbes and Lt. James Christie of the United States Air Force Dr. Marshall Simpson, Eagle River and Bill Lowe of Peters Creek, all imbued with the same desire, departed Eagle River on the Saturdant before Labor Day with full packs intending to arrive in Girdwood on Labor Day.

A pick-up truck carried the a men thirteen miles from the Glenn Highway at Eagle River, up the old homestead, road to the Barclay Homestead, which proved to be the end of the line for a conventional truck. Here, amid a forets of huge cottenwoods packs were shouldered, guns and equipment checked, and the trek began.

Thirty miles to Girdwood from this point, the map read - three days - ten miles a day - no problem.

Five miles and seven hours later, darkness began to gather and the party wearily drew itself up on a n old rock slide, welcoming the change from the alders and beaver swamp, and prepared to camp. HERE ENDETH THE FIRST DAY.

#### ITS CRANBERRY SEASON

COLLEGE: One of the most pleasant gifts of The Great Land is its berries. Cranberries, are one of the favorites of both men and bears.

There is no end to the uses for cranberries and cranberry products. A new publication available from the University of Alaska Cooperative Extension Service offers some of the Northland's best recipies for wild cranberries.

It explains several ways to store the lowbush cranberry, also commonly called lingenberry. They can be kept raw in a cold place simply by hanging them in a bar, according to the bulletin, or they can be kept raw with sugar added, in cold water or by canning. (NEXT COL)



Following the dinner, a special entertainment program will follow.







Allen said that Asplund's seeking this post, after his part in the drawing up the proposed Captain Cook borough; smacks of a man seeking self gain. "In fact," Allen added "The man is covering his bets hy running for both the position of chairman and borough assemblyman on the same hallot."

State police, who also answered the call, estimated the damage at around \$200. The house was not insured.



This year the Carnival will be held on Saturday, October 26th.


Earlier in the meeting, Chuck Smith, school superintendent introduced Mr. Cline the new principal, who in turn introduced all of the teachers to the parents present.

A large cake was baked by the lunchroom ladies, Mrs. Bruce Arndt and Mrs. Frank Adams.


Mrs. Jack Stewart was Chairman in charge of the tea, and Mrs. Jack Frankfourth was in charge of decorations.






