

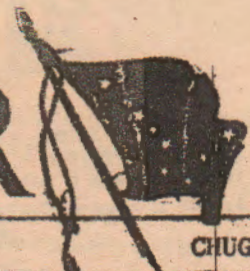

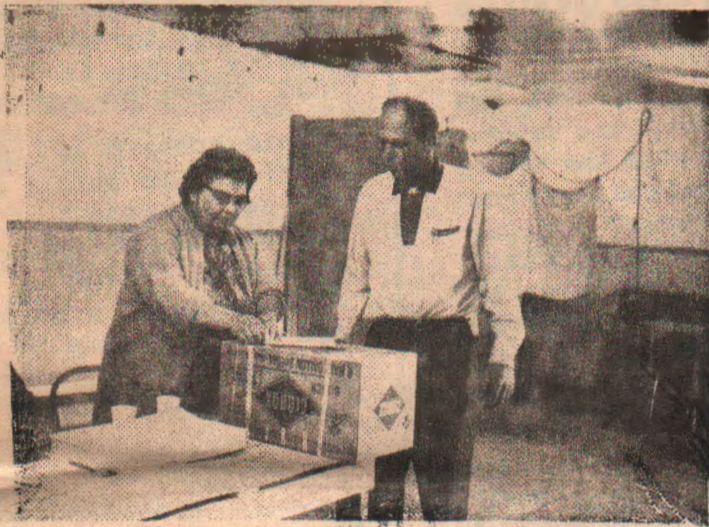

ADD 1 tsp mustard seed

½ tsp dill seed

½ tsp celery seed
