MTA TO MAKE FINAL CHANGEOVERS

PALMER: The final changeovers to all-number dialing to the rest of the area served by the Matanuska Telephone Association takes place this week.

The Palmer and Sutton Area exchanges changed over on Monday, September 23rd, and the Wasilla, Big Lake and Houston numbers will change on Monday, September 30th.

The Chugiak Area was the first to change to the all-number dialing, with both local exchanges changing over in July.

After the final changeover MTA will move the equipment now in use in the Palmer central office to the outlying exchanges.

CHUGIAK: A plan to pave a game court at the Chugiak School took most of the community by surprise last week because of the rapidity with which it was carried out.

The idea originated in the mind of Dick Kerbow, physical education teacher at the school; when he learned that the children were forced to play in a gravel yard which consisted mostly of fairly good sized rocks.

Within days, the Chugiak PTA met in an emergency session and voted to spend \$350 toward the project. The State Department of Education contributed \$650 toward the project and local businessmen, parents and teachers provided the equipment and labor.

Operation "Big Pour", took place over the weekend, and the children returned to School on Monday to find the 75 ft. by 45 ft. by 4 inch slab roped off and curing.

School Principal, Bill Benyish, gives credit for the project to the following: Til Wallace of the Wallace Concrete and construction Company who supplied the ready-mixed concrete at cost and also, donated the use of his equipment; Paul Swanson, of Swanee Slopes who leveled the area with his dozer; Walt Pease, cement contractor from Anchorage, who loaned tools, and also donate labor, Bill Stephens of Peters Creek, a professional

Two small clearwater lakes are surrounded by green, gently rolling slopes which rise to the foot of the surrounding mountains.

MEXICAN PIZZA

TIPS FOR MILADY

Once again our tip of the week is aimed at the jelly maker.

When making jams, jelly or other preserves, the messy job of melting the paraffin to pour over the jars can be neatly avoided.

Simply cut or shave the paraffin and drop the small pieces or shavings on to the top of the hot preparation in the jars or glasses.

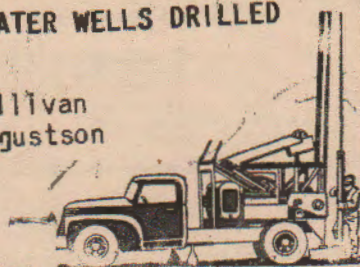

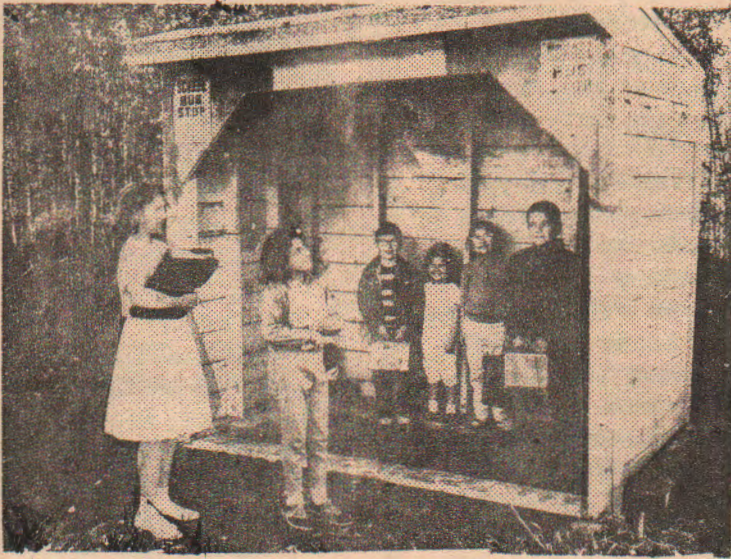

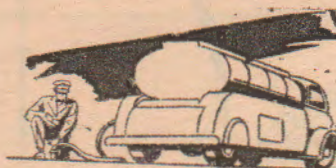

Mr. McCutcheon welcomes any questions and discussion on the subject.

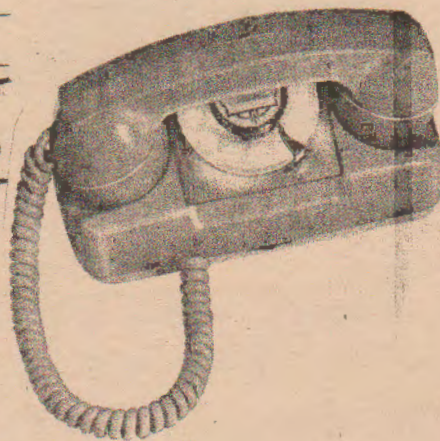

cement finisher who loaned more tools and donated labor; and the following members of the faculty who worked along with the professionals: Dick Kerbow (who was responsible for getting the project going), Paul Kerr, Seamus McGrady and Principal Bill Benyish.

When the slab is fully cured, it will be painted with game courts for basketball, four-square and hop-scotch.

The following members of the faculty have volunteered to do this painting when the time comes: Chuck Smith, superintendent of the Chugiak School System, Frank Cline, principal of the school at Eagle River; Dick Kerbow Chugiak Physical Education and Science teacher, and Bill Benyish, Chugiak School Principal.

The reason the project was pushed through in such a hurry was the desire to get it done before the ground froze.

Benyish estimated that by having labor donated and cement supplied at cost, the project was completed at 1/3 to 1/2 of what it would have cost to have had it contracted.

The cost for the entire project was at around \$1,000.

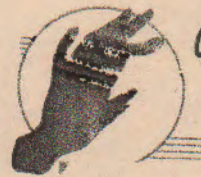

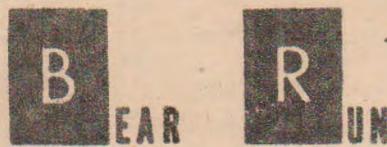

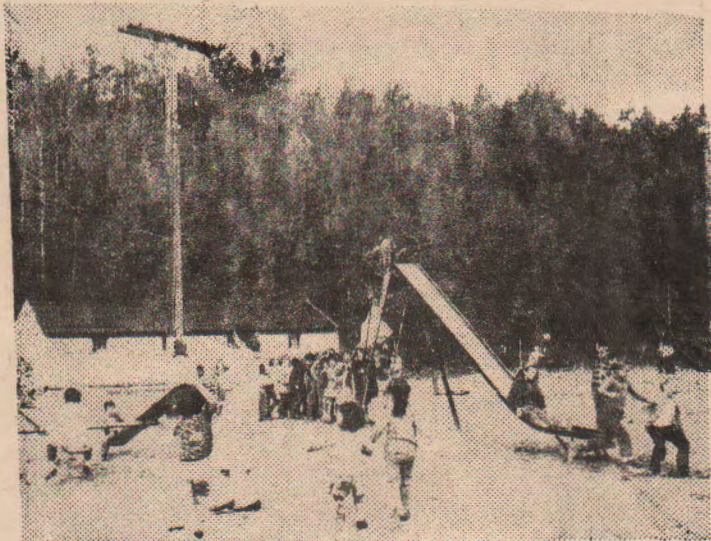

Then, over a snowfield, to the ridge, and into the pass.

To this overserver's eyes, if Heaven is a physical place of beauty and peace, it well might be here.

Two small clearwater lakes are surrounded by green, gently rolling slopes which rise to the foot of the surrounding mountains.

Of the surface of Crystal Lake are floating miniature white icebergs, supplied by a small overhanging glacier, and over all reigns quiet.

At the particular moment of discovery, no sound of man or civilization intruded to destroy the illusion.

A well defined trail leading through the pass and down the mountainside to Girdwood reveals further scenes of beauty and grandeur, the sight of which this overserver

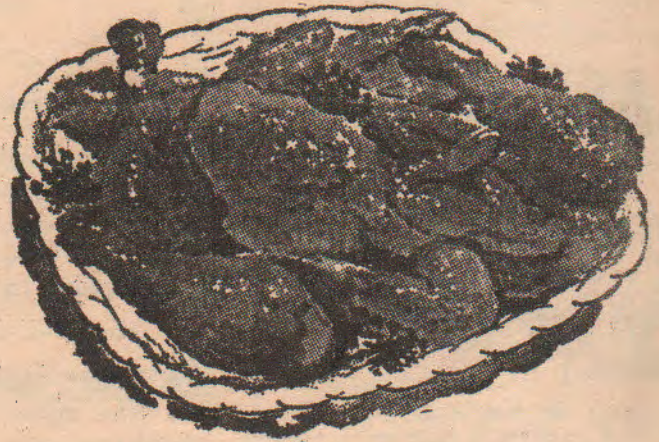
