The fourth day, twelve miles still to go, friends and families concerned.

HIKING THE OLD MAIL TRAIL By: Bill Lowe

PART 3.

The fourth day, twelve miles still to go, friends and families concerned.

The scout had found a jump crossing across the stream of the glacier, so packs were heaved across and bearers followed having dry feet for a change. (Travel)

Themslewly, but doggedly, up and along the side of the glacier on the rocks slipping, digging in, pushing upward the last thousand feet of elevation toward Crow Pass.

As altitude was gained the huga crecasses reflecting blue ice became visible across Raven Glacier and the valley from which the party bad ascended took on a panoramic aspect that fas facinating in its desocation. (next col.)

Then, over a snowfield, to the ridge, and into the pass.

To this ovserver's eyes, if Heaven is a physical place of beauty and peace, it well might be here.

Of the surface of Crystal Lake are flooting miniature white icebergs, suplied by a small overhanging glacier, and over all reigns quiet.

At the particular moment of discovery, no sound of man or civilization intruded to destroy the illusion.

A well defined trail leading through the pass and down the mountainside to Girdwood reveals further scenes of beauty and grandeur, the sight of which this ovserver
