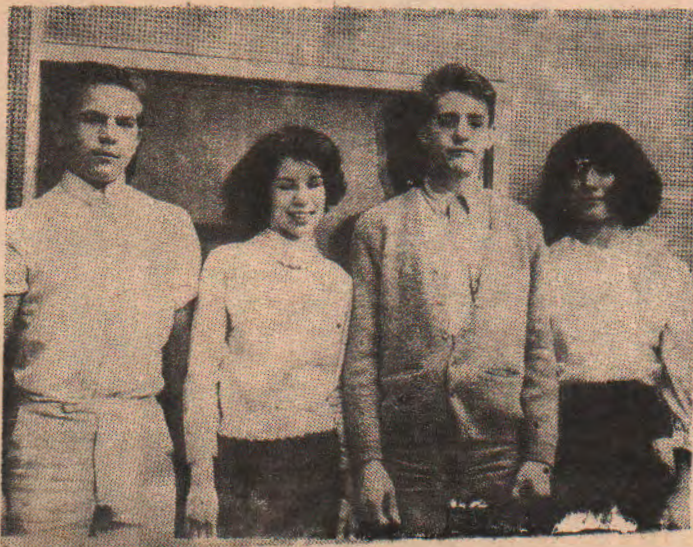

MEETING CALLED TO DISCUSS CIVIL AIR PATROL

BIRCHWOOD: A meeting to discuss the possible formation of a unit of the Civil Air Patrol in the Greater Chuglak Area, has been called for tonight (Wednesday, October 14th) at 7:30pm at the Chuglak High School.

The meeting has been called by Conrad Kruse, Aero Space Teacher at the High School, who said that several of his students had expressed an interest in the formation of a CAP unit at the school.

Such a unit, Kruse explained, would be a "Cadet" unit, and would most properly be attached to a "SR" Squadron. "To this end," Kruse went on, "we are notifying the adult members of our community of this meeting, which will discuss the possible formation of said units.

The "Cadet" unit would be open to all students and to High School graduates the ages of 13 through 19. Such individuals need not necessarily be primarily interested in flying aircraft, but any of the related fields, i.e., navigation, radio and electronics, weather. Many summer programs conducted by the Air Force are open to the participation of outstanding Cadets.

Adult members, also, need not be primarily interested in aircraft, but

TAX NOTICES TO BE SENT THIS WEEK

ANCHORAGE: Tax notices to the residents of Section one of the Greater Anchorage Area Borough are being mailed this week, according to Lee Harmond, Borough tax office.

The notices were delayed due to trouble with the data processing machine at the tax office. Mr. Harmond is attempting to obtain an extension of the deadline of October 29th for payment of these taxes. This would be in order to give the taxpayers the thirty day period originally promised between the time the tax notices were received and the time they would be declared delinquent.

LOCAL HEALTH COUNCIL TO PRESENT CHECK TO DR. MCGOWAN

CHUGIAK: The Chuglak health Council is planning a formal presentation of a check for \$400.00 to Dr. Thomas McGowan, Health and Welfare Commissioner for the State of Alaska, on Thursday, October 22nd at 11am.

BIRCHWOOD: Residents of the area appeared highly interested in Community College courses, judging to the response at a meeting held last Friday at Chuglak High School.

Although the meeting was primarily called to introduce the members of the high school faculty to the community, an added feature was a talk by Dr. Eugene Short, of the Anchorage Community College.

Dr. Short explained the function of a Community College, and told what courses might be made available at the local high school.

According to Dr. Short, the Community college was primarily a two year or Junior College type of institution, but that courses are offered that could in time amount to the equivalent of four years of college.

He went on to say that the Anchorage Community College would attempt to offer any classes locally that are asked for. The requirement being, that a minimum of fifteen students must sign up to warrant hiring an instructor and that a qualified instructor be found for that course.

In addition to the academic courses, vocational and interest courses will be offered.

Dr. Short said that a list of available courses would be published in the Knik Arm Courier, and a survey of which the local residents would be interested in will be made.

Dr. Short explained the Community College program in detail, and told of the counseling and aptitude tests that are available through the institution.

EKLUTNA MAN INJURED IN WRECK

EKLUTNA: Roy Alex of Eklutna was seriously injured last Sunday evening when his car was involved in a head-on collision with another vehicle at mile 32 on the Glenn Highway.

The 1950 Chevrolet pick-up which Alex was driving was apparently parked on the Highway in the left lane of traffic headed south. According to the State Police, the Alex vehicle did not have the lights on although it was after dark.

The second car, a 1953 Plymouth sedan driven by Donald Beard of Anchorage was approaching northbound, and did not see the unlighted vehicle.

Although Alex reportedly did turn on his lights, it was not in time for Beard to avoid hitting him head on.

Both cars were totally demolished and for a while blocked both lanes of traffic.

AFTER OCHS.....WHAT?

With Operation Chugiak High School about to become a part of history, residents of the Greater Chugiak Area are beginning to look about for other areas to conquer.

One very ambitious project that has been mentioned in some circles, is a medical center for the community.

The need for a local doctor was brought home forcibly last month when our local physician Dr. Marshall Simpson departed to further his training and left the community without a doctor.

Numerous emergencies have come up since then, and the loss of the community doctor was keenly felt each time.

Although, efforts were made to find

a replacement for Dr. Simpson, as yet none has come forth.

Therefore, the suggestion that if the community were to build and equip a modern clinic, a doctor might be more easily persuaded to take up his practice here.

This would be an effort that would require more community cooperation than did the highly successful Operation Chugiak High School.

The latter consisted of convincing the State of Alaska that the community needed the school, and then getting the state to foot the bill of building it. In the case of our clinic, it would have to be a local effort, with funds coming out of local pockets.

Whether the community is up to this remains to be seen, and should truly prove a acid test for the unity of the "place of many places."

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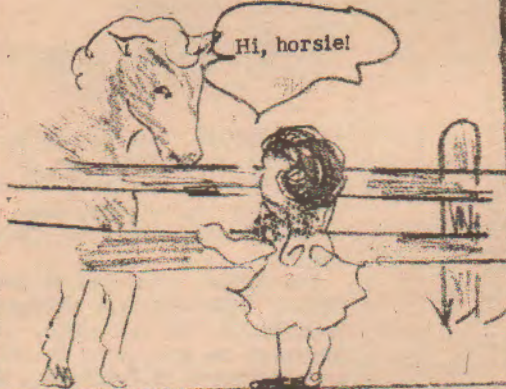

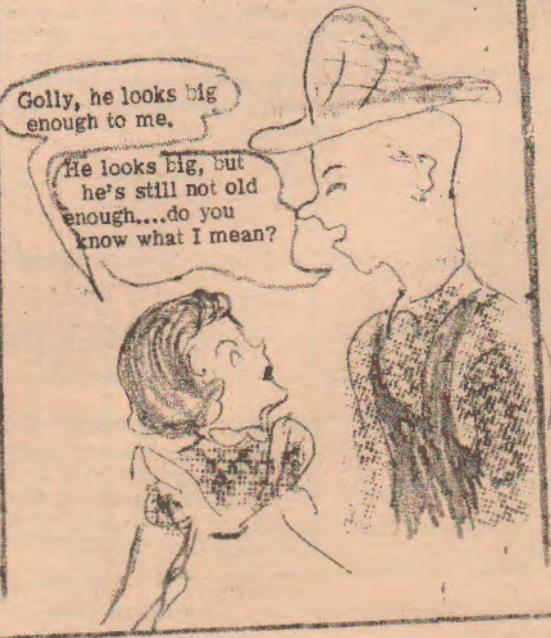

COOK OF THE MONTH

Due to circumstances beyond our control, we were unable to interview our cook for October. We will present instead this month, some recipes from the Courier files.

BEEF POT ROAST WITH MACARONI SAUCE

- 2 lbs. boneless pot roast
- 1 slice bacon, diced
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 2 tbs red wine vinegar
- Flour seasoned with salt & pepper
- 2 tbs bacon drippings
- 1 pint dry red table wine
- 2 cups cooked macaroni
- 1 medium onion, thinly sliced
- 1 carrot, sliced
- 1 turnip, quartered
- 1 tomato, peeled and quartered
- Seasonings, 1 whole clove, 1 bay leaf, 1 sprig leaf parsley and thyme
- SLIT meat in six places
- INSERT mixture of bacon and garlic in slits
- RUB meat with vinegar
- ROLL in seasoned flour
- PLACE in dutch oven
- BROWN meat on all sides in bacon drippings
- ADD onion, carrot, turnip, tomato
- TIE seasonings in cheesecloth bag
- ADD to vegetables
- POUR in the wine
- COVER and simmer in moderate oven (350 deg.) for 2 1/2 hours or until meat is tender
- REMOVE meat from pan
- SLICE meat
- ADD cooked macaroni
- REPLACE meat slices
- SIMMER until heated through
- SERVES 6

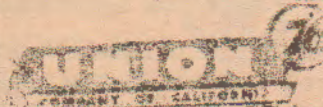
Robertson was transferred to Kenal two years ago, and more recently was transferred to Juneau where he is now stationed.

This meeting is primarily for adult community members, but young adults are invited provided they are in the company of an adult.

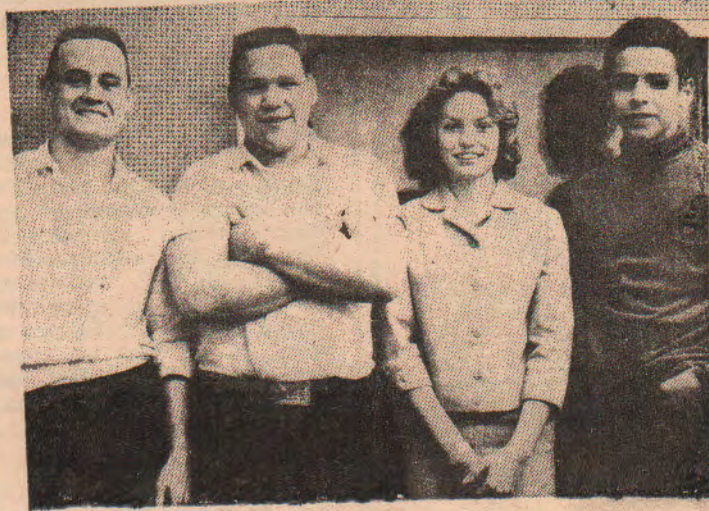

AIRPORT IMPROVMENTS BID LET

JUNEAU: In a bid opening October 1, in the office of Richard A. Downing Commissioner of Public Works, Ramstad Construction Company of Anchorage was the apparent low bidder on improvements to the Anchorage International Airport auto parking lot.

Ramstad bid \$83,197 for the project. Other bids received were from Norcoast Contractors Inc. Seattle, \$91,946, Studnek Construction Co. Spenard, \$93,892 and J.H. Sroneking Excavators, Anchorage, \$115,541.72. The engineers estimate was \$49,699.

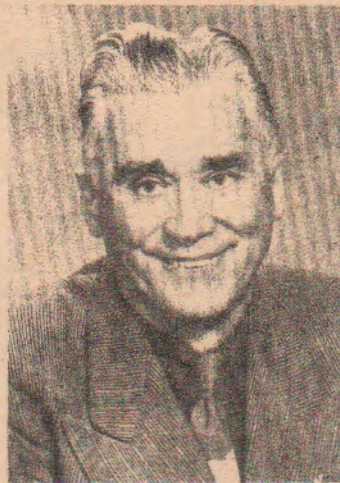

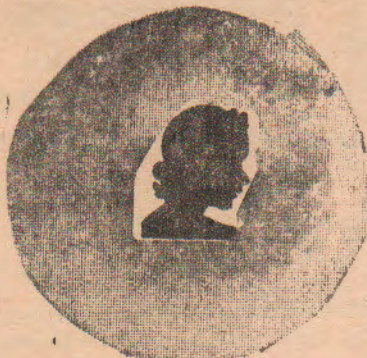


CUB SCOUT COMMITTEE MEETING TONIGHT

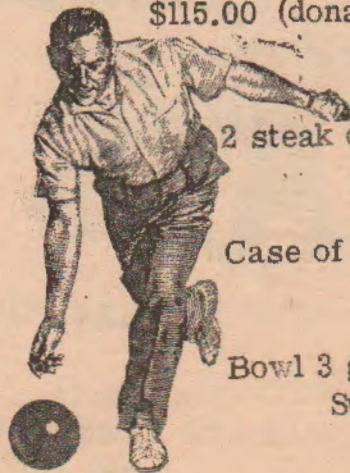

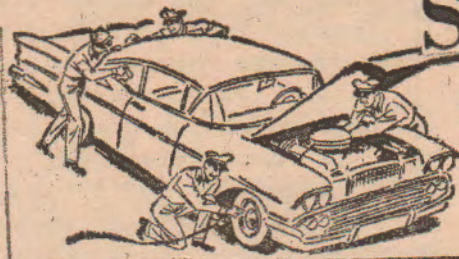
The check will represent the amount which this community is assessed each year for public health and welfare services. The community of Chugiak has been the only one in the state that has consistently paid this money each year.
