

LOCAL CIVIL AIR PATROL TO ORGANIZE

CHUGIAK: A local squadron of Civil Air Patrol Cadets has been organized at the Chugiak High School, with Ed Bellringer of Peters Creek the Commander,

As soon as fifteen members (inc-luding both the cadets and seniors) have made application, a charter will be granted.

Application blanks are available at the High School, and interested students may sign up at the time of the next meeting, which will be Tuesday, October 27th. The adult meeting will begin at 7:30pm and the cadets will meet at 8pm.

Other appointments made were Frank Cline, who will be the Aero-Space and Education Officer.

More adults are needed, with emphasis placed on ones capable of teaching military drill to the cadets... and someone experinced in a capa-city to assume the duties of administration officer. A chaplain is also needed. To be eligible for the post of Chaplain, the applicant must be an ordained minister.

The name of the new squadron will be the Chugiak High School Civil Air Patrol Cadet Squadron.

CHUGIAK: The problem of what will

be done about the Birchwood Dump may soon be solved according to a spokesman for the Chugiak Benefit Association,

The above mentioned group had contracted with Grassee and Miller of Anchorage for them to operate a Sanitary Fill on land which had been turned over to the Chugiak Area for that purpose.

The situation developed into a crisis last month when the State Department of High vs piled earth along the right of wa of the Birchwood Dump, and Posted so dumping signs.

When asked if the new dump was ready for use, GRrasse replied that it was, but that there was no passable road in to it. He further said that it was his understanding that the State was to have put in the road.

CBA has been attempting to learn which agency of the State would be responsible for this road, as the department of Highways stated that partment of Highways stated that they had uo funds for this purpose. The money for the road was loc-

ated today, allocated to the Bureau of Natural Resources of the Division of Lands.

According to Roscoe Bell, head of that department this would come under the classification of Pioneer Access Roads, and his department has approximately \$2,000 which can be used for such a road.

He indicated that CBA would be charged with letting a contract for the building of that road.

There would need to be approximately three quarters of a mile of road built. The new dump area is located south of the Eagle River Bridge, approximately 2 tenths of a mile from the Bridge.

December 0th, is the deadline for mailing of Christmas cards to distant states.


December 14 is the deadline for mailing of gift parcels to local and nearby



EMERGENCY REPAIR FUNDS AUTHORIZED

WASHINGTON D.C.

Senator Bartlett announced recently that the House and Senate appropriations committees have approved the use of \$600,000 from existing Bureau of Reclamation funds for emergency repairs to transmission facilities and the intake structure of the Eklutna hydroelectric project near Palmer.

Permanent repair, Senator Bartleet stated, is expected to cost \$3.1 million, or \$1,390,000 for the dam and spillway and \$1,700,000 for the new power plant intake structure, to be budgeted over a three-year period starting with the 1966 fiscal year.

The spring thaw revealed earthquake damage to the project to be more serious than at first realized. Prior to adjour-nment, Representative Rivers and Senator Bartlett, with co-sponsorship by Senator Gruen-ing, introduced legislation proing, introduced legislation providing that any appropriations made available for repair to Eklutna would not have to be reimbursed from Eklutna revenues. The legislation will be reintroduced in January with the Interior Department works. the Interior Department working on its report in the mean-time. If enacted, such legisla-tion would permit considera-tion of lower rates to users of clutna power.

ADVISE ON USE OF PRESSURE COOKER

PALMER:
Pressure cookers are such expensive pieces of equipment they deserve special care, Myrtle Bang, district home demonstration agent, points out. Since many of them are out. Since many of them are made of cast aluminum it is important to wash carefully with detergent and water immediately after use. This material will "pit" if food is allowed to stand in it or if not carefully washed.

Gauges may need checking. This can be done at the Exten-

This can be done at the Extension office. To make the check, the whole cooker is reeded.

Gauges must be kept out of water. The petcock must be kept clean and chining so it

kept clean and shining so it works well.

Works well.

Handles should be tightened whenever they become loose. This is a safety factor when a handling a large hot container. If the cooker has a removable gasket this may need to be taken out and stretched so that there is no leakage of steam at the edge.
