

MOOSE SEASON IS EXPLAINED

ANCHORAGE:

The moose seasons in the Matanuska Valley were set for biological reasons and not because of low population of moose there.

Loren W. Croxton, regional game supervisor, said that the departure from previous moose seasons in the Matanuska Valley this year resulted from a continuing low ratio of bulls (5 bulls per 100 cows) in the valley herd.

Croxton reported that examination of reproductive tracts from female moose col-lected from hunters by department biologists during the past four years revealed a length-ening of the breeding season of the valley moose.

The lengthening of the breeding season has induced a prolonged period of calving which, in turn, has an adverse effect on calf survival, the board of fish and game, at the department's request, closed the Matanuska Valley to moose hunting during the early season to protect the bulls before and during the breeding season.

The board also agreed to the department's request for a limited antierless season in the valley from Nov. 23 to 25, during which time the depart-ment biologists hope to collect biological specimens from 50 female moose.

Croxton pointed out that last winter's surveys showed that the valley was, despite antierless seasons since 1960, still supporting a substantial population of moose. He said that because of the conflict between agricultural enterprises and moose that we may never be able to allow the valley moose herds to again attain the numbers that were present there in past years, but that through proper management practices a substantial herd can be accommodated harmoniously with agricultural enterprises

With reference to a phase of the research program, the department spokesman explain-(next coi)

ed that its biologists need the reproductive tracts from ap-proximately 50 moose this fall to continue their investigations of the reproduction of the herd.

The only alternative to the short antlerless season would be to allow department per-sonnel to collect that number of female moose for their programs. The department following past policy feels whenever possible biological specimens shoud be collected hunter-harvested mals.

Croxton stated that if this antlerless hunt follows the pattern revealed from other such hunts it will take approximately three days for hunters to harvest fifty antierless moose from the valley. He assured concerned sportsmen that if the take were excessive during this hunt, the season could be quickly closed by field announcement.





Condensation Problems

With winter coming on, it's time you did something about condensation control if you have the problem.

Common visible evidences of condensation in homes are water spots on walls and ceil-ings, peeling exterior paint, and deterioration of structural materials.

The invisible damage is ofwooden ten greater because wooden structural members and many types of insulation rot or deteriorate as a result of moisture on or within them.

Condensation has always been a problem with Alaska home owners. The effects of condensation are so varied that the real cause of many com-mon troubles has often been overlooked.

In recent years attention has been focused on this problem because improved construction methods, particularly the wide-spread use of insulation, permit home-owners to main-tain warmer and more humid homes.

Higher temperature and humidity increase the destructive features of excessive condensation

Condensation seldom occurs in older houses because they are so loosely constructed that the exchange of inside and outside air through cracks and around doors and windows re-moves the excess water vapor.

Improved building practices such as weather-stripping, storm doors and sash, caulking, and insulation prevent warm moist air from leaking out of the house. (next col)

(housing)

Sometimes moisture is added to the air to improve the health and comfort of the occupants. Water vapor penetrates wall, ceiling, and floor spaces where it condenses on a cold surface. Exterior surfaces are kept cold by the insulation. These conditions exist in most recently constructed homes and produce severe condensation problems.
