

HOT BUTTERED CRANBERRY PUNCH

1/2 to 3/4 cups brown sugar (firmly packed)
/4 tsp each salt and nutmeg 1/2 tsp each cinnamon and alispice 3/4 tsp ground cloves 4 cups water 2 cans (1 lb each) jellied cranberry sauce quart canned pineapple juice Butter or margerine Whole cinnamon sticks (optional)

MIX sugar and spices COMBINE with 1 cup of the water BRING to a boil CRUSH cranberry sauce with fork in a large pan ADD remaining 3 cups water BEAT until smooth ADD pineapple juice and spiced syrup SIMMER about 5 minutes SERVE hot topped with dot of butter ADD cinnamon sticks for stirrers MAKES 21/2 qts. or 20 servings.

Application forms for grants for earthquake special and exexpenses have traordinary been mailed to thirteen cities and borough school districts, commissioner Floyd Guertin of the state department of administration announced today.

Guertin said that local gov

ernments which incurred spe-cial and extraordinary expenses as a result of the March 27th disaster are eligible for grants under authority of an appropriation of federal tran-sitional funds requested by the state administration at the special session of the Legislature.

Guertin said the amount of individual grants cannot be letermined until the applicaions have been returned and inalyzed by his department.

Applications were mailed to the cities of Cordova, Seldova, Homer, Anchorage, Kenai, Kodiak, Soldotna, Girdwood, Valdez, Seward and Palmer and borough school districts at Anchorage and Kodiak. Oct. 15, 1964 has been established as the deadline for submission of all applications.


