ASTRONAUT TO VISIT HERE



BIRCHWOOD: Astronaut Walter Cunningham will visit Chugiak High School, as part of a flying tour through Anchorage Area High Schools.

Astronaut Cunningham is scheduled to land in a helicopter in the School Yard on November, 12th, Thursday, where he will be officially greeted by the Chugiak High School CAP Squadron.

He will then be escorted to the multi purpose room of the school, where he will conduct a program between the hour of 3:30pm and 3:50pm.

LOST HUB CAP CAUSES COLLISION

FIRE LAKE: A motorist looking for a hub cap that he had lost a week earlier was the cause of a rear-end collision last Sunday evening.

John D. Williams of Anchorage, driving a 1964 Rambler had stopped in the middle of the road on Fire Lake Hill to look for the hub cap, when James H. Tretzel, also of Anchorage, rounded the bend at the crest of the hill. Tretzel was unable to see the Williams car in time to avoid hitting it, and struck it in the rear inflicting an estimated \$350 damage.

Damage to Tretzel's 1964 Ford pick-up truck was estimated at \$150. Neither man was injured. The accident occurred at 7pm. Citations are pending while the case is under investigation.

NEW STATE TROOPER ASSIGNED HERE

CHUGIAK: A new State Trooper has been assigned to the Greater Chugiak Area.

Robert Boatwright, a recent graduate of the State Police Training Academy in Anchorage will be working with Trooper Clifford Ripperger in this area.

Boatwright is making his home in the Phillips subdivision with his wife Marilyn. He replaces Trooper Jack Allen who was recently transferred to Kenai.

NO PROGRESS ON OPENING OF NEW DUMP

CHUGIAK: The new dumping area for Chugiak is no nearer to opening according to John Grasse, contractor for the dump.

Grasse stated that although the dump itself is ready for use, and a passable road now leads to the dump he has not as yet opened it to the public. He gave as his reason, the fact that he has not yet received the payment for putting in the road that he was promised.

Grasse reported that several people have attempted to use the new dump and havethrown trash along the access road, and in one instance even gone under the cable gate at the dump itself to dispose of their garbage. Grasse went on to say that the license numbers of the cars which have been responsible for this illegal dumping have been turned over to the State Police and the parties will be prosecuted. Until Grasse has received payment for the building of the road, the dump will not be open to the public and all violators will be prosecuted, he concluded.

EAGLE RIVER AMBULANCE MAKES TWO RUNS

EAGLE RIVER: The Rescue Wagon of the Eagle River Volunteer Fire Company responded to two calls on Thursday November 5th.

The first was at the top of the Eagle River Hill, when Mrs. Ed Scott of Birchwood lost control of her Mini-bus and skidded into the path of a vehicle driven by Harold Malone, of

Mrs. Scott was transported to the Presbyterian Hospital in Anchorage, where she was treated and returned home after a few days of hospitalization. Malone was uninjured, but both vehicles suffered substantial damage.

At 4:30pm on the same day the ambulance answered a call to mile 18 1/2 where a military jeep had lost control on the icy road and skidded into the side of a 1964 Mercedes Benz, driven by Alfred Weger of Birchwood and by co-incident the next door neighbor of Mrs. Scott, of the earlier accident.

Damage to the Weger car was estimated at \$1800, to the jeep \$800.

Weger was uninjured, but the driver of the jeep was taken to the 5040th Air Force Hospital. A report of his condition was not available.
