NO PROGRESS ON OPENING OF NEW DUMP

The new dumping area for Chugiak is no nearer to opening according to John Grasse, contractor for the dump.

Grasse stated that although the dump itself is ready for use, and a passable road now leads to the dump he has not as yet opened it to the public. He gave as his reason, the fact that he has not yet received the payment for putting in the road that he was promised.

Grasse reported that several people have attempted to use the new dump and havethrown trash along the access road, and in one instance even gone under the cable gate at the dump itself to dispose of their garbage. Grasse went on to say that the license numbers of the cars which have been responsible for this illegal dumping have been turned over to the State Police and the parties will be prosected. The first was at the top of the Eagle River Hill, when Mrs. Ed Scott of Birchwood lost control of her Minibus and skidded into the parh of a vehicle driven by Harold Malone, of Mrs. Scott was transported to the Prachyterian Hospital in Anchorage.

Presbyterian Hospital in Anchorage, where she was treated and returned home after a few days of hospitalization. Malone was uninjured, but both vehicles suffered substantial

damage.
At 4:30pm on the same day the ambulance answered a call to mile 18 1/2 where a military jeep had lost control on the cyroad and skidded into the side of a 1964 Mercedes
Benz, driven by Alfred Weger of
Birchwood and by co-incidence the
next door neighbor of Mrs. Scott,
of the earlier accident.

Damage to the Weger car was est-

imated at \$1800, to the jeep \$800. Weger was uninjured, but the driver of the jeep was taken to the 5040th Air Force Hospital. A report of his condition was not available.


MOOSE MISSED BUT CAR WRECKED
