ANCHORAGE THEATRE OPERATOR MAY PREVENT OPENING OF LOCAL ESTABLISHMENT

EAGLE RIVER: The plans of an Eagle River resident to open a local movie house may be stymied by the operator of a chain of Anchorage theatres.

According to Bob Thomas, who has already begun construction of the Eagle River Theatre, he has learned that the Anchorage interests believe that a movie house in the Greater Chugliak Area will take business away from their establishments, and therefore they may seek to prevent the local show from opening.

Thomas is presently circulating a number of petitions by which he hopes to prove to the Anchorage operator that the majority of the residents of this area are not regular patrons of the Anchorage movie houses and would be attending a local show only because of its greater convenience.

Thomas explained that he had planned to construct a building that would be used for a dual purpose

ASTRONAUT VISITS LOCAL HIGH SCHOOL

BIRCHWOOD: Astronaut Walter Cunningham paid a whirlwind visit to Chugliak High School last week as part of a program which included brief stops at all area high schools.

Astronaut Cunningham arrived at the school late WThursday afternoon via helicopter and was escorted to the multi-purpose room by acting Commander Cadet Bill Lundy of the Chugliak CAP Squadron and by Cadet Jean Old of the local CAP unit.

Astronaut Cunningham spoke briefly to the group stressing the importance of higher education in any technical field such as the astronaut program. He then threw the floor open to a question and answer session.

The main theme of his visit was the aero space program being offered at Chugliak and other area high schools.

EAGLE RIVER: The Eagle River Bowl was entered and robbed sometime early Tuesday morning in much the same manner that this establishment was burglarized earlier this year.

Entry was gained by forcing the side door, and both the safe and the office were forcibly entered and a total of \$1321.69 was taken.

Of the money stolen, approximately \$676 was in checks. Mrs. Jack Stewart, bookkeeper for the bowl asks that anyone who had written or chased a check at the bowling alley since November 1st, stop payment on that check and issue another check to the establishment.

The bowling lanes are owned by Action Development Corporation Anchorage.

State Police are investigating.

ACCA PUBLISHES RULES FOR ENTERING LIGHTING CONTEST

We have the studded tires only on our rear wheels. We are told that if studded tires are put on the front wheels also, they are even more effective.

We have not yet had the opportunity to try these tires in deep soft snow, so we are unable to report on their effectiveness there.

However, they have the advantage over tire chains in that they do not bother the driver when they are not needed, but as soon as they are necessary, there they are, ready to go to work with no further effort.

We predict that within the year almost every car in Alaska will be using these new tires, and soon they will be as standard to winter driving as is anti-freeze.

INSTANT COURAGE

Although it is not the policy of the Courier to write testimonials or to give consumer reports on products, we feel that a product new to Alaska is so exceptional that we would like to share our enthusiasm with our readers.

We are referring to the new metal studded snow tires which are being so highly advertised at this time.

Many of our friends have asked us if these tires are really as good as advertised. We now feel that we have had an opportunity to test them and can say "Yes, they sure are!"

To the average timid female driver a pair of these tires amounts to taking a dose of instant courage.

The tires grip on wet icy pavements such as was experienced

last weekend and we never experienced a skid, weave or bobble as we drove the Glenn Highway from one end of Chugiak to the other.

In spots where we could see drivers with conventional tires having considerable difficulty keeping the back end of their cars from getting ahead of their front ends, we skimmed along as though the pavement was dry.

We purchased a pair of snow grip tires with the metal studs already imbedded in them. Those who already have a good set of snow tires may have the metal studs inserted in them at a fairly small cost.

The cost of the new tires is, of course, higher than conventional winter tires, but the very first time a car slides into a ditch and has to be towed out, the new tires have already been paid for.

RECOUNT THOSE CALORIES

PALMER:

"You can have gelatin because it isn't fattening." "Margarine doesn't have as many calories as butter." "I want to lose weight so I don't eat potatoes."

Each of the above comments needs questioning, according to Myrtle Bang, district home demonstration agent. A cup of plain sweetened gelatin without fruit contains 150 calories while a potato has only 100 calories and margarine and butter have the same number of calories, she said.

"We all need calories every day, so not all calories are villains," Miss Bang stated. Many questions regarding calories and other food values in different foods can be answered by a study of the bulletin, "Nutritive Value of Foods."
