





## PALMER:

Parents can help their growing children select careers and plan for the future, Leland Cade, district Extension agent, said this week. Career selection is one of the most important decisions that a person makes during his lifetime and as such it is an endeavor that justifies considerable study. A recent study contains a number of helpful guidelines of value, to both parents and career "seekers.

Nearly all young people who grow up in rural areas will' work as an adult in a town or city. Within the lifetime of a 1964 high school graduate the farm population is expected to become less than one per cent of the nation.

Isolation reduces the awareness of both young people and adults to the need for education and career selection. This means that isolated families must place considerably more emphasis on career selection to be in competition with urban job seekers:

ed training in their chosen lield. Career seekers should a realize that every occupation in the future will demand specialized training in addition to experience.

Very often occupational commitment by a child to his father's occupation is the result of absence of knowledge about other occupations and based upon one alternative, rather than a decision based upon a number of alternatives.

Career selection is a long, term family endeavor with long term significance. The selection is great because there are now more than 40,000 job descriptions in the occupational field, Cade said.

## READ THE LABEL FOR FIRE SAFETY

PALMER: Be a label reader and live!

This timely reminden is from Palmer District Extension agent Leland Cade.

Every year there are thousands of serious accidents and fires caused by failure to observe warnings printed on cans of flammable laquers. finishes, paint removers, thinners, mastics, cleaners and similar materials.

Before you use materials of this kind, give the label a good, careful reading. If it contains a flammable solvent, the label will carry a warn-ing, and your own safety depends on your heeding that warning. According to the National Fire

According to the National File protection Association, materials safest to use are marked "Non-combustible" or Non-flammable." If you have a choice, use the mater-ials marked this way.

Next in safety are materials marked "Caution! Combustible".

ed "Caution! Combustible". If the label reads "Danger! Ex-teemely Flammable," or "Caution, Inflammable mixture," take care. These materials give off vapors which need only a touch of flame or a

which need only a touch of fiame or a spark to turn them into a dangerous flash of fire. Whenever you must work with mat-erials of any kind labeled "fiammab-le" or "cumbustible," follow these rules and be fire safe:

1. Work in a well ventilated area, perferably outside; 2. Shut off all pilots, stoves and

other flame producing devices in the area; 3. Don't smoke,

## COMMUNITY COLLEGE OFFERS TRAINING COURSE

#### ANCHORAGE:

Aptitude tests will be admin-istered by the Alaska state employment service.

The course is offered and financed under the Federal Manpower Development and Training Act. Training, subsistence and transportation allowances are available under some circumstances to eligible applicants. Selection of unemployed workers to receive training is done by the state employment service. Priority of selection is on the basis of length of at-tachment to the labor force, length of unemployment and status as primary wage earner. The actual training to upgrade skill abilities of trainees is done through the state department of education, division of voca-

tional education. The Alaska state employ-ment service is now interviewing interested applicants for a highway engineering technician course, according to Mrs. Yvonne Krotke, manager of the Anchorage local office. Classes for the 13-week course are scheduled to begin Nov. 30 under the supervision of the Anchorage Community Col-

The course is designed to provide trainees with skills necessary for employment with survey crews of the state at the Highway Engineering Technician III level, as well as for employment as engineering aides with other federal and private employers. private employers.

Trainees must be high school graduates, or equivalent, with high school courses in mathe-matics and science, and must have a real interest and aptitude in engineering aide work.

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



### NEW YORK:

The view of medical specialists that common measles can result in mental impairment and other physiological. damage, and has a relatively high death rate apparently has not yet been accepted by par ents.

This is the consensus among 152 science and health writers and editors, and editors con-cerned with women's interests, replying to a questionnaire on the subject.

The group, representing a cross-section of newspapers, syndicates and magazines, are all-but unanimous in the be-lief that anti-measles vaccination is largely disregarded be-cause parents consider the di-sease a mere inconvenience of cminanoda and not a serious health threat.


The survey of writers and The survey of writers and editors was conducted nation-ally on Nov. 7 by the Mèdi-cal and Pharmaceutical Infor-mation Bureau, New York, to help determine why only 25 per cent of children in the measles age are actually vac-cinated. Although three anti-measles vaccines have be en available for more than a year, there were 80.000 more cases of there were 80,000 more cases of measles in the first six months of 1964 than in the same period of 1963.

Eighty per cent of the replics attribute the existing apathy to a lack of public ed-ucation on the hazards of the disease.

Some science writers report that the problem is further complicated by the following: (1) the cost of inoculation; (2) (1) the cost of indecliation; (2) resistance to the practice of giving children repeated injections; (3) doubts on the part of family doctors concerning the advisability of using vac cines now available.

Thirty-eight women's interest editors noted a scarcity of specific information on the medical complications of measles which they could not pass on to their readers.

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
