EAGLE RIVER PAIR UNINJURED WHEN CARS COLLIDE

EAGLE RIVER: A pair of Eagle River motorists escaped with little injury and minor damage to their cars following a collision on October 30th, at 1:00pm.

Myrtle Wintersteen was driving a 1957 Cadillac, when she discovered that she was unable to stop when coming to an intersection of the Eagle River Road and a side road.

Mrs. Wintersteen skidded on the icy intersection and out into the Eagle River Road into the path of a 1963 Chevrolet sedan, driven by Harold Moline also of Eagle River.

The Moline vehicle struck the Wintersteen car on the right fender, damaging it to the extent of \$175. Damage to the Moline car was estimated at \$85. No citations were issued.

A number of musical and novelty acts have been planned as additional entertainment.

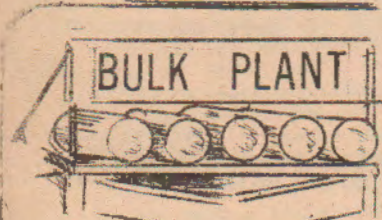
The serving of refreshments and the awarding of a large number of attractive door prizes will wind up the show.

DUMP OPENING DELAYED

EAGLE RIVER: The opening of the new Sanitary Fill (dump) will be delayed, according to John Grasse, contractor for the Fill.

Grasse blamed the delay on the lack of sufficient funds to complete the road into the dump. He said the funds which were to be made available by the Division of Lands, were not cash, but in the form of land scrip, with a total face value of \$990.

In order to convert this into cash, a buyer must be found, and sale of land scrip is usually discounted, in this case the amount that could probably be realized from the sale of the scrip would be around \$800, Grasse said.

He added that this would not be enough to complete a passable road.

He said that the State is trying to come up with additional funds in order that he might be able to complete the road.

ALASKANS MAY NOW CHOOSE MILITARY COMMAND STATION

FORT RICHARDSON, ALASKA — Young men who enlist in the Army for the first time from the State of Alaska can now be guaranteed assignment to their choice of overseas commands (Europe or Far East), thanks to a recent decision by the Department of the Army.

The option to select an overseas assignment at the time of enlistment was formerly available to non-prior service enlistees living in the south 48, and did not extend to those in Alaska.

Under the new system, Alaskan youths who long to travel need only report to the nearest U. S. Army Recruiting Station, pass the Army entrance tests, state their choice of foreign assignments, and be on their way.

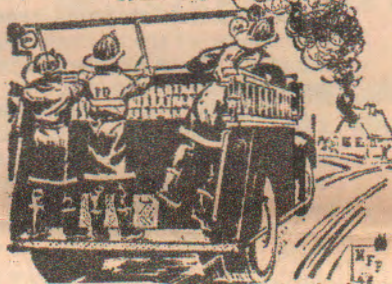

Enlistees so inclined will be sent to the Continental United States for basic training, and will be shipped to their chosen assignment upon completion of basic.



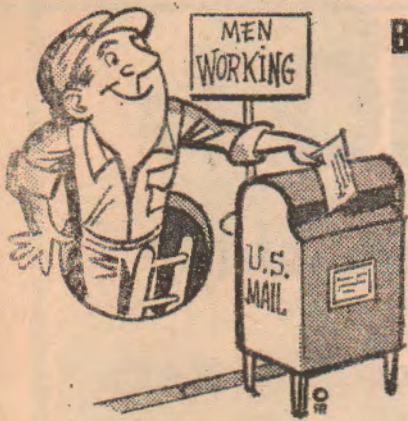

The three highest were, Nancy Long, who collected \$14; Trudy Wintersteen, who brought in \$10.15, and Vicky Frankforth who collected \$8.

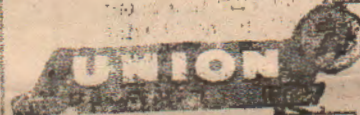
Local ACCA officials stated that they feel these boys and girls should be commended for having of their own free will given up their traditional holiday treat in favor of helping the ACCA.

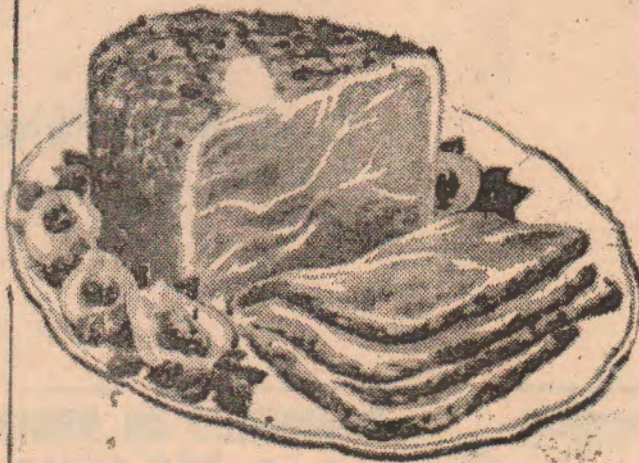

DUMP OPENING DELAYED

EAGLE RIVER: The opening of the new Sanitary Fill (dump) will be delayed, according to John Grasse, contractor for the Fill.

Grasse blamed the delay on the lack of sufficient funds to complete the road into the dump. He said the funds which were to be made available by the Division of Lands, were not cash, but in the form of land scrip, with a total face value of \$990.

In order to convert this into cash, a buyer must be found, and sale of land scrip is usually discounted, in this case the amount that could probably be realized from the sale of the scrip would be around \$800, Grasse said.

He added that this would not be enough to complete a passable road.

He said that the State is trying to come up with additional funds in order that he might be able to complete the road.

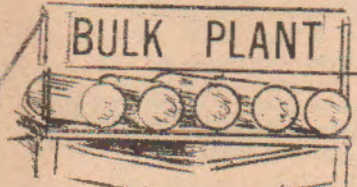
